Bill White Seeking County School Superintendent Post

Bill White, principal of the Baird high school and also athletic director, this week authorizes the Review to make public his candidacy for the office of Callahan County School Superintendent, subject to action of the July primaries. His statement appears below.

"I am announcing this week my candidacy for the position of County Superintendent of Public Instruction. "I have lived in Callahan County since 1935. I was in the school system at Cross Plains two years. I moved to Baird January 1, 1937 where I have been employed as Principal of the High School and Athletic Director except for the three years and eight months I spent in the United States Navy. "I have always been interested in schools and have chosen to make work in the public schools my lifetime job. I am now seeking the office as your County Superintendent, and if elected I promise the patrons of the Callahan Schools that I will devote my energy to working for and with them. "I believe that every child in this County is deserving and due a good public school education, and I would like to help in the future training of our young people by doing everything in my power to provide adequate, competent schooling to each and every one. "I would appreciate very sincerely your consideration of my candidacy subject to the action of the Democratic Primary July 27, 1946."

G. R. Neel, Jack Scott Appointed To School For Vets Committee

G. R. Neel of Higginbotham Bros. & Co. and Jack Scott, who expects release from the Army soon, have been appointed by the county board of school trustees to a committee to aid in perfecting a Veterans Vocational School here. There will be five such schools in the county, Baird, Putnam, Cross Plains, Clyde and Oplin.

Purpose of the school is to assist veterans who will not attend colleges to learn a trade and be employed simultaneously; in fact, under this plan, the veteran must be employed before his application will be considered. Three courses will be offered in the five schools in the county, agriculture and animal husbandry, trades and industry, and mechanics. Some forty veterans throughout the county have signified their desire to enter and some twenty-two in this area have made application.

Billy Jobe, county service officer will again be at the City Hall tomorrow (Saturday) to aid and explain to veterans the qualifications necessary and pay schedules involved in applying for vocational training.
