Former Resident Aims at Shackelford County Judgeship

Mayor, Councilmen and School Trustees to be Elected in April

MAYOR AND THREE COUNCILMEN APRIL 2; 3 TRUSTEES APRIL 6

Early Announcements Made That Voters May Consider Whom They Desire Elected

This voting year will start off the first week in April when two elections face voters in this area. Tuesday, April 2, a city election will be held to choose a mayor and three aldermen. The first Saturday in April, which is the 6, the Cross Plains Independent School District will elect three local trustees and one county trustee.

Fred V. Tunnell, present mayor, whose two year term of office expires this year, will not be a candidate for re-election. In his statement to the press Tunnell asks his public announcement state that he appreciates the courtesy the people have shown in making him mayor, but he says, pressing duties of his position at the Citizens State Bank make it unfair to the city for him to offer for re-election, as he feels he cannot give the time and attention to city affairs required of a mayor.

A petition has been presented to the City Clerk asking that the name of Jack Scott, former mayor who expects release from the Army within the near future, be placed on the ballot for Mayor at the April 2 election. Scott resigned his membership in 1944 to become a member of the armed forces and had made the City a good leader, according to opinions. The present mayor feels that Scott should be returned to his former office in the forthcoming election and says that should Scott not be available for immediate duty, the mayor pro tem or retiring mayor will continue to serve until such time as the newly elected mayor can qualify.

At the same election the City will select three councilmen. Under the stagger-system, that is choosing two councilmen one year and three the next for two year terms, this year C. D. Westerman, S. N. Foster and Fonia Worthing will be retired or re-elected. Intentions of the incumbents as to running for re-election have not been indicated to date. No other nominations have been offered for the offices, so far as public announcements are concerned.

T. T. Nichols and L. F. Foster will remain on the council until April 1947, when their terms will expire.

In the coming school trustee election, April 6, three trustees will be elected for three year terms. Also under the stagger-system, three trustees are elected one year, two the next and two the next, etc. Thus in 1946 E. I. Vestal, president of the board, Porter J. Davis, secretary, and Dock Montgomery are the three incumbents. They have not indicated whether or not they will seek re-election. Trustees whose terms do not expire are Vernon Spowell, Ben Atwood and M. E. Howell, V. C. Walker, county trustee, will be retired or re-elected. To date he has no opposition. The County trustee-at-large, H. H. McDermott, will be retained until 1947 when his term expires.

Early announcements of coming local elections are made so that all persons interested in city and school affairs may give their earnest consideration to the selection of candidates to fill these posts for the coming two and three years, also as a reminder to persons who will seek election that the time is short to get themselves before voters by personal contact, influence or public announcement.

QUOTA SET AT \$875. RED CROSS DRIVE OPENS HERE TODAY;

The annual Red Cross Drive for funds to carry on work for the coming year gets underway in Callahan county today, announced by C. Walker, local chairman. Cross Plains has been assigned a quota of \$875.00 of the \$3960.00 due to be raised in Callahan county. H. H. Frelund of Baird is county chairman of the drive. Chairman Walker points out that the assignment gives the county this year is only approximately one-half the amount raised in 1945.

It is just as necessary, chairman Walker says, to give to the Red Cross this year as during wartime. Work of the organization must go on, such as relief to victims of disasters, storms, floods, fires and disease epidemics over the nation. Remember also that during wartime "Your Red Cross was at his side" and repay the debt owed to some Red Cross worker who saw that your boy or girl was a little better cared for on the battlefields by contributing now to the national Red Cross drive.

"Each individual is urged to give as much as he or she can to the drive," says Walker. The drive will continue until everyone in the county has had a chance to give to it. It will be impossible for committees to see every one, but those who are not solicited are urged to see their local representative of the drive or make their deposit at the bank to the credit of Callahan County Red Cross. Let's put this quota of \$875 over in a hurry, Walker concludes.

SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Except for ups and downs on cotton, most Southwest farm products found a fair demand at steady prices last week, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Grain markets were closed Friday and Saturday for Washington's birthday, but latest reports showed most prices at ceiling with demand exceeding supply.

Most Southwest cattle markets closed last week, with prices slightly higher than they were the previous week.

Southwest hog markets were active and most prices were at ceiling. Top butchers were quoted as \$14.50 per hundred pounds, Wichita; \$14.65, Fort Worth.

Poultry offerings were generally lighter during the week and prices remained steady with heavy hens quoted at 22 to 23 cents a pound at Fort Worth.

Demand for fryers picked up but prices remained steady at 28 to 30 cents a pound at most Southwest markets.

XX Army Corpsmen To Receive Medals From Mayor of Metz

The Mayor of Metz, France, personally will present medals of Metz, elevations commemorating the liberation of the famous French city by the American XX Army Corps in November 1944, to all eligible officers and enlisted men in a special ceremony at the Hall of State in Dallas, March 11, Gen. Walton H. Walker, commanding general of the 8th Service Command and former commander of the XX Corps, said today.

Mayor of Metz will visit at the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Gabriel Hoepfard of Metz will make the awards in recognition of the effort made by the members of the XX Corps in liberating his city from the Germans. All individuals, still in active duty or now separated from the service, who served in units assigned or attached to the XX Corps during the month of November 1944 are eligible to receive the medals.

III Corps Artillery.
