

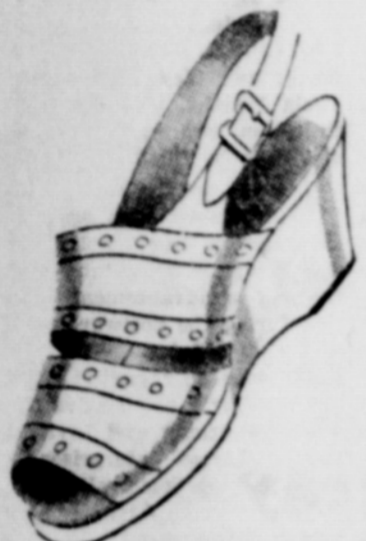

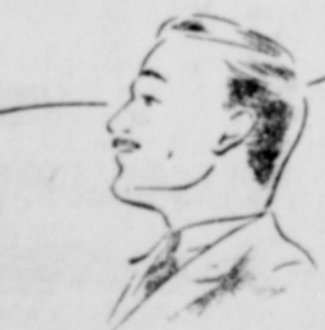

proposes that a research division be located at Cross Plains and another at Mineral Wells for experimentation in each of these fruit belts.

Much of the pioneer work in capturing this industry has already been done by the men of Mineral Wells. They have demonstrated that this fruit land of West Texas will produce twenty times the wealth from silk that it will produce from any other crop. They have a supply of nursery stock that is the best in the world. They have a supply of silk worm eggs, and they have developed some machinery that will take the place of hand labor.

But this is only a beginning. It is believed there is much machinery yet to be developed, and there is the greatest need to perfect those early machines, and to improve methods of growing and manufacturing this product. In the present situation time is extremely vital. Unemployed masses cannot wait for any slow motion process.

Intensive research by the Government can greatly speed up this evolution of this industry, and can make it available to those unemployed within the next few years.

This employment problem is going to be even more serious after every body has gotten his new car, and new radio, and the boom begins to break.

Kathryn Gravens, war correspondent and news commentator, accompanied by her sister, Mrs. Maury Hill of St. Louis, Mo., arrived in Burkett, Texas, yesterday to visit another sister, Mrs. Wylie Newton, for a short time.

Miss Gravens has just returned from visiting 21 countries in Europe, Asia and the Middle East, where she covered many important events and interviewed world-famous personalities. She will be in Texas several weeks before returning to New York to do a series of Television programs for National Broadcasting Systems.

Born in Burkett, Texas, the daughter of the late Dr. John Calvin Godman, and Mrs. Rose Ann Godman Perry, Miss Gravens has made frequent visits to her home state since she went to New York in 1936 to begin her career in radio.

After their visit to Mrs. Newton, Miss Gravens and Mrs. Hill will go to San Angelo, Texas, to visit their mother, Mrs. J. E. Perry. Miss Gravens will also attend the San Antonio Festival.

Miss Gravens, another Texas who has "made good", and of whom Texas can be justly proud, won her way to fame through a succession of "firsts." She was the first woman to do a feminine chatter program on the air, the first woman to track down news for a syndicated column, the first woman news commentator to broadcast from Berlin, the first woman to receive credentials covering the War Criminal trials, and the first woman to broadcast from Berlin after its fall.

She covered the Petain trial, the Quisling trial, the trial of Lord Haw Haw; attended the Potsdam Conference, went into Bulgaria during the elections, flew to the Palestine riots, and flew with President Harry S. Truman and Secretary Byrnes from Berlin to Frankfurt to inspect 30,000 troops.
