TROPHIES AWARDED TO CHAMPION AND RUNNER-UP TEAMS

The Cross Plains girls defeated Beattie girls 49-28 in semi-finals while Novice defeated Eula 29-22 in the lower bracket of the semi-finals. Cross Plains then defeated Novice 19-18 in the finals.

\$189.00 IN PRIZES TO BE AWARDED; JUDGING TO START AT 2 P. M.

The F. F. A. Stock Show of the Cross Plains Chapter will be held today (Friday, 26th). This show was previously planned for last week but due to bad weather it was postponed until today. The show will be held on the vacant lot east of the C. D. Westerman Station. The exhibition is being sponsored by local merchants under the personal supervision of O. B. Edmondson, high school vocational agriculture teacher, and will be judged by W. H. Gest of A. C. C. College at Abilene, at 2 p. m.

After the judging a white face, 9 month old calf, owned by Dick Vestal will be auctioned off. Prizes to be awarded amount to \$189.00. The Review was told. The prizes will be awarded in the following manner: Baby heaves; 1st prize \$25.00, 2nd prize \$22.00, 3rd prize \$18.50, 4th prize \$15.50, 5th prize \$10.50, and 6th prize \$8.50. FULL SIZE CAR TAGS TO BE ISSUED THIS YEAR

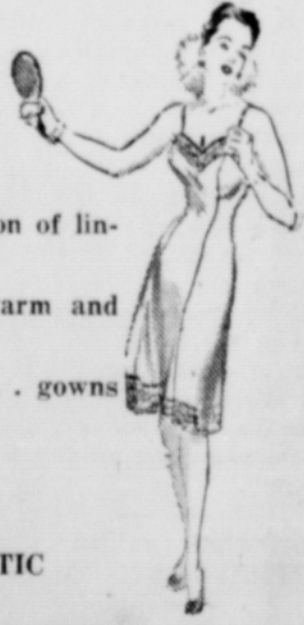

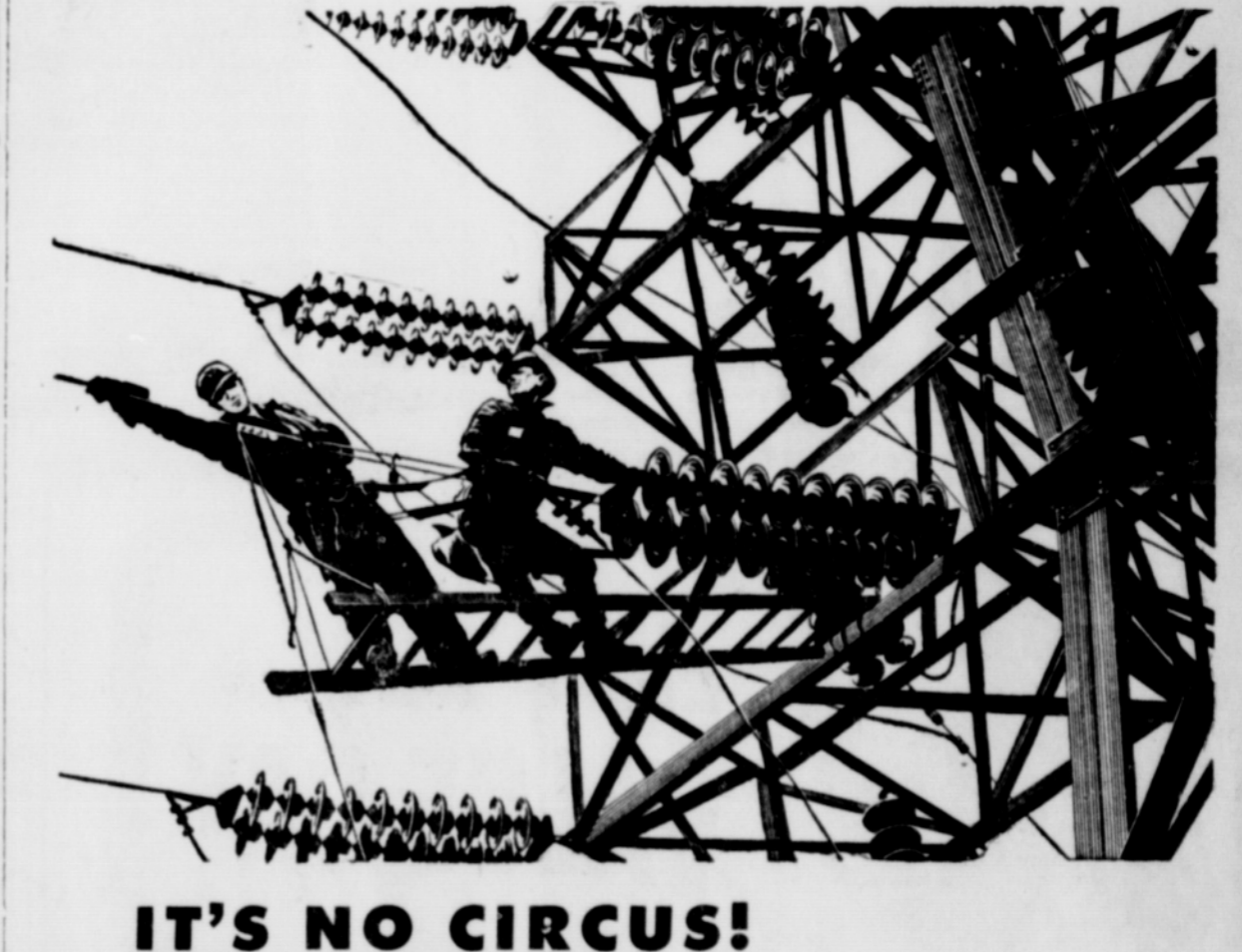

It is very likely that one of those chutes was Guy's. Being in the nose, he had a very good chance, since the escape hatch was near by. It will take 3 months or longer to find out if he is a prisoner of war or that he has escaped to our lines. Only time will tell. I do not have the address of his wife so if you will send me her address or give her this information, I'm sure she will be grateful. "Guy was my very good friend; he has served his country well; in fact much more than most of us. I hope that he escapes back to our lines instead of having to spend the duration as a prisoner of war. "If I can help you in any way, please don't fail to let me know. Sincerely, Joe T. Robinson, Capt."
