### I Think The Baird Star Was a Firster

Any way, The Baird Star is laying claim to having been the first paper in Texas, in 1944, to point "with alarm" to the turn in Texas politics, when we reported the "called meeting" which was called by a young Lieut. in uniform, and his coming and acting as chairman of Callahan County Democratic Executive Committee meeting held in the Jackson Abstract office, March 8th, 1944.

Now in the Dallas News, we are beginning to see stories about the possible (?) presidential conventions-precinct on May 6th, county on May 9th, and the state on May 23rd.

Read what Maury Hughes, once on the Ned Deal band wagon and candidate for Governor in 1934, has to say in Dallas News:

These CIO political leaders endeavoring to name delegates to the national convention are the leaders who have extracted dues for political purposes from patriotic men and women in war industries . . . . . Thy have adopted the tactics of the CIO in the Eastern States by forming a political military organization and naming generals, colonels, majors, captains and lieutenants to take charge of the divisions of Dalas county. CIO leaders have stated that Dallas county will get its share of the National Political slush fund, and we are now seeing its first use.'

There you have the true coloring of this "presidential" business which is seeping out to even remote counties, with small urban populations, whose people have nothing to gain and all to lose in lining up with this CIO-military gang.
