tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1944, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, "For the Constitu-tional Amendment providing that the cities and towns in this State shall have the power and authority to pro-vide a system of pensions for their appointive officers and employees," and "Against the Constitutional Aand Against the Constitutional and mendment providing that all cities and towns in this State shall have the power and Authority to provide a system of pensions for their ap-pointive officers and empolyees." All ballets at such election shall also ballots at such election shall also have printed thereon, "For the Con-stitutional Amendment giving authority to the Legislature to provide a system of retirement and disabili-ty pensions for appointive officers and employees of cities and towns" ty pensions for appointive officers and employees of cities and towns" and "Against the Constitutional A-mendment giving authority to the Legislature to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employ-ces of cities and towns." Each voter shall scratch out two (2) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the two (2) expressing his vote on the pro-posed Amendment. SEC. 3.— The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the neces sary proclamation for the State of Texas shall issue the neces and shall have the same required by the Constitu-mendments thereto. SEC. 4.—The sum of Flve Thon and Dollars (\$5,000), or so mucn thereof as may be necessary, is here-by appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not other-wise appropriated, to pay the ex-penses of such publication and elec-tion.
