"Gives You Texas"

A Texas classic is the "Babe of the Alamo" speech made, many years ago, by Guy M. Bryant in the House of Representatives:

"I intended, Mr. Speaker, to be silent on this occasion, but silence would now be a reproach, when to speak is a duty. No one has raised a voice in behalf of this orphan child; several have spoken against her claim. I rise, Sir, in behalf of no common cause. Liberty was its foundation, heroism and martyrdom consecrated it. I speak for the orphan child of the Alamo.

No orphan children of fallen patriots can send a similar petition to this House—none save her can say, "I am a Child of the Alamo."

Well do I remember the consternation which spread throughout the land when the sad tidings reached our ears that the Alamo had fallen! It was here that a gallant few, the bravest of the brave, threw themselves betwix the enemy and the settlements, determined not to surrender nor retreat. They redeemed that pledge with the forfeit of their lives; they fill the chosen sacrifice to Texas freedom!

Texas, unapprised of the approach of the invader, was sleeping in fancied security, when the gun of the Alamo first announced that the Attila of the South was near. In-furiated at the resistance of Travis and his noble band, he marshaled his whole army beneath the walls, and rolled wave after wave of his hosts against those battlements of freedom. In vain he strove; the flag of liberty—the Lone Star of Texas—still streamed out upon the breeze and floated proudly from the outer wall. Maddened and persistent, he reared his batteries and, after days of furious bombardment and repeated assaults, he took a blackened and ruined mass—the blood-stained walls of the Alamo. The noble, the martyred spirits of all its gallant defenders had taken their flight to another fortress, not made with hands.

But for this stand at the Alamo, Texas would have been desolated to the Sabine. Sir, I ask this pitance, and for whom? For the only living witness, save the mother, of this awful tragedy—"this bloodiest picture in the book of time," the bravest act that ever swelled the annals of any country.

Grant the boon! She claims it as the Christian child of the Alamo—lapsed in the blood of a Travis, a Bowie, a Crockett and a Bonham. To turn her away would be a shame. Give her what she asks, that she may be educated and become a worthy child of the States—that she may take that position in society to which she is entitled by the illustrious name of her martyred father. Illustrious because he fell at the Alamo.

Federal Crop Insurance For Wheat Farmers

Farmers in Callahan County should lose no time before considering crop insurance on their 1947 wheat crops. August 31, 1946, is the final date for writing insurance on next year's crop.

New provisions in the program this year enable farmers to make a wider choice of the type of coverage they desire. Detailed explanation of these new provisions is available at the County AAA Office. Wheat crop insurance is sold under a three-year contract.

Wheat farmers are always faced with the threat of loss of crops through no fault of their own. Federal crop insurance offers protection against loss in yield from all unavoidable causes and provides a cushion against loss of money and labor when crops are destroyed. Federal crop insurance is set up to operate on a non-profit basis. All premiums collected will be paid back to insured farmers, whose crops were destroyed, in the form of indemnities. Administrative expenses are paid by the government.

There are eighty-one farmers in Callahan County whose 1946 wheat crops were covered by All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance contracts. The new contracts remain in force for the 1947 and 1948 crop years. Out of the eighty-one insured farmers in this county, twelve apparently are eligible to receive indemnity payments due to losses in their wheat yield caused primarily by hail and drought. These losses occurred this year during which wheat production was high proving that farmers need the protection of Federal crop insurance, even in years when the production is above average.

County AAA office personnel and County and Community Committees will be glad to explain the wheat crop insurance program to any interested wheat producer.
