PARCEL POST MAPS FOR PUBLIC

Parcels post maps and guides will be placed on sale shortly before January 1st. The office of the chief clerk of the Postoffice Department at Washington has given out the following report in answer to inquiries:

Postoffice Department. Office of the Chief Clerk, Washington, Nov. 25.—Relative to the parcels post service, I beg to state that a parcels post map and a parcels post guide will be furnished to each postmaster, after which they will be sale to the public at a nominal price shortly before January 1, 1913. The map will show each unit of area in the United States properly numbered. Each postoffice will be furnished with a map suitable for use in the unit in which that postoffice is located. The guide will contain the regulations for the conduct of the service and a list of postoffices, with their respective unit numbers.

Seeds, cuttings, bulbs roots, scious and plants will be permitted in the parcels post mails under regulations as to size and weight applicable to other parcels post packages, but at the rate of postage of 1 cent for each two ounces or fractions thereof, regardless of distance. All matter now classified as third-class matter will not be permitted in the parcels post mails.

Farm and factory products will be admitted to the parcels post mail under certain regulations to be found in the parcels post guide.

Distinctive parcels post stamps must be used on all fourth class matter, including that weighing four ounces and less, beginning Jan. 1, 1913. Such matter bearing ordinary postage stamps will be treated as held for postage.

A parcel not more than three feet six inches in length may measure as much as two feet six inches in girth or around its thickest part. A shorter parcel may be thicker, thus, if it measures no more than three feet in length, it may measure as much as three feet in girth, or around its thickest part. Measure, meat will be made by means of a six foot tape line furnished by the postmaster by the department. So much of the tape as is not used in measuring the length is the measure of the maximum girth permissible.

Parcels will be mailable only at postoffices, branch post offices, lettered and local stations and such named stations as may be designated by the postmaster or presented to a rural or other carrier duly authorized to receive such matter.

All parcels must bear the return card of the sender, otherwise they will not be accepted for mailing.

FOR A ROAD

BOND ISSUE

Petitions Circulating For a \$75,000 Bond Issue.

Tuesday night a mass meeting was held in Cross Plains for the purpose of discussing the good road question. On account of the inclemency of the weather a good many who had promised to come from the country were not able to be present, but every one that attended seemed to be a good road enthusiast. All kinds of roads were discussed, the making of their maintenance, etc., but all seemed to think that a good clayed road was about all we could hope to get at the present time, and it was finally decided to circulate petitions calling for election on a \$75,000.00 40 year road bond issue in this Commissioner's precinct. Petitions have been handed J. A. Moore and others to circulate throughout the country, where they will no doubt be numerously signed.

Commissioner Jack Aiken states that this \$75,000 will build 100 miles of good clayed roads, the mileage of good cardinal roads that we have in this precinct. There is about one-and-one-half millions dollars valuation in the precinct and the 75,000 dollars bond issue would mean an assessment of about 37¢ on the \$100 valuation. That means that a farmer paying taxes on \$2000 rendition will pay about \$7.50 each year for the good roads.

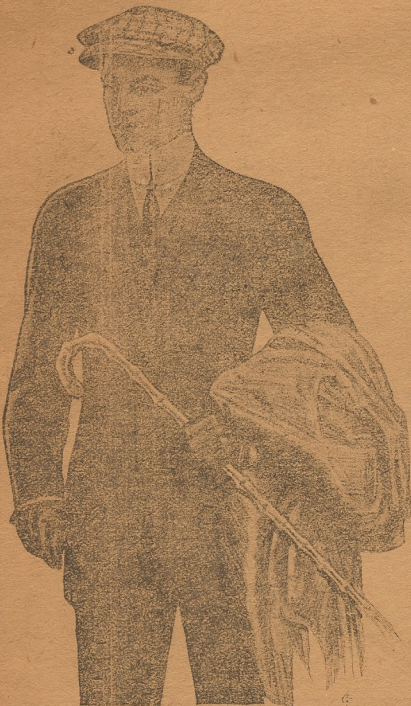

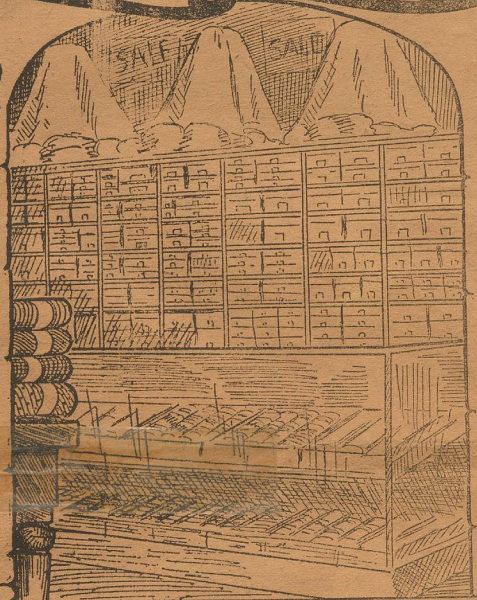

Bond Issue for Precinct One

A petition has been presented to the Commissioners Court at its last sitting asking for a road bond election for Precinct No. 1, according to the Baird Star. The bonds are to call for \$50,000 to build 46 miles of Macadam roads. The petition is well signed, and if the election is ordered the bonds should and in all probability will carry. The Review is glad to see precinct no. 1 take the lead—eventually we all must have the roads and it may be easier for the rest of us to follow than to lead the way.

The average cost of building Macadam roads in Texas, according to road builders, is about \$2500 per mile. That being the average for the state, in Callahan county with ample stone for the road bed hard by the roadside, the cost per mile should be less. That is \$50,000 should build here something like the 46 miles called for in the petition spoken of above. This county should build as cheap as any county in this whole section.
