County Tax Assessor Jean Lovelady reported that vote registrations for 1970 are lagging behind those registered during 1969 even though several important elections are upcoming for the year.

As of Friday, January 9, a total of 1,484 voters had registered, compared to 1,600 having registered at the same time last year.

Mrs. Lovelady said voter qualifications are simple. You must be a citizen of the United States; be over 21 years of age on the day of the election; a resident of the state for at least one year immediately preceding election day and a resident of the county for at least six months immediately preceding election day—although this requirement does not hold true for voting in statewide elections. You must have lived within the city for at least six months immediately prior to vote in city elections.

Any person who fulfills the requirements, or who will fulfill them before the end of the 1970 voting year on February 28, 1971, may register during the regular period. Persons registering before they meet the age or residence requirements cannot vote until the requirements are met. Their registration certificates will show the date on which they will become eligible to vote.

In order to be eligible to vote in the primaries and general election during 1970, you must register prior to the January 11 deadline.

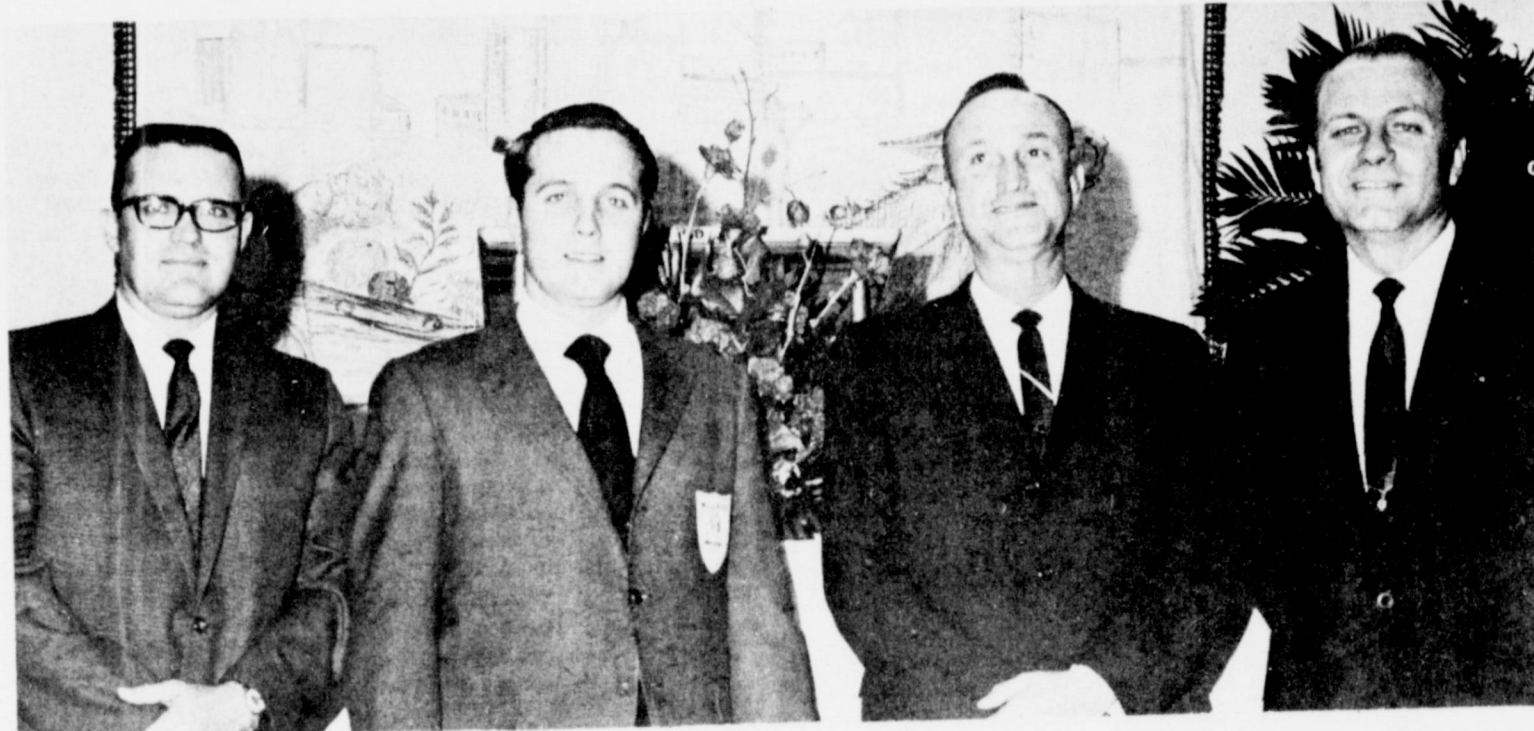
The speaker was introduced by Larry Clawson and centered his talk around "The Four Points of Achievement." Those who attended said he brought out many timely and good points for the athletic student.

## Highway Department Urges-Read Instructions

AUSTIN--The Texas Highway Department is sporting a red face.

In recent news releases announcing the computerized motor vehicle registration system, Department information specialists wrote:

"Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form."

"That must be a mistake--because a lot of motorists haven't been following instructions. And mistakes generate confusion."

This is the first year that the Department has gone to the new system, which included an order-by-mail program for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle license plates.

But just to make sure that motorists do understand the "easy-to-follow instructions", they are:

1. Each motorist whose vehicle was registered last year has or will receive in the mail a long, narrow envelope with a printed message in the front reading: "Important--This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

2. The envelope will contain a three-part form. Do Not Separate The Three Parts.

3. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during January and February by mailing the three-part form (intact) and your check to your county tax collector. Add \$1 for postage and handling charges for each vehicle. License plates will be mailed February 1 and thereafter.

4. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during February and March by taking the three-part form (intact) and your check to the tax collector's office or substation.

That's it! Now see if you are one of the seven million-plus Texas motorists who can follow those "easy-to-follow instructions."

## High Plains Water Election This Week

Ernest Ramm, Route Two Muleshoe is a nominee for County Committeeman for Precinct Two and Adolph Wittner, Star Route, Baileyboro, is nominee for election to Precinct Four in an election to be held by High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Number One.

Qualified voters in Bailey County may vote at Enoch's Gin office at Enochs or the High Plains Water District Office, Muleshoe on January 13. A qualified voter is one who has a valid Voter Registration Certificate for 1969 and resides within the District.

A spokesman for High Plains Underground Water said voters can cast their ballot for the candidate of their choice for District Director or County Committeeman-at-large at either polling places in the county.

The County Committee approves well drilling permits and makes recommendations on various matters to the District Board.

Frank Rayner, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Number One, announced, also, that the 1969 cost-in-water-depletion, income-tax allowance maps have been released by the District.

"These maps are constructed annually by the District," he explained, "and are used by property owners throughout the High Plains area to claim an income tax allowance on the amount of the depletion of the underground water supply beneath their property."

He commented, "Although the District charges \$1 plus postage for each map, covering an entire county, the income from such map sales goes only to defray the cost of printing and mailing the maps and to pay for the land appraisers fee for

A young farmer who covered up a "dust bowl" captured the top conservation farmer award in the Blackwater District. Dick Howard was presented the top conservation farmer plaque at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet Friday night.

"Pulling for Muleshoe" was the theme of the 1970 Chamber of Commerce banquet with Rev. Doug Dubose acting as Master of Ceremonies. He extended a welcome to guests and acknowledged numerous towns represented at the banquet. Out of town visitors were from Littlefield, Lubbock, Earth, Tula, Amarillo, Dimmitt, Portales, Morton, Clovis, Corpus Christi, Friona and other area towns.

More than three hundred people packed into the Muleshoe High School cafeteria for the evening. Following the dinner, during which time, Chester Clay Beavers played appropriate dinner music, Rev. Dubose introduced "The Free Entertainment" a local folk singing group.

#### Funeral Rites Held For Judge Vaughn

Funeral services for Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn, 75, will be held at 2 p.m. today (Sunday) in the Muleshoe First Baptist Church. Officiating will be Rev. Doug Dubose minister of the church and Elder Glen Williams, Primitive Baptist minister. Burial will be in Bailey County Memorial Park under direction of Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe.

Justice Vaughn was found dead at his home Wednesday morning. He apparently died of a heart attack suffered in his sleep. Joe D. Vaughn was born September 29, 1894 in Hector, Ark. and had lived in Bailey County and Muleshoe since 1929, moving to the area from Wichita Falls. He was a member of the Muleshoe First Baptist Church, a Veteran of World War I where he served in the U.S. Navy and was a member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. He had served as a justice of the peace for the past 14 years and was appointed City Corporation Judge on January 1. He was veterans service officer for Bailey County, a position he had held for many years and was a former adjutant of the American Legion.

During the 1930s, Judge Vaughn operated a service station in Muleshoe and was a former deputy sheriff, having served under Sheriff Buchanan in the 1940s.

ary 31 deadline. The tax assessor reminded that a person must register as a voter of the county and precinct where he has his permanent residence. He should make his application for registration to the county tax assessor-collector of that county. The application may be made either by mail, on a voter registration application form which can be obtained from the assessor-collector's office, or by personal appearance in the assessor-collector's office or before a deputy who has been authorized to serve at some other location.

"There is no charge for registration," added Mrs. Lovelady, "and where a former exemption from registration for persons over 60 years old who did not live in a city of 10,000 inhabitants was effective, there is no exemption now. The only major exception to the general requirement for registration is for persons who are absent from their county of residence in active military service."

The husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter of a voter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if the relative is a qualified voter in the same county.

Dick Howard owns and operates a 729 acre livestock farm located two miles south of Needmore.

When Howard purchased the farm in 1967, the farm was a maze of gullies and blown up turn rows. What top soil had not blown away had been washed away. The rangeland was also severely overgrazed. The highway department spent several days each year hauling top soil away from the Morton highway which came from this farm.

before Howard purchased it. Dich Howard has converted 40 acres of land that was not suitable for cultivated crops to permanent pasture. He has installed 25,000 feet of parallel terraces and 10,500 feet of diversion terrace to control water erosion. He plans to install another 100,000 feet of parallel terraces during 1970 to complete erosion control practices.

Howard has not been satisfied to depend on terraces for all erosion control. He has converted his farming equipment so that he can drill grain sorghum and small grain so he can do a better job of controlling wind erosion.

Howard and his wife, Sandra have twins, Donald Ray and Donna Kay. They live at 1903 West Ave. H in Muleshoe. They attend the First Baptist Church.

Dick is a member of Cochran County Riding Club and the Muleshoe Young Farmers.

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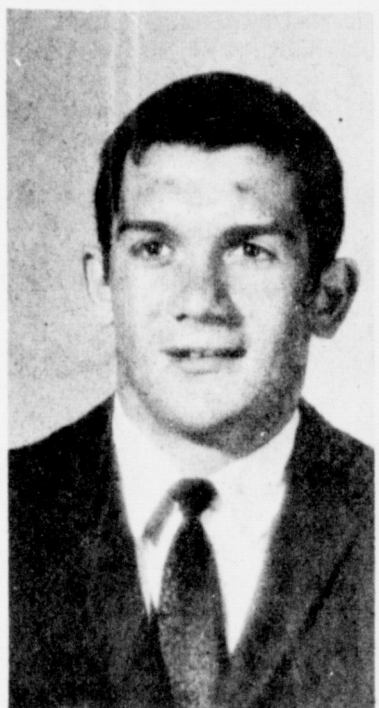

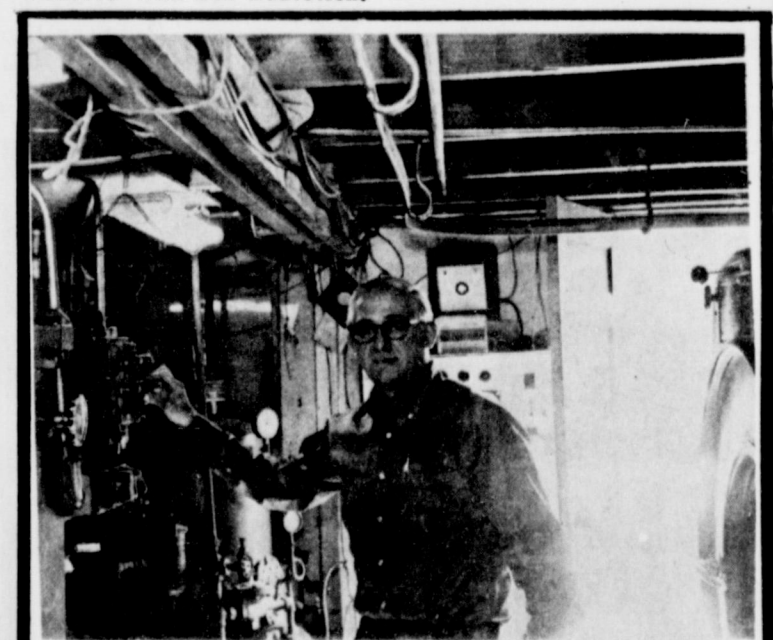

### Narcotics Studies To Begin In Schools

AUSTIN--A special project designed to integrate anti-crime and narcotics teaching into the public school curriculum beginning September 1, 1970, was approved Monday (January 5) by the State Board of Education.

The 20-month project, which will outline a detailed blueprint for the future, will be directed by the Texas Education Agency. It has immediate and long term objectives, both types keyed to the requirements written into law by the 61st Legislature.

First, the Agency and cooperating groups will develop curricula and teaching materials on the dangers of crime and narcotics for grades five through twelve. Special in-service training for 2,000 teachers will begin in February.

A long range framework for field testing more permanent methods and materials will be developed by May 1, 1971. These model programs will be tested in public schools across the state during the 1971-71 school year.

The models will be developed by representatives of colleges and universities, local school districts, the 20 regional education service centers, and interested community groups working together. Pilot testing of six model programs will be completed by May, 1972.

The overall program follows a format developed by National Leadership Methods, a non-profit, Austin-based firm directed by Robert T. (Sonny) Davis. National Leadership Methods, specialists in staff development and leadership training, developed its crime and narcotics education program in 1968. It has been tested on 50,000 adults and students in Texas schools.

The NLM program places its key focus on the laboratory method of learning. First, its staff members work with 10 percent of the students in a school. These students, along with teachers who have had the same training, then work with the other 90 percent to solve a particular problem.

A modified version, which will place adults in the leadership role and utilize more audio visual aids, is being developed for grades five through seven.

Pilot projects will be worked out and tested under the direction of the six Educational Personnel Development Act consortia in Texas. The consortia coordinators, experienced in all phases of education, are now working with the universities, regional service centers, and public schools to help solve a number of problems.

Interested citizens in the community, including physicians, lawyers, pharmacists, law enforcement officers, and parents will be asked to work closely with students in their hometown schools as the program continues.

Funds for the 20-month special project will be requested from a variety of sources. The Texas Legislature appropriated no money to implement the bill during its first two years of operation. The \$753,420 proposed budget includes pilot project planning costs, Agency Austin and field staff expenses, training laboratories, and a 25-minute color movie film to be used in the schools.

Money for field testing the pilot projects and putting the best types into operation throughout the state by 1973 will be budgeted later.

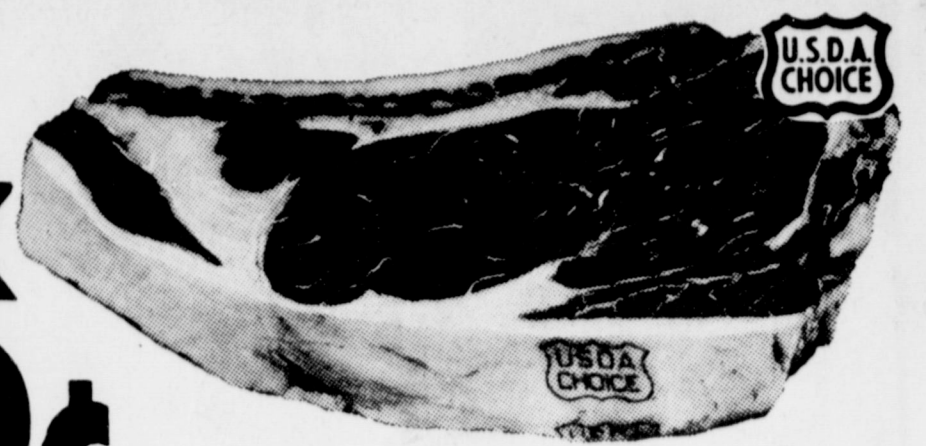
