## NEW HIGAWAY DESIGNATED FOR CALLAHAN COUNTY

Through the efforts of the Com missioners' Court and the citizens of Callaban County, the State Highway
Department has recently made Department has recently made
deeignation on Highway No. 23 deaignation on Highwway No. 23 , running north and souxh Chroug County.
The new designation puts 23 from Cross Plains north to Motan by the way of Putnam. This act of the Highway Department ennneets the Putnam and Moran shallow oil felds direetly with the Crose Plains area As aoon as funde are available it ie the bope of County Judge Victor B Gilbert that a hard-surfaced high way will be built on this route.
Judge Gulbert is Secretary of the recently formed Texas Road Main tenance Association and he is anxious to see a large attendance, not only from Weet Texas, but from all parts of Texas, at the next meeting of the Association, which will be beld at San Angelo, December 3rd and 4th.
The purpose of the Association to foster the proper maidtenance of the designated and lateral roads of the State. It was organized at a conference of county judges, county commissioners and road foremen and supervisors, called by Highway Com. missioner Joe Burkett, at 8 weetwater, last month.

We are anxious to interest the laity of Texas in the movement for better rosd maintenance,", said Judge Gilibert. "The Association is not simply for those whose activities and duties bring them actively in road development. We want to urge es-
pecially Chambers of Commerce pecially Chambers of Commerce
Presidents; and Secretaries to join the Association, and to attend the San Angelo meeting.
