BIBLE QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY THE VOICE OF PROPHECY

Question—Please give full particulars about Lent as found in the Bible.
Answer—The word "Lent" simply means spring. It is a spring period of fasting, lasting forty days—from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Lent is not mentioned in the Bible.
Q.—Do we have any Bible record of a Gentile being baptized?
A.—The Ethiopian—Acts 8:26-39. Cornelius, the Italian—Acts 10. Possibly others—Acts 16:15, 33; 18:8.
Q.—What do those outlandish beasts in Daniel 7 mean?
A.—Verse 23 says: "The fourth beast shall be the fourth kingdom upon the earth"; therefore, the first beast must symbolize the first kingdom, and so on. Today we also use animals as symbols of nations—the lion for Britain, the bear for Russia, etc.
Q.—I saw a picture of the cross with the letters I. N. R. I. on it. What do they mean?
A.—They are the initials of four Latin words—Jesus Nazarenus, Rex Judaeorum (Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews)—words from the superscription written by Pilate in three languages and placed upon the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. (John 19:19.)
Q.—Are dogs and cats mentioned in the Bible?
A.—Dogs are, but cats are not. Some texts about dogs are: Exodus 11:7; Judges 7:5; Matthew 15:27.
Q.—Why are the Ten Commandments different in Deuteronomy 5:6-21 from what they are in Exodus 20:3-17?
A.—The original Ten Commandments as spoken by God and written by Him on two tables of stone are found in Exodus 20. The form found in Deuteronomy 5 is a recapitulation given by Moses forty years later in which he mentions special reasons why the children of Israel should obey them.
Q.—How many resurrections does the Bible teach?
A.—In general, two resurrections—thousand years apart. The first, occurring at the second advent of Christ, is of the righteous people. The second, of the wicked, Jesus said "Marvel not at this; for the hour is coming, in which all that are in the graves shall hear His voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." John 5:28. (See also Revelation 20:1-7.)

Nation Faces Crime Rise, Says State Safety Chief

Americans are confronted with a tremendous postwar increase in crimes, traffic deaths, juvenile delinquency and racial clashes...

There are 320,000 criminals in Texas alone, he said. Crime in Texas has increased this year over last considerably more than that for the whole nation.

Crimes in the state during the first six months of 1946 increased 25 percent over the same period of 1945 in the urban areas, Garrison reported.

Predominant age of persons arrested for all kinds of crimes in 1945 was 17. It was 21 in 1946, proving—Garrison asserted—that the juvenile delinquents of the past few years have grown up and graduated into real criminals.

Texas' traffic record for the first nine months of this year is as follows, the speaker reported: 1,336 killed, compared to 980 in the same period of 1945; 46,000 seriously injured; \$48,000,000 in property loss.

One person out of every 23 in the U. S. is a criminal, Garrison said, adding that the files of the FBI were his authority. Only about 20,000 of these 6,000,000 criminals are confined to penitentiaries.

Volume of traffic on highways is practically as great as in the peak year of 1941, when 40,000 persons were killed in road accidents. This nation will have 50,000 to 70,000 such fatalities annually, unless citizens do some sound and serious thinking, Colonel Garrison asserted.

Word received from Pfc. Eddie V. Nigar, who is stationed in Alaska with the Army Ground Forces Arctic Winter testing unit, asserts that winter has really arrived there.

Located less than a hundred miles from the Arctic Circle at Ladd Field near Fairbanks, the task force expects temperatures to plunge as low as 66 degrees below zero and snow which will exceed 60 inches during the winter months.

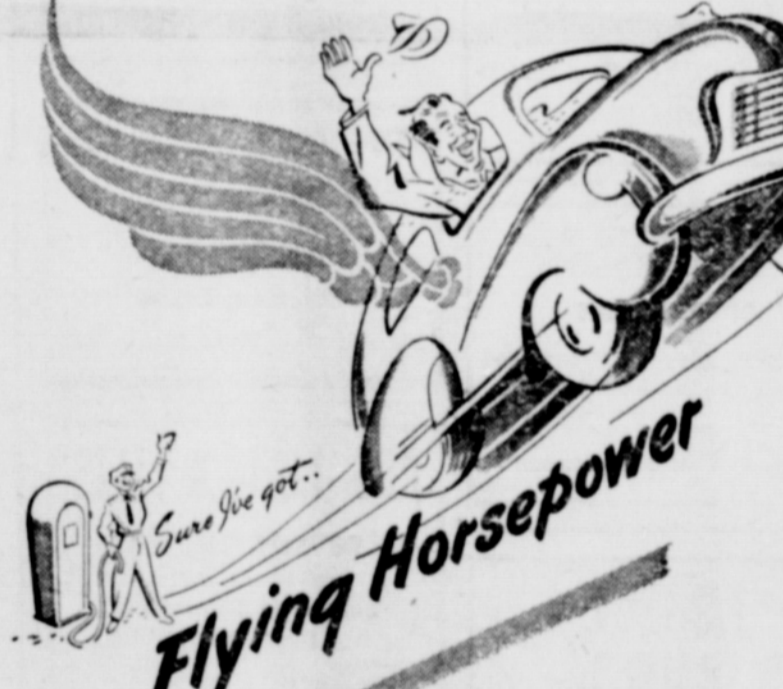
