A school receiving State aid must be well located an a plat of ground not less than one acre in extent properly drained and suitably laid out. The district must have a building substaatially meeting the equirements of the State schoo house building law. Each school must be provided with neccessary desks, seăts and, blackboard, and with such library, books, maps and globes as recommended in the State ourse of Study; the teachers emploved must submit to the State Sup't satistactory evidence of pro essional training and successfn experience, the school must have an enrollment of not more than 300 . and the attendance record for the previaus year mest not be less than 50 per cent of the entire time-of school was in session, and not less than 75 per cent for the year during whicb aid mav be given. The school must not be located in a city o town of more than 1000 population
as shown by che last Federal Census. The district must have I voted and be collecting a 50 ct \} local school tax on on the $\$ 100$ valuation; pra-
