HICO VS. CROSS PLAINS.

Hico and Cross Plains were pitted against each other in a two series game of baseball on the local diamond Monday, one game being called at 10 a. m. and one at 3:30 p. m. Good crowds were present to witness both games and lovers of baseball had come from Baird, the Star, and all the surrounding country towns. Those that came expected to see a game whereof all West Texas had have rung, in the which they were somewhat disappointed, save in the work done by the visitors, who put one (two) by the home team in great style, winning in a score of 6 to 3 and 18 to 18 respectively. Batteries for the morning game: Hico, Flinn and Sellers and Hester; Cross Plains, Anderson and Clark. For the afternoon game: Hico, Scott and Hester; Cross Plains, Buchan and Clark.

In the first part of the morning game Sellers, catcher for Hico, received an injury in his left ankle that put him out of the game and will keep him on one leg for a week or two, when Andy Foster who was stealing home from third ran into him. In this game Anderson made five men lay down the stick, whereas Flynn for Hico give ten the pleasure of doing the same. Hico got a fewer number of hits on Buck than did Cross Plains on Flynn, but the latter had them better scattered. This game would have been 3 to 3 save for an error on the part of Anderson who threw an infield ball to third when there were two outs, when he should have thrown it to first. Scott for Hico parked two balls, Cross Plains parked none.

Of the second game, the less there is said the better. Hico found Buck and landed on him good and proper. In fact, to park a ball became an epidemic to which none of the Hico bunch seemed to be immune. Luke Clark and Anderson of the home team also fell victims.

The playing was clean and no rangling. The Hico boys play fine ball and more than that they are a nice bunch that reflect credit upon the game. J. M. Vickery, who lived here two years ago when the town was new, came along as a visitor.
