## Here's a motorcycle hearse

At 46, Al Skinner of Lancaster, Pa., says he hasn't given dying much thought. But when he goes, he wants to roar out to his gravesite on a chromeplated Harley-Davidson.

To that end, Skinner has custombuilt a motorcycle sidecar strong enough and large enough to carry a casket.

It is believed to be the country's only "motorcycle hearse" of its type.

Skinner, who insists the idea isn't as crazy as it sounds, doesn't plan to wait until he dies to put the motorcycle to use.

For \$300 — plus mileage of \$1 per mile — he will make it available to others, promising "the ultimate ride for motorcycle enthusiasts or those in search of an extraordinary farewell."

## **Robbers earn the money**

Not satisfied with the amount of money they found in a Starbucks safe, two Monroe, Wash., robbers allegedly went to work filling coffee orders and pocketing the proceeds.

The pair donned Starbucks aprons and served 18 to 25 unsuspecting customers over a half-hour period, then fled with an undisclosed amount of cash, Cmdr. Rick Dunn said.

Police in this town located about 25 miles northeast of Seattle have appealed for information from early-morning drive-in customers and Starbucks is offering a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the robbers.



# Parker case not among grand-jury actions

JOURNAL STAFF REPORT A Bailey County grand jury met Wednesday, but no action was announced in regard to the controversial drug charge in-

volving Chad Parker of Muleshoe. District Attorney Johnny Actkinson could not be reached

Friday for comment on the issue. Parker's family has been collecting signatures on a petition protesting practices by certain officers within the Muleshoe Police Department. Most of the indictments handed down were for third DWIs. Others include:

• José Vásquez Reyes of Muleshoe, accused of aggravated assault involving a threat against Francisco Efraín Arzola with an 8-inch knife on Feb. 28;

## Cornyn carries Senate campaign to Bailey County

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn, the Republican candidate to succeed U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, was in Muleshoe on Wednesday for a brief speech on the courthouse grounds and a fund-raiser at the Bailey County Coliseum.


His Democratic opponent is Ron Kirk, former mayor of Dallas.

At the courthouse, Cornyn stressed some of the main points of his Texas Values Tour — values he said are expressed in towns like Muleshoe.

He said he would be an advocate of a strong national defense, including fighting to protect U.S. borders. Americans had recently "been lulled into thinking the world wasn't a dangerous place, but 9-11 woke us up," he said.

He also said he would keep America's promise to its senior citizens by working to make sure Social Security benefits were not cut during reform efforts.

And he said he supports tort reform to stop "frivolous lawsuits" or "legislation by litigation," adding that the temporary tax cuts need to be permanent and the inheritance tax ended.

The new farm bill soon will be a reality, with major changes in policy, paperwork and production practices in store for the nation's agriculture.

# Invasion of moths will run its course, pest expert says

#### JOURNAL STAFF REPORT

A local pest espert says that as annoying as the area's current infestation of moths can be, it is a natural phenomenon that should end soon.

Monti Vandiver, recently appointed by Texas Cooperative Extension as the integrated pest-management agent for Bailey and Parmer counties, said the "miller moth" being seen in the area is the adult form of the army cutworm.

"Control of these moths is very difficult," Vandiver said. "Direct spray contact gives the best results, but the treatment must be repeated.

"Light' management may help," he added. "Keep outside lights around doorways and windows to a minimum, draw the curtains and keep unused inside lights off."

Warmer weather soon will drive the moths into the Rockies, he said, before they return to the Plains in late summer to mate and lay their eggs, Vandiver said. for Panhandle producers?

"This will be a great opportunity for producers to get a first look at provisions of the farm bill," said Steve Amosson, Extension economist at Amarillo said of a similar meeting scheduled there. "There will be commodity reaction panels to point out the strengths, weaknesses and opportunities they see in the new bill," he added.

concerns, the impact of the farm bill on commodity prices, loan stipulations, and World Trade Organization issues.

The farm bill was approved by the Senate Wednesday and reportedly will be signed by President Bush on May 13.

It represents two years of work by U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, and others. "I urge the president to sign the farm bill soon," Combest said last week.

#### Dear Editor,


Can Randall Terry be considered peaceful when he uses violence to prevent women from entering clinics?



Then we'll get these clergy-types together, have a "preach off," and then the assembled clerics will vote on the winner who will then be commissioned to finish his sermon. Then, you see, when Mother's Day rolls around, all the churches and preachers could meet somewhere for worship together (which is probably what we ought to be doing all the time anyway if we weren't so hardheaded-I mean, theologically careful) and the winner of the Muleshoe Area Mother's Day Sermon Contest can preach his masterful homily to the whole wad of us. I guess it will never happen, but it makes perfectly good sense to me.

Anyway, what I'll share with you now, in a Mother's Day vein, is a little piece I wrote for a little gift book on moms that my brother and a good friend and I are writing together. Here goes:




