Norman Weatherford Pitches Near No Hitter, Raiders Win 5th Straight

CLYDE — The Clyde Raiders, now 9-2 on the season, won their 4th and 5th straight games last week as they downed the Bob Lilly Cowboys 16-3 last Wednesday in Clyde. They edged Merkel 3-2 Tuesday night of this week in Stan Musial League action.

In the Cowboy game, the Raiders trailed 0-3 after three

innings, where a home run shot from Rusty Stovall awakened the sleeping giant and they went on to score 8 runs in that inning, and coasted to victory as they outthrew the outmanned Cowboys 14-5. Jim Hale started on the mound for the Raiders and got the victory. Wilbur Nettleton pitched the last two innings and retired the six men he faced without a hit. Leading the hitting parade for the Raiders were Bud Howe with 3 and Jim Hamilton, Steve Allen and Rusty Stovall with two each.

Tuesday night, the Raiders played Merkel and started two players who suited up for the first time, and both immediately won the approval of each Raider. The two we have reference to are Randy Clark and Norman Weatherford. Clark walked once and hit safely the other two times he batted for a 2 for 2 performance. He had the only Raider hit for three innings, his second hit scored the go-ahead run and moments later he scored the winning run on a double by Weatherford, who was thrown out attempting to stretch it into a triple.

The Raiders have been a little concerned about their pitching but the performance of Weatherford brought a few smiles and they have yet to see what Randy Clark, a pitcher also, can do.

The Merkel game was a beautiful pitching duel as Merkel's Bill Whisenunt allowed only six hits, walked two and struck out 10. Weatherford was more brilliant as he allowed only one hit, walked three and registered 3 strike-outs. He was only one out away from a no-hitter as the only hit came with two outs in the 7th inning. The fact that really makes his performance so great is that he has not pitched in a baseball game since July 29, 1968.

Next action for the Raiders will be in the Ranger Tournament July 9, 10 and 11, playing the Abilene Jets Saturday at 2 p. m.

Next week they play Lawn at 6:30 at Abilene Rose Park, and on Tuesday and Wednesday they play Cooper High School.

SON OF CLYDE RESIDENT KILLED IN VIETNAM ACTION

CLYDE — Funeral for James Michael Young, 20, killed on active duty in Vietnam June 26 was held at 10 a. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church in Clyde, with Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor, officiating.

Burial, with full military honors, was held at 5 p. m. Tuesday at Restland Memorial Park

in Dallas under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Young apparently was killed in a helicopter crash in Vietnam while serving as a helicopter gunner, although details are still unknown.

Mr. Young was born August 12, 1950 in Sherman. He moved to Abilene in 1954 and attended Lincoln Junior High and Cooper High school in Abilene, and Clyde High School.

He was employed in Dallas until his induction into the Army in August 1970. He received basic training at Ft. Polk, La., and attended helicopter gunner school at Fort Rucker, Ala. He was assigned to Vietnam Feb. 2, 1971.

Survivors are his father, Doyle B. Young of Clyde; his mother, Mrs. Billy F. Allison of Dallas; a brother, Jerry Young of Mineral Wells; a sister, LaJuana Knight of Dallas; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Cloree Eldredge of Saddle, and numerous other relatives.

Truck Wreck Kills El Paso Man

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that in Interstate Commerce Commission Drought Order would permit railroads to ship hay at reduced rates into the following counties: Armstrong, Briscoe, Callahan, Concho, Deaf Smith, Falls, Hood, Limestone, McLennan, Moore, Parker, Potter, Randall, Runnels, Sutton, Tarrant and Williamson.

The Congressman explained the Order was made by reason of drought conditions existing in these areas for reduced rates for those persons designated as being in distress and in need of relief by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, or by such State agents or agencies as may be designated by the Agriculture Department, to assist in relieving the distress caused by the drought.

Farmers Home Administration Has Record Year of Service

COLEMAN — A record year of credit service to the rural people in Coleman, Runnels and Callahan Counties was announced today by Foy I. Brown, local county supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Brown said \$771,700.00 was channeled into the area through loans for housing, purchasing of farms and operating expenses. At the end of the fiscal year, the outstanding loan balance in the Coleman unit had climbed to nearly \$3.5 million dollars and was providing benefits to more than 200 families.

We expect, Mr. Brown stated, a sharp uptrend in rural housing since this is the first year that the people in the City of Coleman have been eligible for assistance through Farmers Home Administration. Eligibility covers people of low and moderate income, including sen-

ior citizens, in rural towns of not more than 10,000 population, plus farm and nonfarm residents of the countryside.

Farmers Home Administration loan services are carried on in the Coleman, Runnels and Callahan Counties through the Agency's office located in the Rhone Building, 112 North Concho Street, Coleman, Texas.

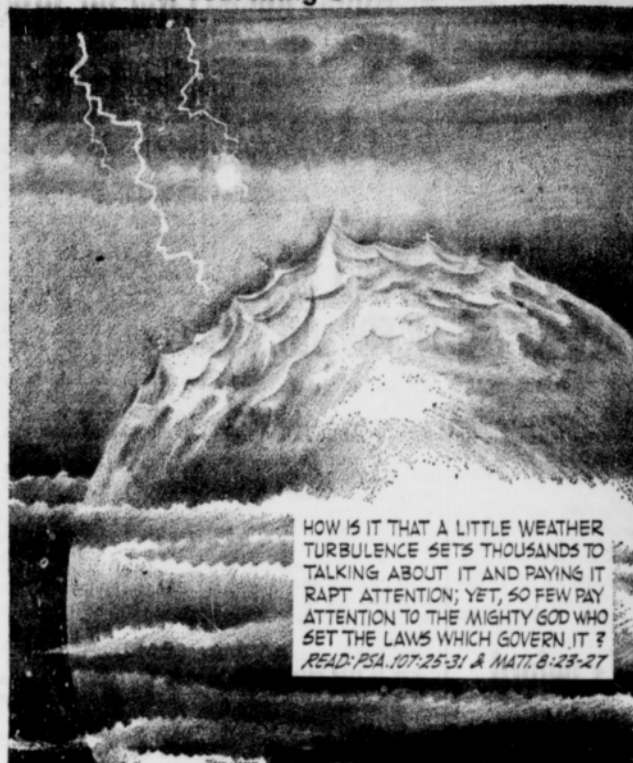

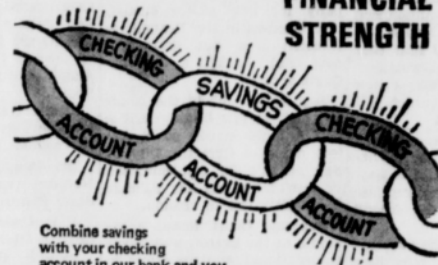

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Gov. Preston Smith, in an unprecedented veto action, turned the job of re-writing the entire 1973 state budget to a special legislative session next year.

Smith took the axe to \$3.1 billion in state spending which he found "unnecessary and unwarranted" for the second half of the biennium. He announced his decision on a statewide television program, and said that he will submit to the lawmakers, before September 1972, a new 1973 budget proposal which will require no new taxes.

Smith made it clear that a 1972 special session is inevitable, anyway, because the Legislature did not appropriate welfare funds for the second year.

Governor's action may accomplish the following regardless of whether a new tax bill can be avoided next year (Texas Research League estimates a \$474 million biennial tax bill will be required in the 1972 special session):

Legislators will have to take a sober second look at spending items in an election year when many are faced with general election contests.

Fact that little additional federal aid is available for welfare spending, in spite of predictions by Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and others, will be partially obscured, since the special session will not be confined to welfare alone but opened to the entire area of government spending for 1973.

Smith declined to reveal his future political plans but left dangling the prospect of a third term race.

Governor claims the public response has been almost 100 per cent favorable to his historic veto. Lieutenant Governor

and House Speaker Gus Mutscher pledged cooperation.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court, in a five-four decision, held that an insurance company can't fight its policyholders in suits against uninsured motorists except in unusual situations.

A man fired by an oil company in not getting enough new business in the Beaumont-Houston area was granted a new trial through a Supreme Court order.

High Court upheld the county court at law finding that a San Antonio woman could collect damages from the City of San Antonio for condemnation of her land and for damage to property due to erosion.

Supreme Court heard arguments in the Braniff and Texas International Airways effort to ground the new Southwest Airlines (Dallas, Houston, San Antonio routes).

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the death penalty of a man convicted for a 1967 knife murder of a Baylor University coed and ordered a new trial.

Trial of former San Marcos Police Chief Waymon Dial, for burglary, has been transferred to Harris County.

AG OPINIONS — Texas Water Quality Board may contract for the state with the federal government for federal grants or loans under the federal water pollution control act - subject to a 60-day limitation and the governor's approval - Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

El Paso can contract with the Council of Governments for a recreation area partly within the city limits, partly in the county and partly in Dona Ana

county, New Mexico.

National Guard Armory Board has authority to determine the lowest and best bid and best interest of the state on armory construction which involves unknown factors on a fixed bid, price and congressional factors.

Concentrated Employment Project federal funds are not subject to auditing procedures applicable to county funds.

A city fireman, on returning from military leave, is entitled to credit for the time spent in service, in figuring city payroll longevity.

Where the legislature has made specific lump sum appropriations, for hourly wages, the head of a state agency to whom an appropriation is made has the discretion to fix the hourly rate of pay.

APPOINTMENTS — James L. Lindsey of College Station, long-time newspaperman in Midland, San Angelo and San Antonio, was named by Governor Smith to succeed Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin on the State Banking Board.

Emory Walton of Eastland - criminal district attorney for the county;

Dr. Hampton C. Robinson of Houston (reappointment) - to State Board of Health;

J. R. Owen of Taylor - 26th district attorney;

Jack C. McKenzie of Corpus Christi, Curtis C. Gunn of San Antonio, H. G. Andrews Jr. of Stamford, Dick McAlain of Houston, Fenner Tubbs of Lubbock and W. O. Bankston of Dallas - Texas Motor Vehicle Commission;

Harold Boyd Harvey of Lubbock - Industrial Accident Board.

Governor also named a 41-member Texas Film Commission.

District Judge Tom Davis of Vernon and Earl E. F. Dally of Houston have been appointed commissioners for the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Attorney General Martin is the new president of the National Association of Attorneys General.

Richard Keahey of Austin is now director of the Veterans Land Program and Jim Watson of Lubbock is General Land Office personnel director.

CITIES COLLECT \$35.5 MILLION — Texas cities which levy

a one per cent local option sales tax received nearly \$35.5 million from January-March collections on sales within their boundaries.

Collection for the first quarter of 1971 compared with \$39.6 million for the final quarter of 1970 and \$36.5 million for the third quarter of 1970.

More than 400 cities levy local option sales tax.

Money goes to the state comptroller and is handed back to cities of origin. During the quarter ending March 31, the state retained \$719,756 as its service fee.

INSURANCE RATE HIKE ASKED AGAIN — Auto insurance companies were expected to request rate increases of more than 25 per cent at a hearing before the State Insurance Board June 30.

Companies six months ago were granted a 14 per cent increase, but were far from happy and insisted on more. They wanted a 27 per cent boost.

A new law permits motorists to purchase deductible liability insurance if they are willing to assume the risk of the first \$250 damage their car may do to property. Another new act gives the State Insurance Board direction to promulgate rules for cancellation and non-renewal of policies.

SIX CITIES WIN CITATION — Six Texas cities received plaques as winners of governors' community achievement award.

Cities were Victoria, Trinity, Mansfield, Taylor, Lamesa and Grand Prairie. Awards went for efforts to improve the quality of living.

PARKS APPROVED — A \$538,600 project for Lake Arrow-

head State Park near Wichita Falls has been approved, with state and federal agencies splitting the cost.

Two park projects totalling \$510,400 were approved for Dallas; as were a \$274,613 land acquisition for Denton Park; a \$75,200 park land purchase in Pasadena and a \$51,200 new park purchase in Terrell.

SHORT SNORTS

Construction of a million dollars worth of new ward buildings has been started at Rusk State Hospital.

After September 1, Texas Department of Public Safety law officer recruits must have a semester's college training or agree to get it within two years after enlistment.

Texas Parent-Teachers Association board of managers went on record as opposing busing to achieve school racial balance.

Construction in the state declined for per cent in May after a rise during the last three months.

A total of 162 Texans have lost their lives in water accidents during the last six months, Texas Safety Association noted in warning that the most dangerous months for such accidents are just ahead.

State Banking Department has applications for new state banks in Richardson, Waco and Longview.

Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes announced cancellation of the trip of 1,300 Texas to Paris, Stockholm and Moscow to plead for release of American prisoners of war in Indochina, since there was very little hope of the trip's success.

THE SECT EVERYWHERE SPOKEN AGAINST

"But we desire to hear of thee what thou thinkest: for as concerning this sect, we know that everywhere it is spoken against." Acts 28:22.

The word "sect" is used in the Scriptures in a bad sense. It is used in this passage by the people to refer to the true New Testament church to which Paul belonged. The Greek word which is translated "sect" is translated "heresy" four times in the Bible. A sect was regarded as being heretical.

Webster defines the word as "a dissenting or schismatic religious body; esp: one regarded as extreme or heretical." It comes from the same root as our word "section", which means a part separated or cut off from the rest.

A "sect" then is a party separated or cut off from the true church of Christ. The true church of Christ is not, then, properly speaking, a sect. It is the body of Christ (Eph. 1:22,23) which is one (Eph. 4:4). A sect is a fragment, a section cut off from the true church. Paul says, "That there should be no schism in the body" (1 Cor. 12:25).

The Jews at Rome referred to the true church which Paul was preached as a "sect." The church was spoken against for "worshipping God contrary the laws of the fathers" (Acts 18:13). They were charged with heresy (Acts 24:14). They were charged with teaching customs which were not lawful for others to observe (Acts 16:21). They were charged with "turning the world upside down" (Acts 17:5). But such charges could not alter the facts that they constituted the one true church of Christ.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Those who have a son, husband or other loved one in Vietnam are doubly concerned on the use of dope. The dope problem among servicemen is indeed sad but the percentage of those on narcotics is not as great as might be expected from reports. The fact remains that one is too many. In a way, it can be rationalized but, of course, not condoned.

When fighting was at its height and boys were busy, there was little use of drugs. When things let down, boredom arose. You would have to be there to understand but there is need for understanding.

"In Flanders field the poppies grow, between the crosses, row on row . . ."

Written during World War I by John McCrea, an English poet-soldier, who died in the conflict, these lines have a bitter meaning today.

Poppies in that "God and Country" generation, were the symbol of an honorable death. They remain the respected badge of the fund drive for disabled veterans but a newer and more sinister connotation now infuses the flower, as young Americans return from Vietnam addicted to heroin of which the poppy is the source.

A few days ago the President called for a "new all-out offensive against drug abuse" which he described as "America's public enemy number one."

In a special message to Congress, the President asked for \$155 million in new funds to help finance the anti-drug offensive.

He said it is a "world-wide offensive" dealing with sources of supply abroad, and particularly as it involves Americans stationed overseas.

For too long the matter of discharging several thousand servicemen each month from Vietnam, some of whom are drug addicted, was largely ignored. The military and the Veterans Administration too long failed to recognize and prepare to come to grips with the situation. They are barely beginning to do so at the present time.

1000 men a month now returning from Vietnam, an estimated 10 percent have a history of heroin use. Under the plan now being inaugurated, each soldier is given a test for detection of drug use before being cleared to return home. If he is free of drug detection, he proceeds without delay. If not, he is quarantined for a few days for further tests.

Servicemen heretofore discharged with a narcotic habit may not be qualified for veterans benefits but this is expected to be corrected. In the first place, only five of all the veterans hospitals are really equipped and qualified to give treatment. Much more is needed and it is pretty safe to speculate that more will be provided. The problem is qualified people to give much needed rehabilitation in this highly specialized field of treatment.

At the moment, there are proposed cuts in Veterans Administration medical funding but this is likely to be reversed since the dimensions of the problem are just now really surfacing.

For many in the service, who must serve additional time in Vietnam and in other areas of the world, more efforts are being made to control the source of drugs but, like in this Country, it is impossible to completely dry up the supply. Greater and more expert detection is needed. It is not exclusively a problem in South Vietnam. It exists every place but the cheaper drugs and a ready supply are peculiar to Southeast Asia. The lack of cooperation with the governments involved is a serious problem. It should and is being pressed upon these governments to lend their official efforts to reduce the cheap supply. The trouble is that the horse has been too long out of the barn.

The greatest sympathy and understanding, as well as rehabilitation and treatment must be provided for returning servicemen who have become victims of the narcotic habit.
