Latest reports from the hospital state that he is in a critical condition and attending doctors offer little hope for his recovery. "Sonny" was reared in the Cross Cut community. He was valedictorian of the local high school graduating class in 1951, and only the week before the accident received the honor of being named the outstanding student of Tarleton State College, Stephenville, where he was named Cadet Colonel for next year. He was to have returned to college on Monday of this week for the summer session. He has been a credit to his family, school, and community and is loved by all who know him. This department is asking the citizens of this community to include "Sonny" in their prayers, for it seems that only Divine healing from God can bring him through now.

## Russell Wright, Injured In Rig Accident, Is Reported In Critical Condition Today

Russell "Sonny" Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Wright, of this city, who sustained multiple fractures to both legs, a dislocated arm and bruises in a rig accident in the Cross Cut area, Friday morning of the past week, is reported to be in a critical condition in the Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene and attending physicians hold little hope for his recovery.

The accident is reported to have occurred during the early hours Friday morning, while Russell was employed by the Smale Oil Co., of Abilene. According to reports, he was struck by a joint of drillstem pipe.

He was taken to the Rising Star Hospital by Jackson Smale, owner and operator of the rig, where he received first aid and was accompanied by a nurse in a Higginbotham ambulance to the Abilene hospital, for attention of a bone specialist.

He is reported, at this time to be suffering from severe shock and complications arising from a clot traveling in his blood stream. Hospital attendants state that only time can tell the outcome of his struggle for survival, but state that due to his excellent health, it is possible that he may overcome the complications.



I will be glad to help work up a route through this area for a government rain gauge emptier, but I'm not an applicant for the actual job, I won't have time. I got the Presidential election on my hands, not to mention Korea, Europe, and my wife's naggin.
