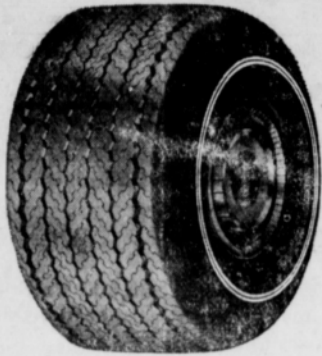

Co. Agent Warns Peanut Growers About Lesser Cornstalk Borers

BAIRD — Callahan County peanut producers are experiencing problems with the infestation of lesser cornstalk borer, which is the major peanut insect. Where the top soil is dry, we are experiencing a significant population increase and we expect this trend to continue in untreated fields until moisture is received.

Field inspection should be made before the decision to treat or not to treat is made. The base of the plant just below the soil surface should be inspected for feeding damage, larval tubes or larvae. Research indicates that irrigated peanuts should be treated when 15 percent or more of the plants are infested and 10 percent on dry land peanuts.

Under hot weather conditions on dry land peanuts, Dasanit used at the rate of one-half pound per acre in 20 gallons of water at 40 lbs. of pressure should provide control of this insect. In cooler weather, Parathion may be used at one-half to three-fourths pound per acre to control the lesser cornstalk borer. Two or three applications may be required in most cases.

Granular application of Diazinon, Dasanit or Dyfonate may be used on irrigated peanuts. Application should be watered in 48 hours or less after application.

Peanut Leaf Spot may also be a problem in areas where adequate moisture has been received recently. Fungicides should be applied in cases where leaf loss is significant to reduce yield especially in irrigated peanuts.

7 of the 14 Proposed Amendments Appearing on Election Ballot

BAIRD — Appearing in this issue are seven of the fourteen proposed Constitutional Amendments that registered voters will either For or Against in the General Election November 7, 1972. These Amendments are published for each of you to study and know on what you are voting and why. Knowing what each one means, and understanding why you are voting For or Against the Amendments, will make it easier for you to vote on election day.

The seven Amendments are published below in short form and also in advertiser's form throughout this newspaper.

Amendment No. 3
Amending Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution to require the commissioners courts in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973.

Amendment No. 4
Granting authority to the legislature to establish a constitutional revision commission which would report its recommendations no later than November 1, 1973, and providing the members of the 63rd Legislature would then be convened in January 1974 as a constitutional convention to serve 60 days for

the purpose of drafting a new constitution for submission to the voters of Texas.

Amendment No. 6
Amending Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution to provide that the various political subdivisions of the state may exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residential homesteads of all persons 65 years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions.

Amendment No. 7
Amending Article I of the Texas Constitution by adding a new Section 3a to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of a person's sex, race, color, creed, or national origin.

Amendment No. 8
Amending Article IV, Sections 4, 22, and 23, to provide four-year terms for the offices of governor, lieutenant-governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, and certain statutory state officers.

Amendment No. 12
Amending Article XVI, Sections 33 and 40, of the Texas Constitution to allow state employees and certain other persons to serve on governing bod-

ies of school districts, cities, towns, or other governmental districts with forfeiting their state salary, and otherwise to

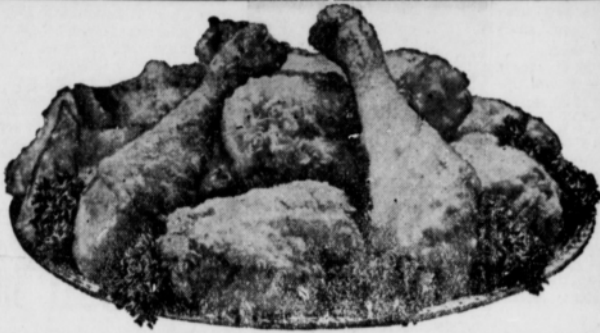

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."
