FORT WORTH — The time is approaching for the 77th Annual Fort Worth Stock Show to begin, on January 26 thru Feb. 4th. Callahan County will be well represented at this show with Baird and Clyde FFA Chapters, and Callahan County 4-H Clubs.

The Baird FFA Chapter will have 14 Hereford steers, and 4 Southdown lambs at this annual show. Clyde FFA will show two Hereford steers, nine Polled Hereford steers, and one Polled Hereford heifer.

Callahan County 4-H will be showing six Charolais steers, and four Hereford heifers. The Stock Show is anticipated to be entered. Total premiums for the livestock and horse show and Fort Worth Rodeo are over \$260,000.

An added treat to visitors at the Stock Show will be the Nashville sound of LeRoy Van Dyke and the Auctioneers at each of the 30 performances of the Rodeo. Van Dyke will be singing his full-time hits, Auctioneer and Walk On By, plus other favorite country and western tunes.

Adult Farmer Pasture Short Course At Baird Ag. Building

BAIRD — A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held Jan. 15-18, under the sponsorship of the Baird High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Bill Gunn, Superintendent, and Mr. Dick Vestal, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Nix holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M, and has also done work in Agronomy at A&M. He has had nineteen years of field experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Nix and all have met with outstanding success," according to Mr. Ralph Moser, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville. Arrangements for adult education short courses in pasture and in other fields are made through Mr. Moser's office.

The short course at Baird High School is scheduled to begin Jan. 15, at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Jan. 16, 17 & 18. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide one the farm in-

struction, according to Mr. Vestal.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Bill Gunn, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Dick Vestal. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legume fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profits from their pastures.

"Short courses a pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," stated Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Electric Wiring and Safety, Farm Electric Motors, Farm Arc Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Oxy-Acetylene Welding, and Pasture.

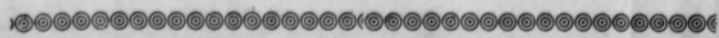

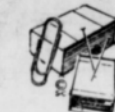

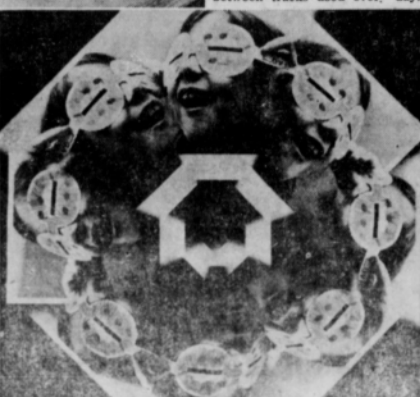

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Texas legislators, with new leadership in both houses and a swarm of first-term members, report here Jan. 9 for their expected history-making regular session.

They face a mountain of problems, the magnitude of some still unmeasured. Revising the present method of financing public school education stands at the top of the list -- depending on a U. S. Supreme Court ruling yet to come.

If the High Court upholds a three-judge federal court ruling in San Antonio just over a year ago, lawmakers are under orders to revise the present system which is keyed to property taxes. A reversal could allow more time, but the State Board of Education is expected to vote January 13 for a complete state financing of basic education costs spread over a period of several years, regardless of the Supreme Court decision.

Lawmakers are hopeful of avoiding a major tax fight, but again the school finance case may completely upset these hopes.

Among other major items for legislators' consideration are these:

Reform of the legislative process and state government in general, including a new code of ethics law, a revised lobby control act and revision of campaign finance reporting requirements.

Overhaul of state election laws to provide a new method of financing party primaries and possibly moving voting dates for primaries.

Court reform. Reducing the legislative and congressional redistricting of 1971.

POLLUTION MAJOR JOB — Atty. Gen.-elect John Hill assigned top priority in his new administration to tackling a heavy backlog of pollution cases.

Hill said he also plans heavy emphasis on consumer protection, including a fresh package of legislation in the field, and combatting organized crime through a special five-member task force of attorneys.

The incoming Attorney General said pollution not only damages the quality of life but is a serious economic factor, especially along the industrialized Gulf Coast.

He pledged to seek accelerated docketing of the air and water pollution cases, quicker filing of new cases submitted by state agencies and fast prosecution by his staff.

CAMPUS TROUBLED — An "extremely volatile" situation on the campus of the University of Texas at El Paso led to sudden appointment of a new president there.

Dr. Arleigh B. Templeton was dispatched to the troubled campus from the new UT-San Antonio which had been picked earlier to serve as president. UT regents confirmed the selection in an emergency session. Dr. Joseph Smiley resigned on November 1 as UT-El Paso president.

The U. S. Justice Department advised UT Chancellor Dr. Charles LeMaistre corrective

steps were needed at El Paso to prevent a campus tragedy sparked by demonstrations against the administration.

PARK PLANS MOVE ON — Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, over protest of some landowners, plans to add another 550 acres to the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park along the Pedernales River near the former president's ranch.

The P-W Commission also approved buy 554 acres at Bryan Beach, two miles southeast of Freeport in Brazoria County for a third Gulf Coast Beach Park.

A master plan for development of Mustang Island as a state park is being prepared and is expected to be presented to the Commission in about two months.

Meanwhile, Dallas County commissioners ordered a study to determine possibility of converting 603 acres of federally-owned land at Seagoville into a state park.

APPOINTMENTS — Charles G. Purnell of Dallas has been named as executive assistant and chief advisor to Gov.-elect Dolph Briscoe.

New Attorney General Hill picked Larry York of Houston as his executive assistant and Mary Jane Bode of Austin as his press secretary.

B. R. Fuller was named by Gov. Preston Smith as executive director of the Department of Community Affairs in the governor's office. He has served as city manager of Eagle Pass and San Marcos.

Charles Freeman of Pleasanton was reappointed by Smith to the Evergreen Underground Water Conservation District.

GAS ORDER EXPECTED — A Railroad Commission order setting priorities for use of natural gas when supplies are short is due to be entered by mid-January.

At a hearing here November 30, two Commission officers examined views on gas curtailment. They later made recommendations (as yet not disclosed) to the three-member Commission. Opposition to a state-wide standard of priorities was expressed at the hearing. Testimony was also offered in favor of granting priorities to homes, schools and hospitals in time of drastic shortage.

INAUGURAL DINNER SET — Democrats will celebrate inauguration of Governor Briscoe and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby at a combination fund-raising and party victory dinner Jan. 15.

The \$25 a plate dinner will offer entertainment by Danny Davis and the Nashville Brass and talks by Briscoe, Hobby and new National Democratic Chairman Robert Straus. State Democratic Chairman Calvin Guest of Bryan will be master of ceremonies.

AG OPINIONS — Local political subdivisions may call for elections on granting homestead property tax exemptions (not less than \$3,000) to persons over 65 on petition of 20 per cent of voters. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In another recent opinion, Matria concluded that the State Air Control Board is among three state agencies having res-

ponsibility for feedlot waste stockpiling, along with Texas Water Quality Board and the Texas State Department of Health.

SHORT SNORTS

The State Supreme Court held tavern owners can own more than a single vending machine and don't have to pay a \$300 annual tax on each.

Tires must be inspected under an amendment to the mandatory annual auto inspection requirement starting January 1.

New House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. proposed a rule which would allow news reporters brief contacts with representatives at their desks on the House floor.

Texas is one of 31 states which has hired a Washington law firm to oppose federal cuts in welfare assistance involving ineligible persons on aid rolls.

Texas Education Agency pointed to a 2.8 per cent cut in the drop-out rate of migrant students in 1972.

State Securities Commissioner Roy Mauer revoked registration of Union National Securities Inc. of San Antonio, a dealer in government and municipal bonds.

Prison inmates surveyed in a new study claimed incarceration is not a deterrent to crime.

A state bank charter application has been filed for Mansfield, Tarrant County.
