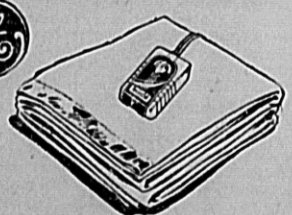

**Bangs Wins 18 To 0  
Over Cross Plains  
Last Friday Night**

Although equally potent in ground gaining, Cross Plains Buffaloes came off with the short end of an 18 to nothing score in a conference football game with the Bangs Dragons, there, Friday night.

The home team tallied in the first, third and fourth quarters, with Arlan Sikes, Dragon back, doing all the scoring. Without Sikes the Bangs team would have been easy victims of the Buffalo grid-ers, who neared the pay zone on three occasions only to see their efforts fall short of the pay-off.

While Bangs won the game, Cross Plains found consolation in the fact that in most every department of the game statistics showed the Buffaloes stronger. In the matter of first downs the local athletes piled up 13 to 12 for the victors. Cross Plains had a net gain rushing of 152 yards to 136 for Bangs. The Buffaloes threw 14 passes connecting on six for a total of 57 yards, as compared with 52 yards gained through the air by Bangs.



Joe Naylor of San Antonio has made an outstanding success as a publisher. Some of the books bearing the Naylor imprint have achieved great sales and have received prizes from such far-away journals as the New York Herald-Tribune, to name one.

But not from the Dallas News. Lon Tinkle, the college professor who edits the News' book page, seems to have a policy of ignoring Naylor books or "damning with faint praise."

Which leads up to an incident this summer at the Writers Conference in Corpus Christi where Tinkle told of a visit to New York, where he was introduced to Harold Ross, editor of that clever and sophisticated magazine, The New Yorker. Ross acknowledged the introduction (said Tinkle) with:

"If you are from Texas, where is your manuscript?"

And then Ross said in substance, "Texas is writing and producing perhaps more good books than any other part of the country."

Tinkle having completed his story, then presented different notables to the Writers' Conference. When he presented Naylor, the publisher responded with a verbal punch that, in prize-ringing parlance, he "brought up from the floor." In a tone that sizzled with sarcasm, Naylor said:

"It should not have been necessary for you, Mr. Tinkle, a book page editor, to have to go all the way to New York to find out that good books are being written and published in Texas."

The audience gasped, then laughed and applauded. Tinkle staggered back as though the words had been a blow.

That round, at any rate, was Naylor's.

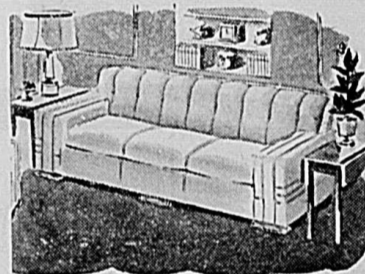

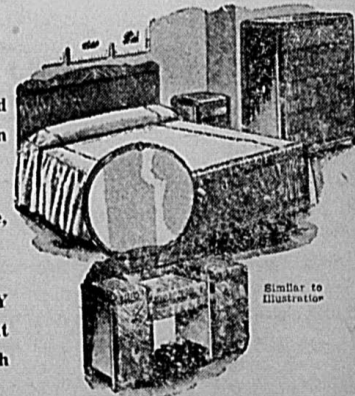

### Activity Reported In New Production Area For Callahan

Completion of one new producer and the promise of another was given the recently opened Cook sand production area of Callahan County, near Clyde, last week.

Final completion for an official gauge of 82 barrels of 44 gravity oil in 20 hours was made on the Reno Oil Company No. 1 Hardy Grissom, a south offset to the discovery well, 330 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east line of the west 135 acres of section 79 BBB&C survey.

The production was through 8-64 choke with 300 pounds on casing and 30 on tubing from open hole in the Cook sand at 1,631-87 feet.

Promising additional production is the Reno Oil Company No. 3 Hardy Grissom, a second south extended, 710 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east line of the same tract. It topped the Cook sand at 1,693 and was drilled to 1,711.

Drillstem test of the top part of the section showed gas with only a small amount of oil, while drill stem test of the lower part, from 1,706-11 feet, showed gas to surface in one and a half minutes and a heavy spray of oil in 10 minutes. Casing was cemented at 1,706 feet and the completion will be from that point to 1,711.

Rig has been moved to the location for an offset extension to the second producer, the Fresno Oil

Company No. 1 Hardy Grissom, 330 feet from the north and west lines of the east 65 acres of section 79 BBB&C survey.

West of the discovery well, Ungren & Frazier were drilling with cable tools below 1,570 feet on other extension try, the No. M. Morrisett, 330 feet from south and east lines of the half of the southeast quarter section 67 block 14 T&P survey.



### Local Man Accepts Place On Committee For Re-Districting

C. R. Cook, of this city, accepted appointment to the State Advisory Council of the Texas Committee for Redistricting, committee chairman John Ben Shepperd has announced from state headquarters in Dallas.

Shepperd, former president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, disclosed that a number of Texans have already agreed to serve on the advisory council. A non-political organization, the Texas Committee For Redistricting was established to enlist popular support for passage of Amendment Two on the general election ballot in the November 2 election.

"Amendment Two is one of the most important amendments ever to come before the voters of Texas," Shepperd stated. "It will end the undemocratic situation whereby many counties are today denied fair representation in the state Legislature."

Amendment Two provides for a board of five to redistrict Texas according to population after each Federal census if the legislature fails to do so as directed by the state constitution.

Texas has not been redistricted in 27 years Shepperd pointed out. In that time many counties have grown tremendously in population but have never received a corresponding increase in representation in the legislature.

Regular redistricting is the best method of assuring fair representation for all counties Shepperd declared in urging passage of Amendment Two.

**RULES OF ELECTION**

(Cont'd. from page one)

oath touching the points of objection and when the rights of any elector to vote is challenged, the judge of election shall refuse to accept such vote of such elector unless in addition to his own oath, he proves by the oath of a sworn and known resident of the ward that he is a qualified voter at such election and at such a ward, and when such vote is accepted, the word "challenged" shall be written on the ballot and the judge shall cause the clerk of election to make a minute of the name of the elector and the party testifying under oath as to his qualification.

When a ballot is delivered to a voter, the judge shall stamp on the tax receipt or certificate of exemption the words voted—day of—19—

If a voter is unable to prepare the ballot himself because of bodily infirmity, two judges having first been sworn may assist him but they must not suggest by word or other manner how such voter shall vote.

All defective ballots shall be placed in Box No. 4.

**Counting Of Ballots**

At the expiration of one hour after voting has begun, the receiving judges shall deliver ballot box No. 1 to the counting judges who shall at once deliver in its place ballot box No. 2. Ballot box No. 1 shall be immediately opened and the contents taken out one by one at which time they shall be read and distinctly announced while the ticket remains in hand and the name of each candidate voted thereon shall be noted on the tally sheet, and the ballot shall then be placed in box No. 3, which shall remain locked and in view until the counting is finished, when said box shall be returned with the other boxes. Ballot Box Nos. 1 and 2 shall be used by the receiving judges and the counting judge alternately as above provided as often as the counting judge has counted and exhausted the ballots in either box.

No election officer shall unfold or examine the face of a ballot when receiving from an elector, except to examine the signature of the judge endorsed on the back thereof.

The counting judges and clerks shall count no ballot where two or more are folded together or that does not bear the judge's signature or is unnumbered or, if on examination by the judges, such signature is to be found forged. If the names of two or more persons are upon the ballot for the same office, but one person is to be elected to the office, such ballot shall not be counted for either of such persons.

The election supervisors may be present when the ballots are being examined and the votes called off and noted on the tally sheets. After the closing of the polls and at intervals of two hours after one of the election judges shall make a correct but unofficial memorandum of the total number of votes counted for each candidate and shall properly announce from such memorandum the status of the count at the door of the building where the counting is in progress. No judge, clerk, supervisor or other officer of election shall make any statement or give any information in any manner of the number of votes cast for or against any candidate or for or against any proposition submitted to the people or convey to any person his opinion regarding the state of the polls until after the closing thereof and then only as expressly provided in

**Article 3022.**

When the ballots have all been tion and presiding judge shall counted the manager of the election make out triplicate returns showing the total number of votes in such poll and the number polled for each candidate. One of the returns to go with the poll list and tally list, sealed in an envelope, to the county judge of the county. Another of said returns, together with oil list and tally list shall be delivered by one of the managers of election to the county clerk and the other of said returns, poll and tally list shall be kept by the presiding officer of the election.

**Absentee Voting**

On the day of such election, and in the presence of the election officers, and the supervisors, if any, one of the judges of election shall, between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock open the carrier envelope only, announce the elector's name and compare the signature upon the application with the signature upon the affidavit on the ballot envelope. In case the election board finds the affidavits duly executed, that the signatures correspond, that the applicant is a duly qualified elector of the precinct, and that he has not voted in person at said election, they shall open the envelope containing the elector's ballot in such manner as not to deface or destroy the affidavit thereon, take out the ballot therein contained without permitting same to be unfolded or examined and having endorsed the ballot in like manner as other ballots are required to be endorsed, deposit the same in the proper ballot box and enter the elector's name in the poll list the same as if he had been present and voted in person. If the ballot be challenged by any election officer, supervisor, party challenger, or other person, the grounds of challenge shall be heard and decided according to law, including the consideration of any affidavits submitted in support of or against such challenge. If the ballot be admitted, the words "absentee voter" shall be set down opposite the elector's name on the poll list. If the ballot be not admitted, there shall be endorsed on the back thereof the word "rejected", and all rejected ballots shall be enclosed, securely sealed, in an envelope on which words "rejected absentee ballots" have been written, together with a statement of the precinct and the date of election, signed by the judges and clerks of election and returned in the same manner as provided for the return and preservation of official ballots voted at such election.

**How To Mark A Ballot**

Art. 2981. When a voter desires to vote a ticket straight, he shall run a pencil or pen through all other tickets on the official ballot, making a distinct marked line through such ticket not intended to be voted; and when he shall desire to vote a mixed ticket he shall do so by running a line through the names of such candidates as he shall desire to vote against in the ticket he is voting, and by writing the name of the candidate for whom he desires to vote in the blank column and in the space provided for such office; same to be written with black ink or pencil, unless the names of the candidates for which he desires to vote appear on the ballot, in which event he shall leave the same not scratched.

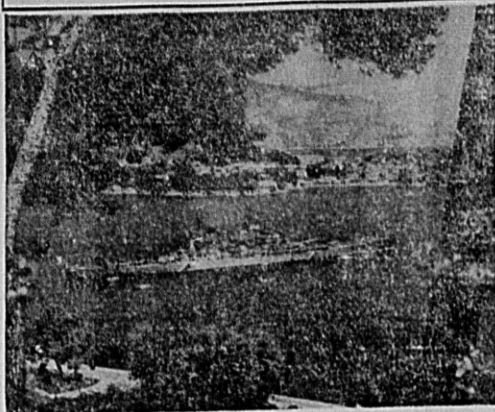

## County Agent's Column

By O. F. Werst

### Kill The Borer—

It's the peach tree borer again. He does an awful lot of damage, but it doesn't take much to stop him before he gets started. And this is the time of the year he starts working, says C. A. King, Associate Extension entomologist of Texas A&M College.

Just clear the grass and weeds from around the tree trunk and build the ground level up a little. Pour one-half pint of diluted ethylene dichloride emulsion on the ground around the mature bearing trees. For the younger trees just 2 to 4 years old, use only one-fourth pint, and cover the liquid with a few shovelfuls of dirt.

You'll find directions for diluting this stock solution on the manufacturers container. And the material may be applied any time after the leaves shed in the fall until early April if the temperature is above 45 degrees and the ground is not too wet.

Another good controller of the peach tree borer is jaradichlorobenzene chrysalis. Just break the soil crust from 15 to 18 inches around the tree and clear out the grass and weeds. Then sprinkle the chrysalis in a circle around the tree about two inches from the base. One ounce is enough for mature trees, but sometimes one and a half ounces is needed for the extra large trees. For trees 3 to 5 years old use three-fourths of an ounce, and for younger trees, sprinkle around about one half ounce.

Cover the chrysalis over with soil as soon as they have been sprinkled around, and pack the dirt with a shovel. The best time of year to apply these chrysalis is between October 20 and November 15.

After about six weeks, tear down the mound of earth and remove the chrysalis.

Ethylene dichloride or the paradichlorobenzene chrysalis either will give a good control of the peach tree borer. This borer is sometimes called the base borer and attacks the plum and apricot tree in the same manner and can be killed in the same way.

### Shot Hole Borer—

The shot hole borer attacks chiefly trees that have been devaluated by some other pest and or injured and weakened by lack of fertility and especially the lack of water or moisture. Both the larva and adult beetle burrow into the bark of the trees, and many small, round entrance and exit holes, giving the bary the appearance of having been shot with bird shot, reveal the presence of this pest. There is no satisfactory method of controlling the shot hole borer with insecticides. However, by proper cultivation and fertilization of the trees to keep them healthy and by controlling other insect pests and diseases, injury

from shot hole borer can be avoided.

### Lesser Peach Borer—

The lesser peach borer confines its attack mostly above ground to the trunk and limbs of the trees. As in the case of the shot hole borer, only injured or diseased trees are attacked. It is found working on the trunk or limbs that have been injured by implements, cankers, low temperatures, or sun scald. To control this insect, one pound paradichlorobenzene crystals dissolved in 2 quarts crude cottonseed oil is used. This is applied only to the infested areas with a paint brush, either in the fall or about the time recommended for applying the crystals for the peach borer or in the spring about the first of April.

Thylene dichloride emulsion diluted the same as for the peach tree borer is also effective when painted on the infested areas.

## VETERANS Question Box

Q—On what priority basis is a World War I veteran admitted to a Veterans Administration hospital?

A—Emergency cases have first priority; those suffering from injuries incurred in or aggravated by wartime service are next on the priority list, and those who swear they are unable to pay hospital charges for nonservice-connected disabilities or illnesses are third. The latter must wait until a bed is available.

Q—Are dependents of a World War I veteran, who died of causes not due to service, entitled to death pension?

A—In most cases, they are entitled to death pensions benefits. The widow is disqualified if her annual income exceeds \$1,000, or \$2,500 if she has a child or children. A child is ineligible if his or her income exceeds \$1,000 per year. A widow loses her entitlement upon remarriage, and children normally become ineligible when they reach age 18.

Q—I am a World War I veteran and was discharged from the U. S. Army in 1938. I would like to know if I am eligible for the education, readjustment allowance and guaranty loan provisions of the G-I Bill?

A—No. Benefits of the G-I Bill are available only to World War II veterans.

## "REFRIGERATION IS ESSENTIAL TO GOOD HEALTH", COX SAYS

From statistics compiled by the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has disclosed that a lack of proper refrigeration contributes materially to the total disease outbreaks for one year, caused from foods other than milk and milk products.

During the year there were 299 outbreaks of diseases from contaminated foods, incapacitating 12,526 persons, 17 of whom died. "The food poisoning was usually caused from contamination through insanitary conditions, infections of food handlers, or of even more significance, lack of early and adequate refrigeration," Dr. Cox said. "Even when contaminated, foods will seldom develop toxins sufficient to cause poisoning if properly refrigerated after preparation. Outbreaks caused from foods have totaled nearly six times the number caused from water or milk."

The State Health Officer pointed out that the consuming public is, in many areas, protected by proper enforcement of sanitation standards of eating establishments such as are set up in the United States Public Health Service Milk Ordinance and Code. The public is entitled to a good, clean, safe and wholesome food supply, including milk which has been produced under strict sanitary conditions and properly refrigerated. This is a great protection against disease outbreaks caused by contaminated foods of various kinds, and Dr. Cox said this was especially obvious in view of the fact that no disease outbreak has as yet been traced to pasteurized grade A milk, which had been adequately refrigerated.

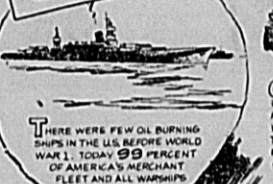
