

LUBBOCK, Field activity in the fourth year of the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program was sharply boosted July 5 when 30 trained weevil hunters took to cotton fields along the eastern edge of the Plains. These men, working in two-man teams, will keep a thorough check of weevil infestitations this summer to delimit and map the control zone for this fall's spray operations. They will inspect fields throughout the original 300,000 acre control zone,






