Pitted with artificial legs, he does most of his own farm work, runs the tractor on his corn picker, reperates his other farm machinery.



There are two principles that should be remembered when feed-ing a bred gilt. These are: first, complete nourishment of the gilt and her growing pig embryo; and second, economy. In other words,





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
