Traffic Changes for Baird Elementary School

BAIRD- In an effort to improve traffic safety for the students in our school, the following traffic changes will be made.

Callowhill Street, from 7th Street north, will be closed to through traffic.

Seventh Street will remain one way during school hours (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.) from Vine to Girard.

Parents will pick up and let out children on 7th Street, next to the cafeteria. Please

let out and pick up children from the right side of the street ONLY (the side closest to the school). Use the left hand side for moving traffic.

Faculty parking will be on 7th Street and the area east of the Junior High tennis courts.

Busses will load and unload on Callowhill between the old gym and the elementary campus. They will park north of the bandhall during the day.

Stolen Merchandise Recovered in Breckenridge

BAIRD- Monday, August 6, 1979, Ed Duncan and George Fraser went to Breckenridge and recovered a camper-trailer that was stolen from Coleman County.

On August 7, 1979, Sheriff Bill Skinner, Charlie Barnett, and Ed Duncan returned to the same house in Breckenridge and met with officers from four other counties and recovered stolen merchandise on five offenses from Callahan County, five from Coleman County, five from Brown County, one from Eastland County and

two from Stephens County. An approximate \$50,000.00 dollars worth of merchandise was recovered.

In other news, the sheriff's office was notified August 8, 1979 that Crecia Hardwick's Chevrolet had been recovered in Texarkana, Arkansas. The new teletype at the sheriff's office was a big help in finding this automobile.

The dispatcher is now on duty for 16 hours a day. In the very near future it will be on 24 hours a day.

School Supply List For Grades K — 6th

BAIRD- The 1979-80 school supply lists for Baird schools grades Kindergarten through sixth are as follows: Kindergarten- 2 large pencils, set of 8 large crayons, Elmer's school glue, school box or cigar box, large box of kleenex, manuscript writing tablet, pkg. 12 inch x 18 inch manilla, and pkg of 12 inch x 18 inch construction paper. Please put child's name on all supplies. First grade- pencils No. 2 size tablets 1st grade with imaginary lines (Aladin #2112 or St. Regis green #112), crayon, regular, box of 16, glue white (Elmer's), scissors, supply box or cigar box, 1 pkg. construction paper, 1 pkg. manilla paper, and 1 box of kleenex.

Second grade- 1 wide writing tablet (Big Chief), 1 2nd grade imaginary line tablet, pencils No. 2, scissors, 12 inch ruler, crayons, Elmer's glue, rest pad (large towel or bath mat will do), cigar box, 1 large pkg. construction paper (12x18) and 1 large pkg. manilla paper (12x18).

Third grade- 1 sturdy folder with pockets, notebook paper, wide rule not narrow or college, 1 3rd grade imaginary line or midline tablet for writing (1/2 inch ruling, 1/4 midline, red baseline), 1 spiral notebook, regular size, 3 No. 2 pencils, 1 pencil eraser, 1 12 inch ruler, crayons, Elmer's glue, school supply box or cigar box, 1 red pen or pencil for grading, 1

pkg. 12 x 18 construction paper, 2 pkgs. 12 x 18 manilla paper.

Fourth grade- cigar or supply box, 5 hole notebook paper, wide rule not narrow or college, No. 315 or 317 imaginary line looseleaf paper (no tablets please) pointed scissors, No. 2 pencils with erasers, red pen for checking, eraser, crayolas (no. 16, 32, 48, or 64), spiral notebook for spelling (side spiral), white glue large size, 6 folders for looseleaf paper, 12 inch wooden ruler (plastic splits), map colors, 1 regular size plastic dish pan, 1 pkg. 12 inch x 18 inch construction and 2 pkgs. 12 x 18 manilla.

Fifth grade- Bic or ball-point pen (blue or black), No. 2 pencils, eraser-for ink on one end and pencil on the other, wood ruler, scissors, crayolas, pkg. of water color markers, map colors, notebook paper, 1 looseleaf notebook, 1 pkg. of looseleaf dividers, glue Elmer's or something similar, 1 pkg. construction paper. 1 pkg. manilla paper and P.E. clothes, (white shirt, red shorts, and tennis shoes).

Sixth grade- 5 folders, 2 spiral composition books, glue, scissors, 1 pkg. construction paper, 1 set of map colors, crayons or felt markers, ruler, 2 pencils, 1 pen (blue or black), 1 pen red, lined notebook paper, notebook or clip board, cigar box, and P.E. clothes, (white shirt, red shorts, and tennis shoes).

Baird School Officially Opens Here Tuesday

BAIRD- School officially opens in Baird Independent School District when teachers meet in a general faculty meeting at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, August 21, in the English room of the high school. Teachers will have two days of in-service training before students start at 8:15 on Thursday, August 23.

The fourth, fifth and sixth grade teachers were at the Education Service Center on Monday and Tuesday of this week for training in a new Comp Math program which is being considered in Baird. The principals for both campuses began work on August 1.

Eighth and ninth grade band members began work last week and all band members are meeting each night this week for marching practice. Football players began workouts this past Monday. Their first scrimmage will be at Anson on Friday, August 24. The new band hall is nearing completion and should be ready early in September.

The School Board will host an ice cream supper for all school personnel and their

spouses at 8 p.m. in the cafeteria on Tuesday, August 21.

Dave Edmiston has been appointed head football coach and athletic director. His staff includes Max Gordon, Quinn Conley and two new members: Jerel Graves and Terry Bates, both graduates of McMurry College. Coach Graves lives at 518 E. Fourth with his wife and daughter while Coach Bates and his wife live in the Walnut Hill Apartments.

School will dismiss on this first Thursday and Friday at 2:30 p.m. and buses will run at that time. Normal dismissal time is 3:35 p.m.

Joe Cruz has been added to our custodial staff and will be working at the elementary school. Frank and Dolores Rodriguez will continue to work at the high school. The lunchroom staff consists of Doris Havins, Bess Swinson, and Jackie Neal. A new confection oven and deep fryer are being installed in the lunchroom. Much painting and refurbishing throughout the school has been done over the summer to have things in readiness for this new school year.

Baird School To Offer Free Meals

BAIRD- The Baird School will again offer free and reduced-price meals to school children from families who fall within certain income eligibility brackets. This is to comply with Public Law 105 enacted October 7, 1975. Each student will be offered the opportunity to participate.

Breakfast and lunch will be offered to all students. Students who qualify for free lunch will qualify for free breakfasts. Students who qualify for reduced-price lunch will qualify for reduced-price breakfasts. Breakfast will be served from 7:45 to 8:10 each school day. Regular price for breakfast will be twenty-five

(\$0.25) cents while reduced price will be ten (\$0.10) cents. Adult breakfast will cost forty-five (\$0.45) cents.

The schools serve nutritious meals every day. The lunch prices are: Kindergarten through grade 5 pay fifty-five (\$0.55) cents while grades six through twelve pay sixty (\$0.60) cents. Adults pay ninety-three (\$0.93) cents. Extra milk will be fourteen (\$0.14) cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the following scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. The reduced price for lunch

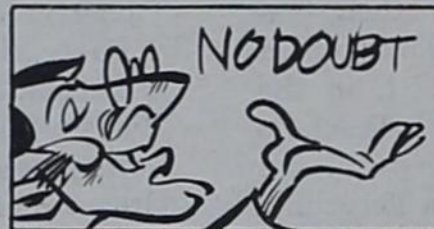
BAIRD- Jay Jones was notified that he has been nominated for award recognition and will have his biography published in Who's Who Among American High School Students,

is ten (\$.10) cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free or reduced-price meals for your children, complete the application you will receive from the school when you register your child, and return it to the school.

Whenever possible, you are encouraged to pay by the week or month for your child's lunches. No tickets are available for breakfasts so students will pay each day.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the school superintendent.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application when you receive it.

Whenever possible, you are encouraged to pay by the week or month for your child's lunches. No tickets are available for breakfasts so students will pay each day.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation

of child-feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rentschedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.
