He discussed the matter from both scientific and biblical standpoint and scored the evolution theory heavily. He is an eloquent and forceful speaker and his words fell on attentive ears.

MORE CHANGES MADE AT CROSS PLAINS MOTOR CO

Babe Woods has resigned his position as manager of the drygoods department at Higginbotham's and has accepted position with the Cross Plains Motor Co. as Ford salesman. And Bill Wagner who has been keeping books for this company has gone back to dressing tools, and his brother, Ross Wagner fills the vacancy thus created by Bill's retirement from the office. The Cross Plains Motor Co. employs ten men and they are doing a large volume of business.

NURSE FOR FULL TIME IN CALLAHAN COUNTY

Callahan County has been offered \$1500.00 federal aid to be met by a like sum from the county to be used for the employment of a full time county public health nurse for a year. This also covers the other expenses of the health program such as transportation, office rent, telephone, office supplies and the like.

The work of the nurse will be in all parts of the county, one half of the time to be for mothers, expectant mothers, infants and preschool children.

The other to be school work or general county work. The nurse will be under supervision of the Public Health Committee of the county and also of the State Board of Health. She will report monthly to the county committee.

The work with mothers, and preschool children will be carried on through clinic, conferences, health centers, instructions to classes, individual instructions and home visits.

The need for this particular branch of work may be emphasized by a few statistics. In Texas alone 900 mothers die yearly as direct results of child birth. About 9,000 babies under one year of age die each year in Texas, one half of these dying before one month of age.

Texas is not in the Birth Registration Area. Callahan County registers 51 per cent of the births, less than one half. Many a man raises registered cattle and hogs, and doesn't know whether his children or registered.

Callahan county should come first to prevent this needless loss of mothers and children, and raise our percentage of birth registered from 51 percent to 100 percent within the next twelve months. If one life is saved it can not be considered that the country's money was spent in an investment that did not pay and the health work among mothers will not only save life but prevent much suffering and weakness, and maimed individuals, who are unable to cope with the problem of life in the home and in society in general.

The school will consist of individual inspection of pupils weighing and measuring, notification of parents, health instructions to classes, organization of Health Clubs, follow up work, and home visits.

The work is to be educational and besides care will be given in emergencies. In cases of epidemic the nurses time will be given to aid the local health authorities.

There will be mass meetings and discussions in various parts of the country and people will be given an opportunity to express themselves on this question.

Everyone who is interested should make it a point to attend these meetings and use their influence to interest others.

Later: We are informed there will be a mass meeting at the Baptist church to night (Thursday) to discuss this issue. This is a community meeting.

Those in attendance report the greatest convention they have ever attended—it being one of the most instructive and inspiring in the district and the largest District Convention on record for the state. The hospitality of the Abilene people was most excellent. Last Sunday evening the hour was taken up with reports from the delegates who had just returned from Abilene. A prize was offered to the delegate giving the best oral report of the convention. Every delegate reported and much enthusiasm was shown. The judges rendered the decision that both Miss Aleta Walker and Miss Ara Eager delivered the best report so the society will give each a prize, and all deserve much credit.

MCMURRY GETS GOOD WELL IN CROSS CUT SECTION

McMurry's J. W. Newton No. 1 came in this week, at 1242 feet, in the Cross Cut section, making about 60 barrels. This new well is quite an extension to the Cross Cut shallow field, extending the field about half mile east, which will cause several offsets to be drilled in the near future, and will create a general run of developments in that section.

C. O. Moore is on top of the sand on the Anderson No. 1, offsetting the big Bryson well in the Cross Plains-Pioneer field. He is spudding on his Anderson No. 2, and is rigging up for his Faulkner No. 3.

The Pennant Oil & Gas and Pope & Wilson are spudding on their Albin No. 5. They are also spudding on their west Bryson No. 2. Both wells are east of town in the Cross Plains-Pioneer field.

Schaffner Bros. in this field have given their James No. 2 a shot and have showing for small producer.

In the Cross Cut section, Crabb & McNeal and Tom Bryant are drilling at 530 on their McDonough No. 3. Brooks Dozier also in this section is shut down at 780 feet on his Byrd No. 1, waiting for repairs on machine.

There is likely to be increased activity of considerable magnitude in the

Cross Cut section shortly. The field looks good. And east of town, the showing is encouraging. While some wildcatting may be started in the near future.

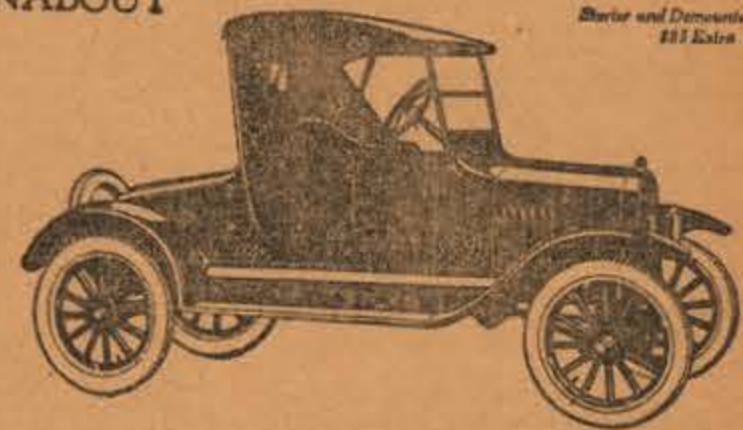
