So, to the citizens of Baird, I say express yourselves and with sentiment being what I think it is the change can be brought about and the town move forward instead of backward as it has for the past twenty-five years.

A Letter to the People of Baird

BAIRD- Ever since the people voted to keep the City-owned light plant, and several city councilmen were replaced by new duly-elected councilmen, there has been one thing after another to keep the town in a state of unrest.

This letter is written with the hope that this unrest and dissatisfaction can be held to a minimum.

First: If the light plant is sold, the proceeds would mostly be used to pay off the City's indebtedness, leaving very little for operating the necessary city services, such as cemetery upkeep, street repairs, police service, garbage pick-up, street lights and many more.

Now, as you all know, Baird is among the lowest in the state in what you pay for taxes and for water, so to raise enough operating capital, these would have to be raised drastically. And, as you probably also know, the City is in the process right now of contracting to buy power from W.T.U.

One of the city circuits has already been tied in, and the others will be as soon as WTU can obtain the necessary transformers and other equipment necessary to make the changeover, which will be in a matter of 6 to 8 months.

Under this arrangement with WTU the City will be buying current at the same rate that it is sold to REA, which will enable the City to sell to you at about the same rate that WTU charges it's customers. And the City will still make

a profit, providing them with the funds to continue with these necessary services outlined above.

So in closing we are asking you to bear with us for a few months and not jeopardize the one thing we have that has the potential to make the money that the City must have to function on.
