County Officials Go To Austin To Appear Before Commission

Officials of Callahan County left Tuesday to appear before the Texas Commission on Jail Standards in compliance with the 10 violations found during an inspection made by Robert Dearing May 5.

One of the violations has been remeded concerning first aid equipment on hand, and a variance was given on the violation of a shower not being provided for the seperation cell. Corrections on the other

violations are pending until after the Austin meeting.

In a 1981 jail censys a total on 410 were incorcerated with only 59 over 3 days, and felonies totaling 58.

This census was to be presented to the commission in Tuesday's meeting.



After graduating from Baird High School in 1920, Farmer worked at a local hardware store before accepting a bookkeeping position with First National Bank of Baird.

At that time he planned to work a year and save money so he could attend the University of Texas at Austin and study law. Instead he stayed with the bank and after 49 years retired in January 1969 from his position as executive vice president.

"I never intended to

stay at the bank longer than a year," Farmer once said. "But I never left, I guess I just like it."

He was promoted from bookkeeper to teller and assistent cashier in 1927, to cashier in 1951 and to cashier and vice president in 1959. He received the title of executive vice president in 1965. He continued as a bank board member after retirement.

He was named Baird's first Most Outstanding Citizen by Baird Chamber of Commerce, and each year the city's top citizen is acknowledged by receipt of the Howard E. Farmer Award. He served as a director and vice president of the chamber.

He served 50 years as treasure for the First Methodist Church of Baird. He was chairman of Callahan County War Bond Sales during World War II and cited for outstanding acheivement.

He was a member of the Masonic Fraternity and the Baird Masonic Lodge, the Scottish Rite Bodies of Dallas and Moslah Shrine Temple of Fort Worth. He was a past president of the Bairds Lions Club.

He served as treasurer of the Callahan County Chapter of the National Foundation fot the March of Dimes since the local branch's inception and served as Callahan County's Chairman for the United States Savings Bond Division of the Treasury Department.

He is survived by his wife; a brother, Fred of Baird; a sister, Lucille Turner of Austin; a neice, Gladys Angelada of Austin; & several great- nephews and great-neices.



County Agent Recommends Spider Mite Control

Spider mites are being found on tomato and other garden plants in almost all areas of the county, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.

These mites are microscopic in size, orange-red in color and reproduce rapidly during hot dry weather. Complete development from egg to adult require about 7 days.

Damage from mites can be quite extensive if they are not controlled. Leaves and stems begin to turn brown or the whole plant may turn brown and die are the typical symptoms of spider mite damage.

These mites can be controlled by applying a recommended insecticide such as Kelthane. Two other insecticides recommended for use are Malathion or Sulfur dust. Be sure to follow label directions for application and harvest.

For more information on gardens insect control contact the County Extension office located on first floor on the Courthouse.
