As the new facility three miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 84 is a restricted, disease-free operation, visitors will not be allowed to go onto the premises for 'on-the-sight' viewing of the operation. Special

He commented that he was active in sports during the time he was in school and planned to attend school sports activities.

Orozo Cited For Gallantry In Presentation

on March 13, 1968, PFC Antonio Orozco was killed in action in the Quang Tri province in Vietnam. Private Orozco had attended school in Muleshoe prior to his enlistment in the United States Marines.

Wednesday, Captain Thomas V. Allen, USMC, the Inspector-Instructor of the Lubbock-based Marine Corps Reserve unit, presented an award to Private Orozco's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Felipe Orozco of Muleshoe.

The award was the Vietnamese Military Merit Medal and the Vietnamese Gallantry Cross with Palm.

Captain Allen cited Orozco's award and the decree read: "A serviceman of courage and rare self-sacrifice, he displayed at all times the most tactful cooperation while aiding the Armed Forces of the Republic of Vietnam to repel the Red Wave undermining South Vietnam and Southeast Asia. With a ready zeal and commendable response, he fought on to the end in every mission and set a brilliant example for his fellow soldiers. He died in the performance of duty. Behind him he leaves the abiding grief of his former comrades-in-arms, Vietnamese as well as Americans."

At the regular monthly meeting of the Muleshoe Independent School System School Board Monday night, election for two members of the board was announced. The terms of Dr. Charles Lewis, school board president and Joe Embry, school board member, expire at the end of this year.

The election will be held on Saturday, April 4, in the Junior High School Library. Named election judge was Ernest Kerr. The board members named Hazel Gilbreath, county clerk, to hold absentee voting.

March 4 will be the last day to file for the school board. All candidates may file in the office of the school administration. Absentee voting will begin on March 16 and March 31 is the final date for absentee voting.

In other action, the board heard a report on the collection of school taxes. It was noted that taxes collections for the year 1969 are 83.95 complete.

This represented a total of \$484,657.64, and was .48 percent over the \$465,110.60 collected at the same time last year.

School board members also approved a school calendar for 1970-71. Because of new legislation going into effect, 180 school days are scheduled, plus 10 in-service workdays for teachers. It was explained that all teachers will be on ten months contracts, beginning next school year.

Schools will open their doors in Muleshoe on August 31, 1970 for the 1970-71 school term. Six workdays are scheduled for teachers prior to the beginning of school.

There will be two school days allotted for Thanksgiving vacation; seven school days plus two weekends are allotted for Christmas vacation and two school days plus a weekend are scheduled for Easter vacation.

Last day of school in 1970-71 will be May 27, a Thursday. If the two extra days scheduled for bad weather are not used, school will end on Tuesday, May 25, 1971.

Board members were told there are 1,888 students presently enrolled in the four Muleshoe schools. Two schools gained students over this time last year and two schools lost students.

There are 557 students in Muleshoe High School; 491 registered in Muleshoe Junior High School; 442 in Mary DeShazo and 398 in Richland Hills. There are 37 pre-school migrant children also enrolled in the school system.

A total of 24,126 books circulated through the school libraries during the first four months of school, September, 5,413; October, 8,049; November, 5,953 and December, 4,711.

Approved was the resignation of Judith Justice, English teacher in junior high school. She accepted a position with an

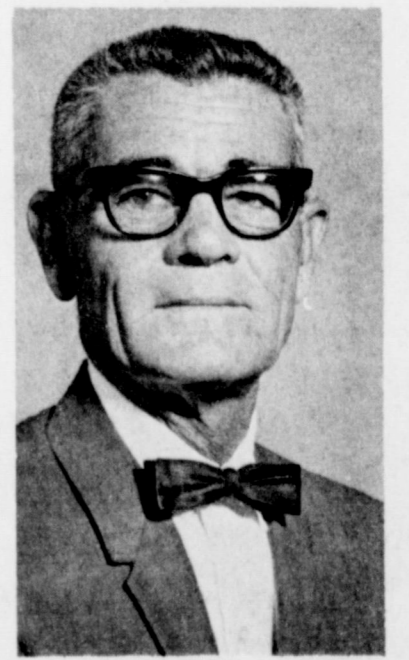
"I ask your support and will do my best to fulfill the duties of this office."

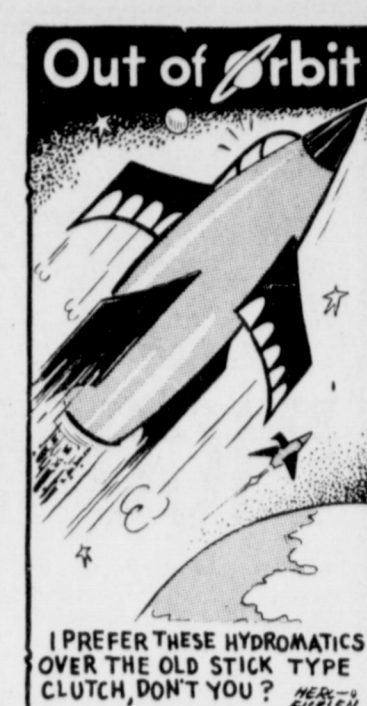

What's Important About Young Drivers?

DALLAS--What is the real problem when a youngster starts to drive? His safety? Concern for others? The cost of auto insurance?

Insurance companies hear much about auto insurance rates for the young driver, the Insurance Information Institute says, but these rates recognize and encourage safe driving in a situation where there isn't enough of it.

Consider these facts: Although only 20.9 per cent of the nation's motoring population is under age 25, drivers age 24 and younger were involved in 34.6 per cent of all reported accidents and 33.9 per cent of fatal accidents in this country in 1968.

The number of drivers involved in fatal accidents, ages 20 through 24, in 1968 was 117 per 100,000 drivers, almost twice the average rate of 67 for all age groups, according to the National Safety Council.

Because younger drivers tend to have more frequent and more serious accidents, they run up a bigger accident bill and auto insurance rates are higher for those in this group.

However, steps can be taken to limit the extent of the pre-

mium increase when a young person starts driving the family car. A premium discount is offered by most insurance companies for youthful motorists who have satisfactorily completed a recognized driver education course offered by high schools and colleges.

Also, many insurers offer a premium discount ranging up to 25 per cent for young drivers who maintain good grades in school, the Institute said, reflecting the fact that generally good students also have good driving records.

Muleshoe Students Learn Chemicals

President Nixon's November announcement concerning chemical and biological weapons renounced germ warfare and the first use of lethal and incapacitation chemical weapons. U.S. policy on these two major weapons currently in routine use in Vietnam; tear gas and chemical defoliants, however, did not change.

With regard to biological warfare the renunciation was unilateral and unequivocal. The President indicated that biological-warfare research would be confined to defensive measures and that the U.S. stockpile of bacteriological weapons would be destroyed. In spite of a widespread feeling that such weapons are dependable and potentially uncontrollable, the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Department of Defense had long maintained that the option of retaliation in kind was essential for U.S. security.

With regard to chemical warfare the President referred to the 1925 Geneva Protocol, which prohibits the first use of asphyxiating, poisonous or other gases and analogous materials. The protocol was signed on behalf of the U.S. but has never been by some 80 countries including the U.S. and Japan.

Blood of the Pharaohs

A problem in Egyptian history of the 14th century B.C.

is whether two of the successors to the pharaoh, Ikhnaton were brothers. Using a new microserological technique, investigators in England and Egypt have cast additional light on the question.

Ikhnaton is famous as a religious reformer whose campaign to substitute a kind of monotheism for the bizarre polytheism of his time collapsed after his death. Neither of his immediate successors would be remembered by non-specialists today except that the tomb of one -Tutankhamen- ascended the world by its riches when it was opened in 1922. The mummy of King Tut is in the custody of the United Arab Republic; another of the department's treasures, until recently was believed to be the mummy of the great Ikhnaton himself, has now been shown to be more probably that of his immediate successor, one Smenkhkare. Tutankhamen and Smenkhkare had one bond in two blood fractions that tended to prove them to be brothers. The analysis of blood types of two human bodies that had been dead for hundreds of years proved to be almost unbelievable.

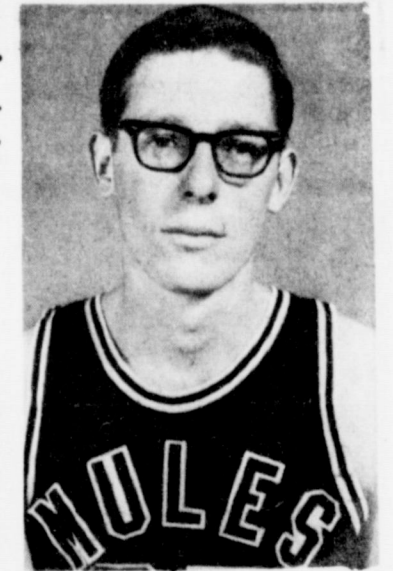
Coach George Washington is a graduate of Panhandle A&M, at Goodwell Oklahoma, where he received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Social Studies.

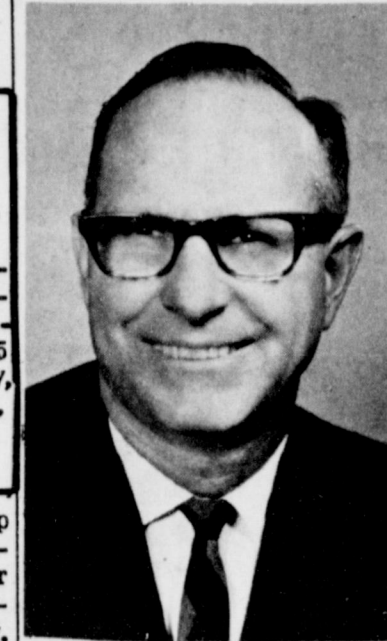

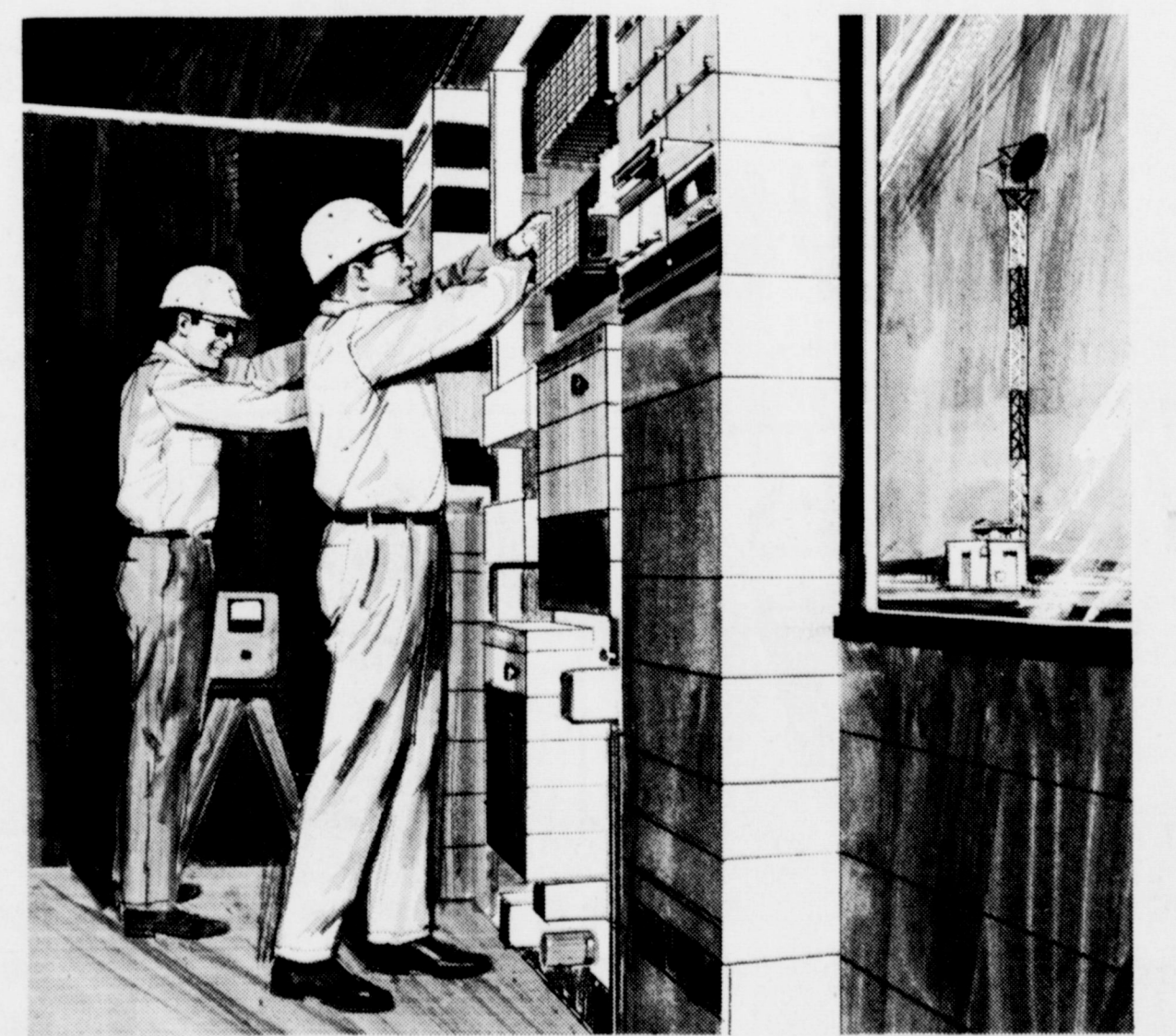

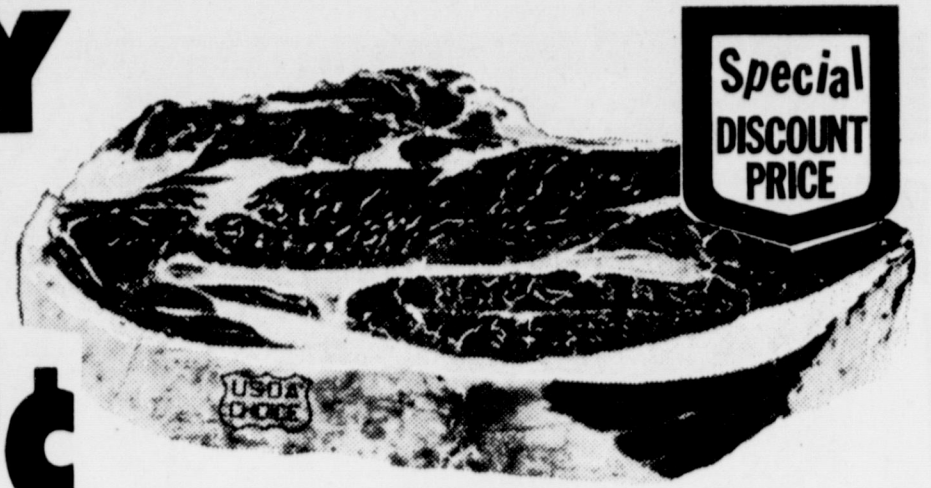
