GARDENING AND INSECTS

It will kill the sucking bugs such as plant lice, though not quite as quickly as nicotene, BHC, lindane or parathion. But it has none of the toxic points like some of the other insecticides. About the only insects it won't

touch are the harlequin cabbage bug and squash bug. 20 per cent sabadilla dust will be safe to use

to kill these bugs.
