**HENDRICK HUDSON WAS NOT A DUTCHMAN AND FIRST DISCOVERED THE DELAWARE, NOT THE HUDSON RIVER.**



HENRY HUDSON WAS AN ENGLISHMAN. AFTER FAILING TO FIND A NORTH-EAST PASSAGE TO INDIA FOR THE ENGLISH, HE OFFERED HIS SERVICES TO THE DUTCH TO FIND A NORTH-WEST PASSAGE.

CROSSING THE NORTH ATLANTIC, HE REACHED NEWFOUNDLAND JULY 24, 1609. HE ANCHORED IN PENOBSCOT BAY JULY 28th. WHERE HE MADE MUCH NEEDED REPAIRS ON HIS BOAT THE "HALVE MAINE." STILL SAILING SOUTHWARD HE SIGHTED THE VIRGINIA COAST AUGUST 19th. REALIZING THAT HE WAS NOW TOO FAR SOUTH HE RETRACED HIS COURSE TO THE NORTHWARD AND ON AUGUST 28th HE CAME TO ANCHOR ON LAND (DELAWARE) AND SAILED INTO WHAT IS NOW THE MOUTH OF THE DELAWARE RIVER. AGAIN SAILING NORTHWARD HE ARRIVED AT SANDHOOK SEPTEMBER 3rd OR 4th AND THERE ON AND UP THE RIVER WHICH NOW BEARS HIS NAME. HAD IT NOT BEEN FOR THE SHOALS AT THE MOUTH OF THE DELAWARE THE PRESENT HUDSON RIVER WOULD PROBABLY STILL BE THE "NORTH RIVER" AND THE SOUTH RIVER SUBSEQUENTLY NAMED THE DELAWARE WOULD HAVE BEEN CALLED THE HUDSON!

HUDSON LATER DISCOVERED THE STRAIT AND BAY NAMED AFTER HIM. IN THE LATTER BODY OF WATER HE WAS SET ADMIT BY A MITCHELLS CREW AND WAS NEVER HEARD FROM AGAIN.

**County Agent's Column**

Troy Masg. 4-H club boy of Oplin, reports his six capons weighed 20 pounds July 14th. In one month's time after caponizing the roosters they have more than doubled in weight.

J. E. Faircloth, club leader of Midway, reports that most of the 45 apple trees budded June 23rd, by the club boys of Midway Community were not only living but that many of the buds had grown out several inches. At club meetings in June 4-H Club boys of Clyde, Cottonwood, and Atwell were also shown the proper method of budding apple trees and a total of 145 were budded at the meetings by 4-H Club members.

**Trench Silos Being Built:**

The finishing touches are being put on a 120 ton trench silo at the E. W. Moutray farm 4 miles north-east of Baird. The silo is 100 feet long, 22 feet wide and 3 feet deep. Sudan grass and hegari will be used to fill the trench. The feed will be cut with a silage cutter.



MOTORING MANNERS

The old copy book axiom about the weakest link may well be applied to highway accident prevention. The problem is primarily one of dealing with the individual. If there are fifty careful drivers on a road and only one who is not there is still a hazard and the campaign is not finished until the careless driver is shown the error of his ways and becomes a convert to safety.

[We are too prone to blame car failure or some vague general something as the cause of our accidents, why don't we be honest with ourselves and admit that we are causing them, last year only 5% of the automobiles involved in fatal accidents were found to have been defective mechanically. If you confront the average driver with the above figures which by the way are the findings of the National Safety Council, he will tell you that drunken drivers must have been at fault, the records show that only 7.3% of the drivers in fatal accidents had so much as had a drink. There is no way of our getting around the fact that we are killing ourselves off at a tremendous rate for no reason other than an utter disregard for human life and what is often worse, human misery.

We can't escape the danger of being hurt or killed merely by staying out of automobiles, as a matter of fact it is safer to ride than walk there are hundreds of times more miles made in automobiles in the United States each year than on foot yet more than 40% of our traffic deaths last year occurred to pedestrians.

One little girl who had heard so much about people being run over by automobiles, on being asked in school to define the word pedestrian answered "a pedestrian is a man who has been hit by a car."
