Neal Dillard Gets Good Producer In Cross Cut Sector

N. M. Dillard, local oil operator reported this week that his No. 1 J. L. Byrd wildcat test, located about 1 1/2 miles northeast of Cross Cut was completed the latter part of last week for a potential gauge of 45 barrels of high gravity crude daily, natural flow, making it one of the best discoveries in this section in some time.

The producer is located on a 57-acre tract in the W. B. Travis Survey No. 148, and is 500 feet from the South and 150 feet from the West lines of the survey. Drilled with rotary equipment the pay structure was encountered at 1,334 and was drilled through at 1,371. Pipe was set and perforated from 1,334 to 1,340 feet, it was reported.

In the backfield we have Jim Cade coming back as the only regular and should, if he is determined, be the best back in the district. Gene Bush, who is a natural ball carrier, will play behind Cade on offense, but will take over James Barr's safety position on defense. The quarterback position, which was so adequately taken care of last year by Barr, will be handled by Homer Robinson, a Sophomore, who is one of the best first-year quarterbacks I've ever coached and if he keeps improving will be hard to dislodge from that position.

The fullback position will either go to Kenneth Beeler or Tom Scott. The right halfback position will go either to Billy Jack Harris or Glen Fleming. The ends will be handled by Dwayne Wilson and Elzie Wilson with Joe Garrett and Paul Lane giving good support.

Two new-comers are fighting for the center position. They are Kenneth Tension and Carl McCord. The guards will be handled by six boys and if I could play them all at once, we might accomplish something. These boys are: Joe Coppinger, James Koenig, E. W. Foster, Terry Watkins, Billy Sipes and Charles McCord.

The tackle slots will be handled by Danny Myrick, who, if he has the desire, will be one of the best tackles in the district. Jay Hughes will fill Donald Beeler's tackle position and N. A. Roady and Bobby Phillips will back these boys up.
