With fields and pastures soaked by more than five inches of rain, farmers and ranchmen were smiling broadly yesterday. Many opined that this section now has a better mid-Summer season in the ground than at any time during the past 25 years.





There are more than 6,000 trench silos in Texas. There are some 600 trench silos in Fayette county. Texas. In the small country of Germany there are over 200,000 trench silos and the number in every country, state, and county is increasing yearly. Since the feed stored in a trench silo will keep for ten years, farmers are able to store feed in years like this and keep it until needed in time of drought.
