

# REPUBLICANS ARE WINNERS

## Eisenhower Has 106 Vote Margin Here

The largest number of voters in the history of the nation turned out Tuesday, Nov. 4, to ballot in the General Election, and gave the Republican Party a "Landslide" victory. General Dwight D. Eisenhower led in 35 states with 397 electoral votes. Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson led in 13 with 134 electoral votes. Election requires 266.

### Ike Carries Cross Plains

General Eisenhower carried the Cross Plains box by a vote of 358 to Stevenson's 252, for a total vote here of 610.

According to the Texas Election Bureau, the Republican team also carried the State of Texas by a large majority. This is the second time in history for the state to go Republican, voting for Herbert Hoover in 1928. Cross Plains was the only voting box in Callahan County giving the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket a majority, according to final reports.

With unofficial returns complete from 11 of the 16 voting zones in Callahan County, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson and Sen. John Sparkman led Gen. Dwight Eisenhower and Sen. Richard Nixon by a scant 81 votes.

A total of 2,550 votes had been tabulated up to 9:30 last night, with five boxes unreported. The totals at that time were:

Stevenson and Sparkman, 1,392.  
Eisenhower and Nixon, 1,311.  
In the U. S. Senate race, Price Daniel received 2,155 votes on the Democratic ticket and 217 on the Republican ticket.

Gov. Allan Shivers polled 2,087 Democratic votes for re-election and 217 on the Republican ticket.

Both of the proposed amendments to the Texas constitution were trailing in Callahan. Vote on workmen's insurance was for 446; against 508.

Vote on the medical education fund was: for 358; against 567.

Coach Frank Rundell's Cross Plains Buffaloes lost a hard-fought grid battle to the Wylie Bulldogs on the Wylie field last Thursday night by the close score of 13-7, for their fourth conference loss of the season.

Playing first class football all evening, the Buffs kept the Bulldogs on the defensive most of the evening, with the first period ending without a tally for either team. The Wylie lads started their offense moving in the second period with Dean Lewis scampering 35 yards on a reverse to score. The try for point failed and the score at the half read 6-0 in favor of the Bulldogs.

The Buffaloes came back strong in the third period and promptly marched to pay dirt on a series of first downs, with quarterback Dwayne Wilson going over from the one-yard line on a quarterback sneak. Wilson added the point from placement to put the Buffs in the lead by a score of 7-6.

In the final period, a 25-yard run by Wylie's Johnny Watts for the game-winning tally turned the tide for the Bulldogs. James Caton circled end for the extra point, and the game ended with the scoreboard reading 13-7 in favor of Wylie.

The Buffaloes journey to Bangs next Friday night where they will tangle with the Bangs Dragons in another District 7-A conference game, and it is hoped that a large number of local fans will be on hand to cheer for the boys.

### Area Dairymen Hold Meeting At Hall's Feed Store Tuesday

Fourteen dairymen of this area attended a dairy meeting held at the Hall Feed Store here Tuesday night of this week, and heard A. Z. Myrick, President of the Eastland County Dairy Association, of Cisco, explain the workings of his organization.

### THE BAYOU PHILOSOPHER GETS MIND OFF POLITICS AND BACK TO HIS ODD PHILOSOPHY OF FARMING

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou has shifted from politics to farming, if you want to call it that, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

Now that the election is over and I woke up to the grim reality that regardless of all the golden promises that have been made to me I'm probably still gonna have to do my own work if it ever gets done, although I am glad to be livin in a country where it doesn't have to get done unless I feel like it and I'm the sole judge of how I feel, I was highly interested in an article I read in a magazine last night.

Accordin to this article, a seed which was buried 15 feet deep in rock for 2,000 years has been found and watered and it sprouted, making a flower just as pretty as any we got today. I consider this welcome news.

It's a perfect answer to people who accuse me of bein lazy, who like to ask: "What's the matter with that crop of yours? Looks like mostly weeds. No garden? Why don't you plant one?"

Under this new system, all these critics are doin is demonstratin a lack of patience and foresight and a knowledge of plant life. I remember as plain as if it was yesterday plantin all kinds of seeds in my garden back in 1928, and the fact they haven't come up yet is nothing to get alarmed about. What's 20 years or so compared with 2,000? I planted a good crop of corn eight years ago, and the fact it hasn't come up yet is nothing, unless you're ignorant of the scientific facts on seeds. I never was selfish. If I don't get to harvest that crop, there's a great satisfaction in knowing somebody in the next 2,000 years may, and as far as I'm concerned he's welcome to it, I've never seen a crop yet that wasn't easier to plant than to gather.

In fact, if the people living years ago had been more thoughtful of future generations, particularly the one I'm in, they'd have gotten more seed in the ground and we could be sittin back now watchin em sprout.

I hope this new discovery will silence a lot of people who like to drive around criticizin farmers and home gardeners. Just because a plot of ground is barren ain't no sign something ain't planted there. Come back in 2,000 years and see for yourself and just don't be so quick to criticize.

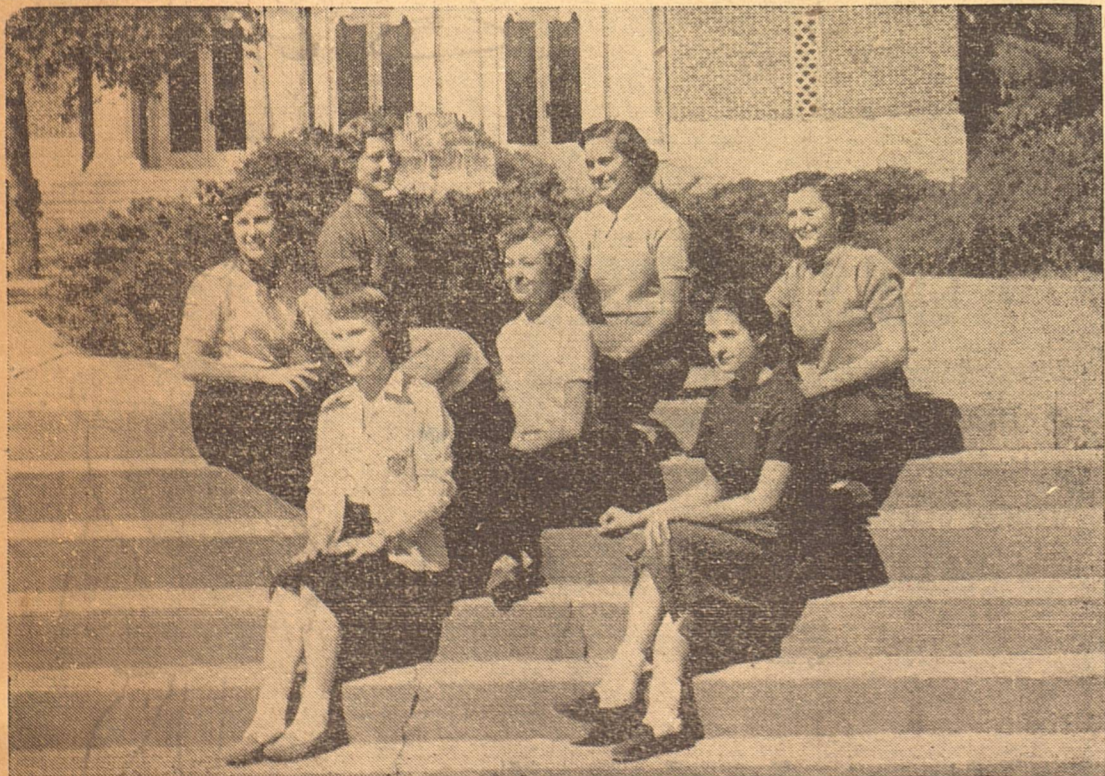
### LT. AND MRS. DICK VESTAL ANNOUNCE BIRTH OF SON

Miss Kathleen Neeb has been employed by the city as collector and bookkeeper, with office at City Hall.

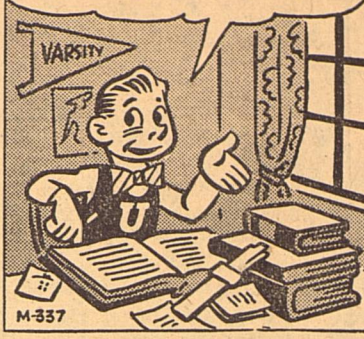

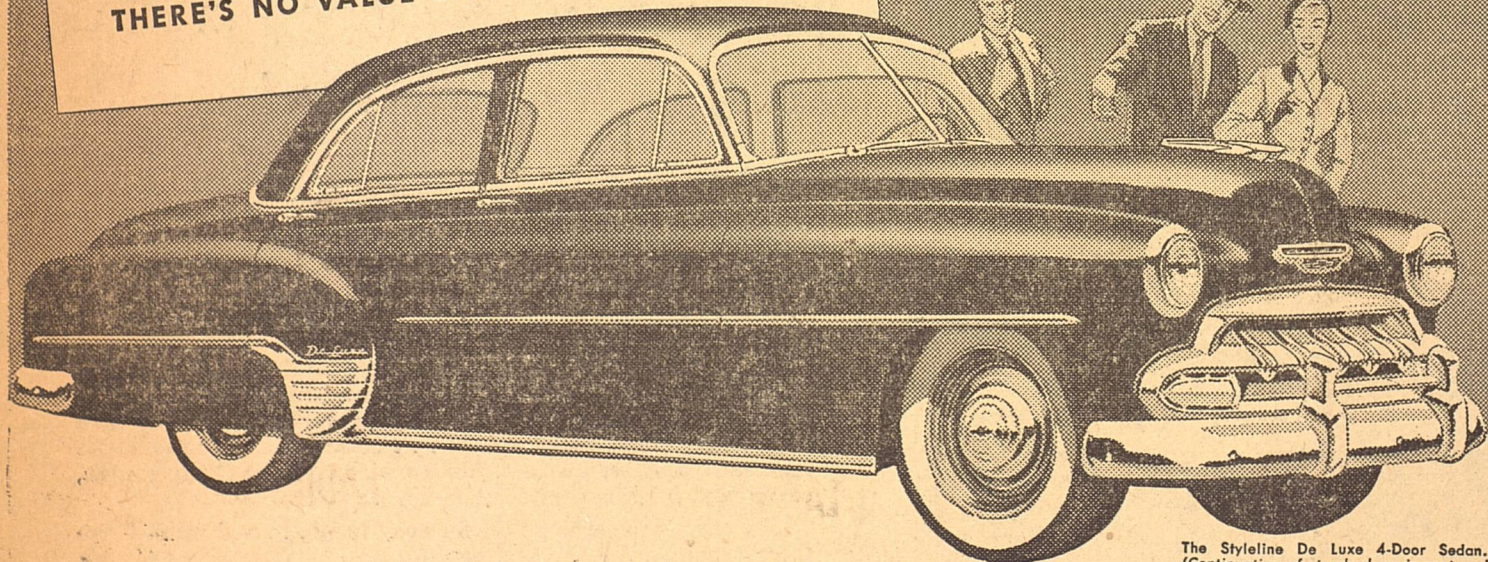

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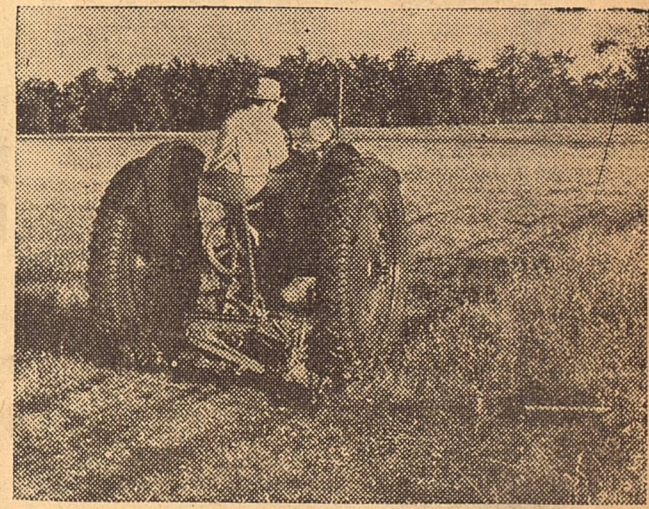

## MOWING PASTURES AIDS IN CONTROLLING WEEDS AND HELPS GRASSES SPREAD

A farmer mowing his pasture to control weeds was agreeably surprised to find that buffalo grass spread from 10 percent to 75 percent of his pasture. Mowing was started when enough weeds were in bloom to prevent them from producing seed, and he was successful in reducing the stand of such weeds as bull thistle, broomweed, careless weed and poisonous bitterweed. "Most plants are weakest during the blooming period and cutting weeds at that time usually kills them," he explains.

When his pasture grasses become too rank, he mows to start new and tender growths.

# AREA OIL NEWS

Brown County gained two shallow producing oil wells as last week closed. Applications were filed with the Railroad Commission for permission to drill five new projects.

W. T. Pulliam, Corpus Christi, No. 1 H. L. Allcorn, Roland Honeycutt Survey, wildcat 1 1/2 miles northwest of Thrifty, was completed.

Daily potential was 21.87 barrels of 40 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,133-42 feet, pay section topped at 1,128 feet.

The other oil is located in the regular field, five miles southeast of Cross Cut. It is B&R Oil Co., Breckenridge, No. 12-B Alameda Williams, R. L. Cofelt Survey.

It had a daily potential of 9.67 barrels of 36 gravity oil, pumping from 36 perforations at 1,193-99 feet. Operator set the casing at 1,218 feet while the hole is bottomed at 1,220 feet.

N. M. Dillard, Cross Plains, No. 3 J. F. Pickett is to be drilled in the regular field, three miles southeast of Cross Cut. Slated for 1,300 feet with rotary, drillsite is 165 feet from the south and 1,250 feet from the east lines of ET Survey 158.

Spotted as a 1,400-foot rotary project 2 1/2 miles southeast of Cross Cut was J. R. Lind & E. A. Wright of Cisco and Abilene No. 3 A. F. Armstrong. Site for the 1,400-foot rotary test is 750 feet from the south and 3,237 feet from the west lines of H&GN Survey.

Lion Oil Co., Abilene, staked three regular field locations in the area 1 1/2 miles south of Grosvenor. All are contracted for 1,400 feet with cable tools and located in Section 1, SA&MG Survey.

Site for No. 6 Gillbreath is 1,729 feet from the north and 4,920 feet from the west lines. No. 7 Mauldin was spotted 1,964 feet from the north and 3,720 feet from the west lines. Site for No. 8 Mauldin is 2,564 feet from the north and 2,793 feet from the west lines.

Lion has amended location for No. 5 Mauldin, contracted for 1,400 feet with cable tools, in that same area. It is now 1,664 feet from the north and 4,620 feet from the west lines of Section 1.

Wilcox Investment Co., et al of Cisco, No. 1 L. V. Edington, R. G. Milliken Survey 142, wildcat three miles south of Cross Cut, has been

plugged at 1,301 feet. Southern California Petroleum Corp. No. 2 Andrew Johnson is to be drilled in the new Southeast Oplin Ellenburger Field, 5 1/2 miles southeast of Oplin.

Contracted for 4,300 feet with rotary, it is 467 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter in Section 118, GH&H Survey. Site is 934 feet east of No. 1 Johnson, recent Ellenburger discovery. This will make the second project for the field.

R. L. Pool, Abilene, No. 1 J. D. Smith, et al, is to be drilled as a wildcat seven miles northwest of Cross Plains. Slated for 4,100 feet with rotary, it is 2,894 feet from the south and 2,342 feet from the west lines of David Thompson Survey 801.



Beat egg whites with pinch of salt. When foamy add cream tartar and continue beating until eggs are stiff enough to stand in peaks, but not dry. Sift flour and sugar together four times, fold flour mixture into egg whites two T. at a

time until all is used. Pour batter into ungreased pan.

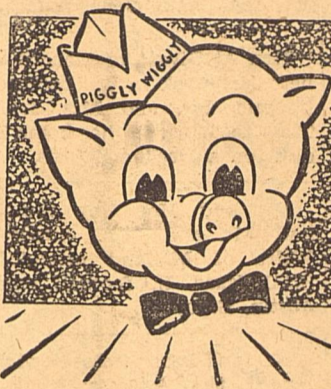
