Small town drug stores still do big business and perform needed functions. They are not, though, as much of a community institution as was the case in years between World Wars I and II.

The corner drug store - it was often located in middle of the block - was the favorite hangout for gay, young blades. The soda fountains then accommodated the trade that now is handled by the coffee shops, dairy bars and cocktail lounges.

Back during Cross Plains' first oil boom there were two top-notch drug stores here. One was owned by Dr. R. Robertson and was located a couple of doors north of where Noah Johnson's barber shop is now situated, and the other belonged to Barney Lindley and was in the same quarters as now occupied by Ike Neal's place of business.

These two drug stores had fountains about as modern is you would have seen in Brownwood or Abilene and the young men who worked there wore starched white jackets and matching caps They took pride in their workmanship and mixed drinks and prepared confections with genuine skill. Many of the popular concoctions from these fountains are no longer seen. Their names sound like a foreign language to the jet set of today. There was the sundae, frappe, julep, glass-

What were they?

A sundae, of course, was a portion of plain vanilla ice cream, served in a fancy, little dish, topped with crushed fruit, nuts or flavoring. The glassade was just about the same as today's snowcone, only it was served in a glass and eaten with a spoon. A frappe was a fountain drink, of most any desired flavor, frozen to a mushy consistency. A julep - most everybody drank grape or orange was very similar to soda water, however, the fancy places added a few mint leaves atop the ice. A parfait was a frozen dessert - like confection, mainy popular with young ladies who frequented the drug stores and loitered long at the little tables which were closely eyed by young menabout - town.

The drug store opened early and closed late. Most all were owned and managed by pharmacists, who thought nothing of working seven days a week, with the only break being from 10 a.m. each Sunday until 2 that afternoon.

Physicans, who were general practicioners, officed in a rear portion of the country drug stores. Minor surgery and numerous emergencies were handled there.

The supply of patent medicines at those drug stores of _ yesteryear was a sight to behold. There were Peruna, Tanalac, Lydia E. Pinkhams, Cardui and Black Draught, and other nostrums popular in that day and age. Packaged were pills for every purpose, the main distinction being whether or not they contained calomel. Some liked them with and others without.

Druggists literally compounded doctors' prescriptions, weighing and measuring every minute quanity. The fact that most frequently substituted when a specified drug was not available was a well-kept secret. It was not until the drug stores got around to handling everything from groceries to hardware and competition quickened that some began tattling.

No one ever came to town without going into the drug store. It was as much a custom as a man removing his hat upon entering church. The drug store was not only a house of remedies, cosmetics, toiletries and sundries, it was a watering place, a social center. Changing of its image is in keeping with transition of the times but there's some-


