



Dear editar:

I'm no expert on education, which I think I've been provin week after week, but one of my neighbors who has a television set was talkin with me the other day and he had an idea.

He said he'd been readin where there is a big teacher shortage in Texas, salaries too low, teachers goin into other lines, not enough

he'd been thinkin, why isn't television the answer? Instead of payin just a reasonable amount or maybe not quite enough to a lot of teachers, includin the ordinary and the mediocre and occasionally the exceptional, why not pay a lot just to the exceptional and let the rest go into some other line of work, say bookkeepin or clerkin or housewifin or truck drivin or editin or whatever their abilities fitted em for,

Then instead of havin a lot of schools all over the country, why couldn't they just have some television studios for the teachers and keep the children at home? at the family home a few miles That'd save a lot of money on school buildings, in fact, he figured a school district could buy a television set and put up the antenna for evening, following a long illness. every home in the district cheaper than it could build and maintain Funeral services were held at the elaborate school buildings and run busses and hire a flock of teachers, "And, the representation of Baptist Church Friday afternoon at a janitor, a superintendent, two or three principals, pay for floor sweep and utilities, etc. Under this system, there wouldn't be any dressin for school, no

mad rush to get breakfast and get there on time, no lunches to fix, no books to forget, no crises over lost caps and coats, etc. Just have your kids seated in front of the television set in their pajamas or whatever they had on, no sense even in combin their hair, every morning at nine, switch it on, and have one set of teachers teachin the entire nation, with maybe a fresh set in each time zone to keep from throwin things off schedule.

He figured under this system the country could save probably seventy-five per cent of its present school bill, every child would have a first-rate teacher, and equality of education would be achieved from the rock-ribbed coast of Maine to the shores of Tripoli, or however far you can get good TV reception without too much snow.

Now I'll admit this idea has certain appeals, everybody wants to save money and improve the quality of education at the same time, but it won't work.

The reason it won't work is that it ignores one of the primary functions of a school, which is to get your kids out from under foot at least from nine to five five days a week, nine months out of the year. Some things can't be valued in money. It doesn't make any difference what a school system costs, if it gets the kids out of the house, it's worth it. A TV set makes a pretty good baby sitter from four to six in the afternoon, but it'll never replace the public school, day in and day out.

Q-As a World War II veteran, bought a house with a GI loan. I had to sell it when I was called back into the armed forces after the Korean conflict began. Now that I have been discharged again. am I entitled to another GI loan to purchase another house?

A-It is possible for you to get new and full loan guarantee rights under the new Korean GI Bill. You should apply to the VA regional office for a new certificate of entitlement.

Q-I have a service-connected disability which has been rated zero percent by the VA. My ailment is bothering me, and I think I might be entitled to compensation pay-Abilene visited Mr. and Mrs. Fred ments. How do I go about apply-

> A-You should present evidence to the VA and request a review of your rating.

> Q-I'm planning to attend college under the Korean GI Bill. What happens if my entitlement runs out while I'm just part way through a school semester? Would I be allowed to continue?

A-If your entitlement expires after the half-way mark of the semester, you would be permitted to complete that semester with Government financial assistance.

Q-May I train under the Korean GI Bill in a school outside the United States?

A-Yes, provided your course will be taken in an approved institution of higher learning.




INVENTORY

It's inventory time on the farm, and it's also a good time to take an inventory of "star boarders" about the place. In case you've forgotten, a star boarder is an individual that eats more than he pays for. There are many of them in the chicken yards, dairy stalls and pig pens. A check of their records will point them out.

Hens that do not lay more than 10 eggs in a year are "boarders" that do not pay for their keep. "An egg a day will keep the axe away," should be sufficient warning. Cows that won't give two gallons of milk a day or 5,000 pounds a year are not worth their keep. Runt pigs making poor gains are "boarders". Here are some good places to reduce the inventory.







Include All Business Income, Expenses When

Be sure you include all your business income and all your busiand cheerful weather work in this last annual financial report was ness expenses when you prepare that 1952 income and social security tax return. This reminder was given this week in a statement issued jointly by H. C. Broaddus, Division Chief, Bureau of Internal Revenue, and Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Social Security Administration office in Abilene.

Most self-employed people are now covered under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act, and receive credits toward retirement payments and survivors payments just as do employed persons. The self-employed person makes his social security report, and pays his social security tax, along with his income tax return. This applies to all self-employed persons who have a net profit of at least \$400 for the year, except for farm and ranch operators, and certain professional

Particular caution should be used by persons whose income is low to be sure that the tax return is filed if due, and to be sure that credit is taken for all business expenses. For example, a self-employed person who has two dependents and a gross income of less than \$1,200 may not think it important to include all his business expenses, since he obviously will owe no regular income tax. It is important that the amount be figured accurately, though, as he will owe social security tax if his net is as much as \$400, and this tax should be paid on the correct amount of

If not all business income is included, or if not all business deductions are taken, the return may be questioned by the Director of Internal Revenue, or the social security credits may be questioned by the Social Security Administration.
