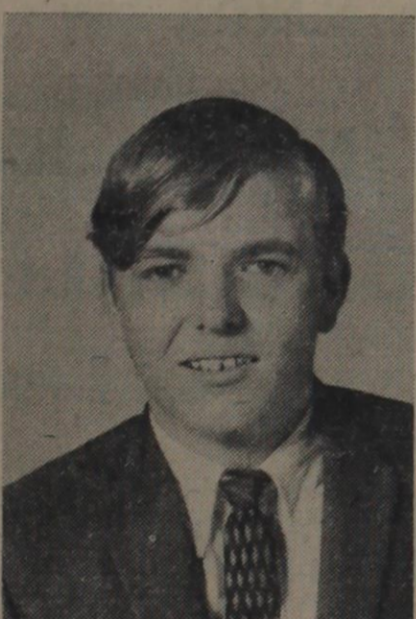
She participated in track two years, basketball four years winning all-tournament guard at Cross Plains and Rising Star and all-district guard her senior year.

## Inch And Half Rain Falls Sunday

Scattered showers fell over the Cross Plains area last Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

In Cross Plains the two-day precipitations totaled 1.46. The rain, though, became very light at the western edge of town. Noah Johnson, who lives three miles west on State Highway 36, received only .20 of an inch. Burkett had .71. Cross, Cut a little more than Cross Plains, Rising Star about the same as here, Sabanno and Cottonwood only a trace.

East of Cross Cut some farm ponds were said to have been replenished, however, the area

receiving enough rain to run water was reported small.

Pastures south and west of Cross Plains are said to be suffering most. Grass is short and sources of livestock water are low.

Through the first 131 days of 1971 only 4.19 inches of rain has been recorded in Cross Plains. In January measurements totaled .08, February .76, March none, April .89 and thus far in May 1.46.

Small hailstones fell in Cross Plains with Sunday afternoon's shower, however, no particular damage was reported. Baird was also said to have had hail, but it hit that city Saturday.

## Four Teachers Resign Posts In Local School

Cross Plains school board accepted four resignations in regular meeting Monday night. Two faculty members are entering retirement and two others are reported leaving the profession.

At least one of the vacancies is believed already filled, and Superintendent of Schools Wayne Ford said Tuesday morning that all replacements were expected to be made within two weeks.

"We have more applications for teaching positions than I have ever seen before," Ford declared.

Entering retirement are Mrs. D. C. Lee and Mrs. Raymond DeBusk, and leaving the profession are Lee Bulls and Mrs. W. R. Taylor.

Mrs. Lee is completing 43 years in public education, 35 of which were with the Cross Plains school system. Primarily she has been a high school social science instructor, however, through the years she served at intervals as an English and Spanish teacher and school librarian.

Mrs. DeBusk's tenure includes 42 years as a teacher, 26 of which were with the local system. She has been an elementary instructor, being currently

assigned to the third grade. Through the years she has coached many students in literary events for U.I.L. competition and been interested adviser and friend.

When former students speak of school days and recall outstanding teachers under whom they studied, the names DeBusk and Lee are heard often.

Resigning to enter the ministry is Lee Bulls, director of the Buffalo Band. He has been in the teaching profession five years, the last two of which were with the local system. His bands and stage bands here have scored high in interscholastic competition.

The other teacher leaving the profession is Mrs. W. R. Taylor, who is completing one year with the local school system. Her husband is student counsellor for Callahan County schools, and she will become a full time homemaker.

Don Jobe, who has been serving as a teacher's aide in the local school system, was elected Monday night to fill the vacancy caused by Mrs. Lee's resignation. His former position as a teacher's aide, working in the five higher grades, will be offered to Bayless Pope, who is now in Vietnam.

# Local Man Hailed As 'Top Conservation Rancher' In This Part Of Texas

C. M. Garrett's recent selection as the "Outstanding Conservation Rancher" of this area was preceded by a nomination brochure, prepared by Soil Conservation Service personnel, which highlighted his activities over the past 24 years.

Excerpts from the book are reproduced here for the interest that they contain to the many friends of the Cross Plains man and soil conservationists in general.

"C. M. Garrett of Cross Plains has been an outstanding leader in his community, and the Central Soil and Water District is more than pleased to nominate him for the 'Outstanding Conservation Rancher' of the Texas Conservation Awards Program.

"Garrett bought his first land consisting of 385 acres 24 years ago. It was located in the West

Cross Timber "blow sand" which was hit hard during "dust bowl" times of the early 1930's. He requested assistance from the district Oct. 2, 1948, at which time he developed a conservation plan with help of the SCS.

"Sandy soils made up a large portion of his farm and he soon learned that sandy fields could not be left bare for the relentless wind. His conservation plan included use of vetch and rye to build up the soil fertility level so his sandy soils would grow grass.

"In 1947, Garrett started his grass program by seeding one short row of weeping lovegrass in his back yard. This seeding was increased to 12 acres the next year. With some of the "know-how" from this weeping lovegrass he seeded 25 acres of a mixture of grasses

consisting of sideoats grama, King Ranch Bluestem, and Little Bluestem. He also seeded 50 acres of Little and Big bluestems with KR bluestem, blue panic and Indian grass.

"In 1951, Garrett was elected supervisor of Zone 2 of the district primarily because he was becoming known by his neighbors as a leader in conservation. He served two terms as district supervisor. Soil Conservation District equipment was maintained by him for 16 years. He gave unselfishly of his time to help others in planning, application and management of grass plantings.

"While a supervisor, Garrett was the first to recognize the need for a Flood Prevention Program on Turkey Creek and the Upper Pecan Bayou Watersheds. In 1958, he helped organize Turkey Creek Conserva-

tion District and now construction on both watersheds has been completed.

"Garrett served as president of Cross Plains Riding Club, and conducted many trail rides on ranches where good conservation practices could be pointed out.

"In 1967, Garrett had been working on his grassland restoration program for 21 years. During this time his conservation plan on his home place had been completed. In order to accelerate his conservation program on two additional tracts, he entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract with the SCS.

"Complete restoration of the rangeland on the last 601-acre tract was needed to make it a paying livestock operation. Garrett's first practices were to remove the brush by rootplowing, with a strip pattern being left for deer and other wildlife. The brush control was followed

by reseeding with proven strains of native and introduced grasses. Cross fences were installed which have enabled him to manage the livestock on his ranch in a grazing system which will continue to improve grasses.

"Garrett's enthusiasm for restoring the productivity of the soil has not only benefited his farm, but he has also passed it on to another generation. His son and son-in-law have bought adjoining farms, which are also being restored to former fertility. Garrett poultry Farm has been operated by his son since 1957.

"The conservation program and sound ranching practices have also been recognized by other organizations. He has been recognized by the Lions Club as "Outstanding District Farmer" and also by Texas

Bank & Trust Co. of the Outstanding District

"Garrett always visits his ranch to hand knowledge which he has acquired over the past 24 years. He seeks to find better grasses. He is preserving improved strains and Old World blue

"The board of directors of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, M. Garrett of Cross Plains, the "Outstanding Conservation Rancher."

Garrett will be honored on Thursday night at a banquet at the Coleman, when the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District presents a plaque in recognition of the "Outstanding Conservation Rancher" within its area.

**HOME HINTS**

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Candlelight and lanterns weren't much, but they had to do. Then Edison came along and the whole world lit up. Are you satisfied with the lighting in your world? Or do you hit your head on the living room fixture, read by an annoying glare, and squint in to the corner of the living room?

Most of us are annoyed at times by the lighting in our homes. Some of it, particularly when we rent, cannot be cured. But there are some principles we can apply to those lighting situations we can alter.

Remember these things: Cornice and valance lighting throws light directly downward, onto the drapes, and up to the ceiling to be reflected into the room. Diffused light from a hanging fixture works best on a high ceiling where it will hang well above the tall person's head.

Lights at eye level, unless shielded, will be annoying. Hang dining table lights above the eye level of a seated person. Chairside lamps' shades should extend below eye level so good lighting can be given to reading material without a glare from a bulb that can be seen when seated. Lamps should be 28 to 30 inches high for medium or low tables.

Lights on the headboard of the bed or on the wall behind it should extend forward at least 10 or 12 inches so they can throw light in front of the head and onto the reading material of the person in bed.

A small barrel-shaped shade will throw the light up on the ceiling and down on the table but will not allow it to spread out at all.

In general, do not depend on a decorative fixture to give reading light or to provide all of the room light. When choosing such a fixture remember that it will cast the color of its bowl on everything around it.

The background of light fixtures is important, too; if it is dark the fixture will appear much brighter (a white light against dark paneling, for example). A bright fixture will not be so bright against a light wall.

You can create areas with light. A hanging fixture at the door, for example, will spotlight the entryway and create an entry hall effect.

### Everett E. Edington Dies Unexpectedly

Everett E. Edington, 55, prominent Burkett area farmer-stockman, died unexpectedly Wednesday morning of last week. He was stricken with an apparent heart attack shortly after 6 a.m. at his home, southwest of Burkett, and was dead on arrival at Overall-Morris Hospital in Coleman.

Funeral was held Thursday afternoon from a Coleman chapel with the Rev. Guy Perdue, officiating.

Burial was in City Cemetery at Coleman.

Mr. Edington was stricken suddenly and passed away en route to the hospital.

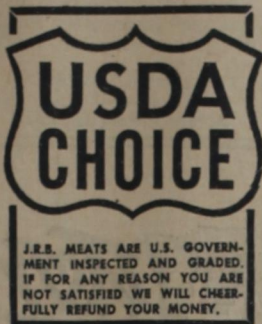

# Callahan County Gets OK On Grazing Deferred Land

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that haying and grazing privileges on cropland taken out of production under the Cropland Program were offered in 11 additional counties in Texas where severe drought has greatly reduced the availability of pasture forage. They are Bandera, Baylor, Callahan, Castro, Denton, Gaines, Hale, Hartley, Martin, Ochiltree and Roberts.

Although some light rains have fallen over some areas of Texas, the drought has continued. Range conditions are generally from five to twenty percent of normal for this time of the year. Wheat and oat crops are furnishing practically no grazing and a considerable acreage of wheat has been abandoned. The usable forage on the CAP acreage will provide some relief in help liquidation of live-

stock herds, Burleson said. There are now a total of 144 Texas counties eligible for haying and grazing privileges, including eight still eligible from a designation in 1970.

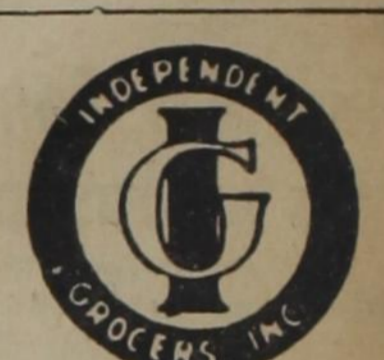

## Oldest Rowden Resident Is Colorful Ranchman, 89

Despite two near-fatal accidents and the fact that he's approaching 90 years of age, Jerry McDonald, Rowden's oldest citizen is busy at both livestock raising and trading. He's in regular attendance at cattle and hog auctions and keeps abreast of day-to-day market fluctuations.

Born in Milam County Jan. 11, 1882, Jerry, as he has been affectionately known by three generations of Callahan Countians, married Mattie McMillan in the Autumn of 1905. They came to this area a few years later and he went to work for the late J. B. Cutbirth on the latter's Burnt Branch Ranch.

When Powell & Leggett subdivided the Johnson Ranch in 1910, the McDonalds were among the first buyers of land. They paid \$20 an acre for an 83-acre tract, south of the present Rowden store, which became their home. A few years later an adjoining 83 was bought, this time for \$25 an acre.

"The prairies were bald and fertile," he recalls, "a man could stick a plow in anywhere and plant a crop."

Thirteen children were born to the McDonalds, nine of whom survive. All were reared at the Rowden homestead. They are: Mrs. Carl (Jo) Washburn of Comanche, Henry McDonald of near Baird, Cecil McDonald of Arizona, Ned McDonald who spends much of his time with his father at Rowden, Mrs. Don (Ruby Fay) Higgins of Odessa, Mrs. Jake (Potter) Childers of Cross Plains, Ray McDonald of California, Mrs. Hope Manning of Odessa, and Clovis McDonald of Austin.

Mrs. McDonald passed away in 1965, and Jerry has lived alone a great deal since then.

"It gets lonesome at times," he says, "so I just go visit some of the folks or neighbors."

No present resident of the Rowden community was an adult there when Jerry arrived 60-odd years ago, though, several were children whose parents he knew well.

"It's been nice to have such wonderful neighbors and good friends," Jerry stresses.

Although he's a frequent visit-

or in Cross Plains, Jerry likes to go to Baird on Saturdays. That's the force of long habit. He used to drive there on Saturday in a wagon, load up with supplies and then come home the following day.

Accidents have left him with a limp and he moves slower than he would like, but he's seldom seen without a smile. A radiant countenance seems as much a part of his attire as are his cowman's hat and boots.

"I guess I smile because I have so many pleasant memories to recall," the well-known, widely-loved Rowden man explains.

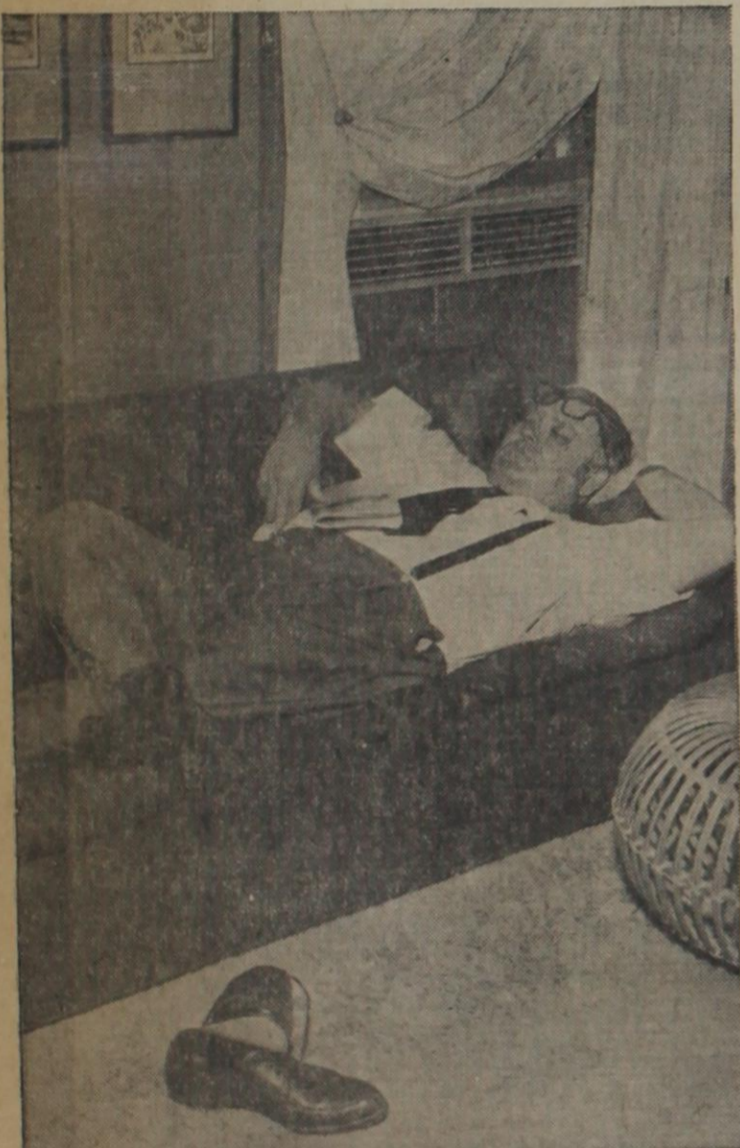

Persons with sick hogs are advised to telephone directly the Breckenridge inspector, whose number is 817 559-2244. If he is not immediately available callers are asked to leave their number with motel operator. The motel switchboard, though, is closed from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.

On all swine to be sold at Eastland or Abilene auctions on Tuesday, producers are advised to call the county agent's office or the area office in Breckenridge before Saturday at noon. For the Ranger sale on Thursday, all calls should be in by Tuesday at 5 p.m.
