The FFA of today grew out of the small "agriculture clubs" that rapidly spread across the country some years ago. FFA was first organized in Kansas City, Mo. in 1928. At

the first convention, 33 voting delegates were present, representing 18 states. By the time the organization was ten years old, it had grown

to more than 4,000 chapters and 49 chartered associations. In 1939, the organization purchased twenty-eight and a half

acres of land which was part of George Washington's original estate and established an FFA Still Critical camp. At this time, there were 245,830 members representing 7,542 chapters.

The FFA was first organized in 1928 in Kansas City, Missouri. At this first convention 33 voting delegates were present, representing the 18 states that attended.

By the time the organization was ten years old it had grown to over 4,000 chapters and 49 chartered state associations. This was in 1938. Then a year later in 1939, the organization purchased 28 1/2 acres of land which was part of George Washington's original estate and estime there were 245,830 members representing 7,542 chap-






