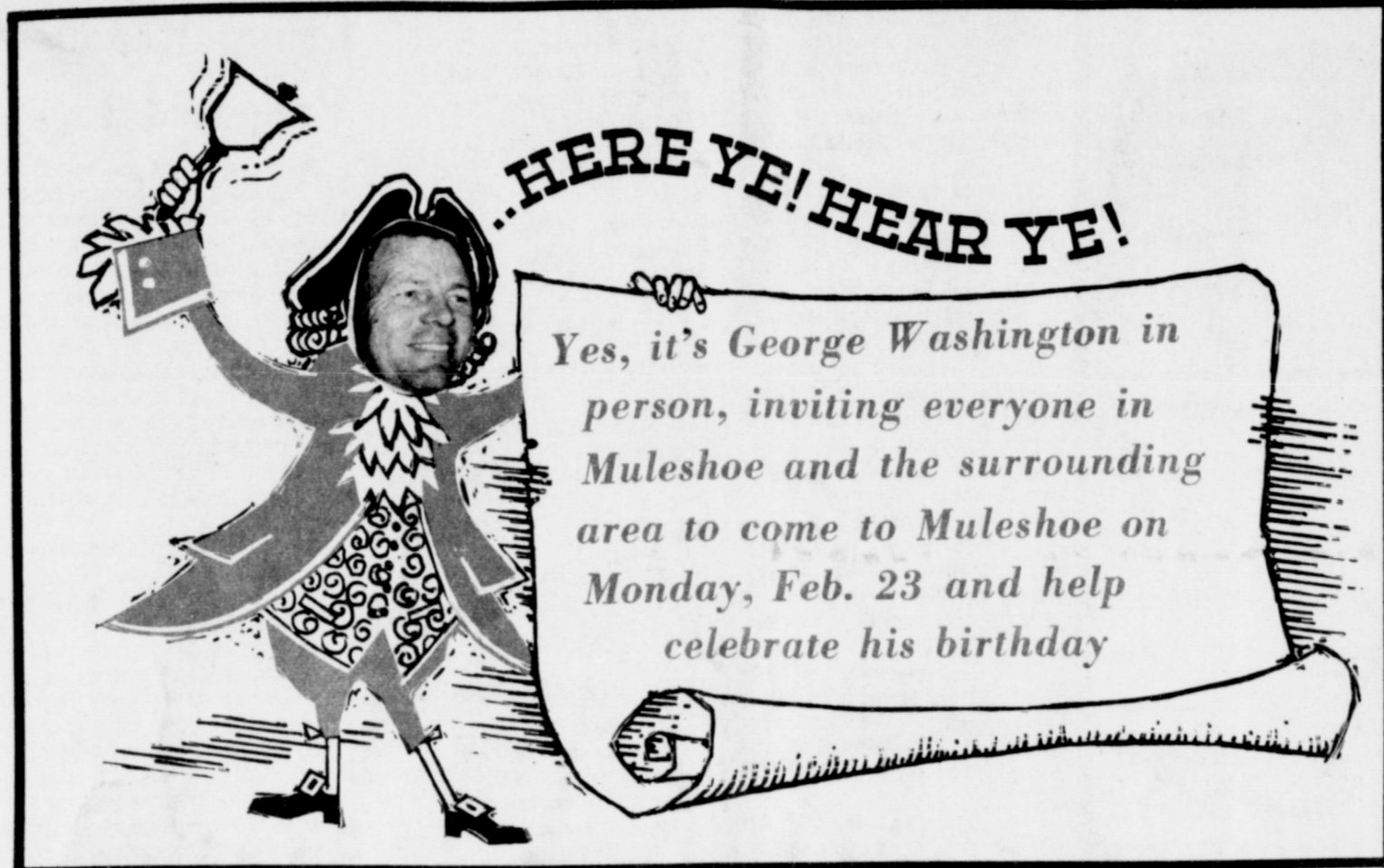

FFA Members Join 4-H Clubs for Shows

Muleshoe joins the nation this week in honoring the Future Farmers of America. This organization has grown from its original small size during the year it was organized, 1928, to a present national organization representing more than 454,000 members in 10,000 chapters.

The FFA of today grew out of the small "agriculture clubs" that rapidly spread across the country some years ago.

FFA was first organized in Kansas City, Mo. in 1928. At the first convention, 33 voting delegates were present, representing 18 states.

By the time the organization was ten years old, it had grown to more than 4,000 chapters and 49 chartered associations. In 1939, the organization purchased twenty-eight and a half acres of land which was part of George Washington's original estate and established an FFA camp. At this time, there were 245,830 members representing 7,542 chapters.

In Muleshoe, there are 116 members in the Future Farmers of America, President of the local group is Chuck Roming; Sandy Noble, reporter; J.C. Slaughter, Sentinel; Gary Ethridge, vice president; Bill Bruns, secretary; Jesse Clements, parliamentarian; Jerry Scoggin, attendant at state convention and Terry Gunter, chairman.

Local advisors and instructors are Keith Bray and Bill Bickel.

President Chuck Roming said, "The FFA members enjoy more freedom today than any other organization of its type. It is a great self-governing body that has its own constitution and by-laws based on democratic principles. It is run by a set of officers, elected by the members, under the supervision and council of adult sponsors.

"A person who is a member of the FFA learns many varied things. Among other things, he learns to conduct a meeting according to proper parliamentary procedure rules, to be able to speak in public, solve his problems as they arise and to take on responsibility as it is handed to him.

"The FFA member learns things which will be of use to him for the rest of his life."

A relatively new program in the local FFA chapter is cooperative part-time on the job training. In this phase of FFA, the boys go to class for one hour a day then go to work in the afternoon.

Local Resident Still Critical After Stabbing

J.C. 'Alabama' Murphy is reported to be in critical condition in Lubbock Methodist Hospital after a stabbing at his home Tuesday night.

He was stabbed seven times, one of the stab wounds puncturing a lung, shortly before 11 p.m. Tuesday, Sheriff Dee Clements said Murphy was reported to be hemorrhaging internally from a main artery wound in his back.

Sheriff Clements said no charges have been filed pending further investigation.

Also on Tuesday night, a Muleshoe resident reported his pickup had been stolen. The man driving the allegedly stolen pickup was apprehended and found to be wanted in McKinney for stealing another pickup. The pickup taken from McKinney was found at a local firm where it had been taken for repairs.

On Friday morning, a short time after midnight, a local service station operator reported to the sheriff's office that a young man filled his car with gas and sped out of the station without paying for the gas. City Policeman Forist Williams chased the vehicle to the west and Palmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace joined the chase. The driver was not apprehended until he reached Clovis. Officers reported speeds of more than 100 miles an hour during the chase.

The young man was found to be wanted in Lubbock for assault with intent to murder, wanted in Lubbock, Abernathy and Levelland for gas theft and wanted in Clovis for murder.

FFA youngsters of Muleshoe will exhibit their barrows at the 1970 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, to be held February 25th through March 8th.

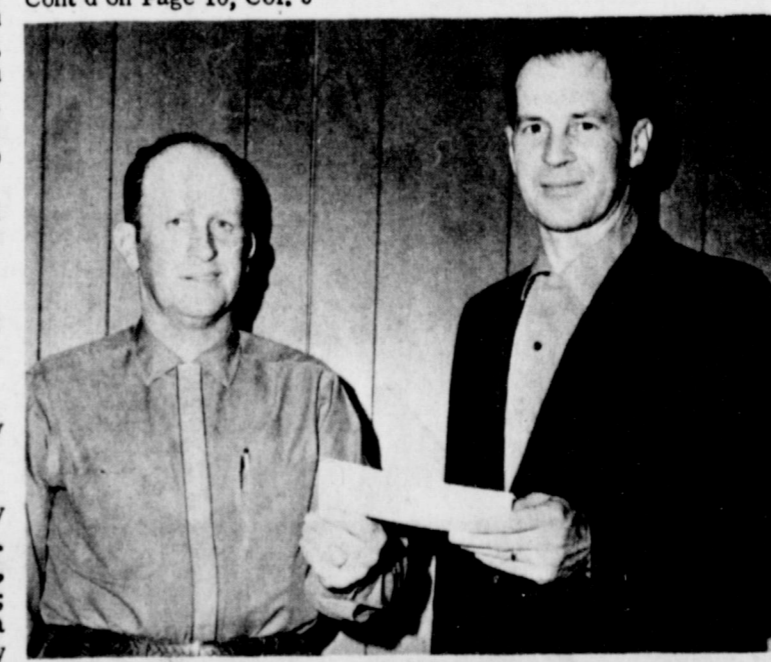

Congressman Boosts New Farm Program

(Waco) - In an address to a state-wide meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau, Congressman Bob Price called on the Nixon Administration to come to grips with farm problems and the farm program.

Price declared, "The farm program must not be a casualty of inflation. America draws its strength from its land and its products. Our economy and forty per cent of our labor force depends directly or indirectly on the well-being of the agricultural sector. As a society we simply cannot afford to lose sight of this fundamental fact."

The Texas Republican observed that for the last eight months, the House Agriculture Committee and the Secretary of Agriculture have been meeting in an effort to hammer out a new farm program.

"In these meetings, I have maintained that farmers are entitled to increases in benefits, just as other federal programs are increased to meet rising needs," Price said.

"I have urged Secretary Hardin to take the farmers' case to the Bureau of the Budget and convince the watchdogs of the federal purse strings that Rural America, with its farms, farm families, and rural communities, needs and is entitled to equal treatment with other sectors to society," he added.

Price observed that a proposed "Agricultural Act 1970" has been developed as the result of many work sessions and discussions between officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and members of the House Committee on Agriculture. He said "The proposal is now being carefully studied, debated, and refined by the House Agriculture Committee."

Grain Sorghum Group Rejects Proposed Law

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association rejected provisions of Secretary Hardin's proposed "set aside feed grain program." The seventy GSPA board members and representatives who met in Amarillo Monday, February 16, decided that the set aside program would, (1) create a surplus production of feed, (2) require too much diversion without diversion payments and (3) not maintain farm income at adequate levels.

Glenn A. Weir, Director of the Grain Division, USDA, Washington, D.C. met with the GSPA board to explain the "set aside approach." Members of the board present covered virtually every area of the High Plains grain producing area. GSPA Executive Director, Elbert Harp, explained that, "many of our farmers would have to divert over one-third of their farm, without pay, to comply with the grain, cotton, and wheat programs."

Jane Williams-Lazbuddie Homemaker of Tomorrow

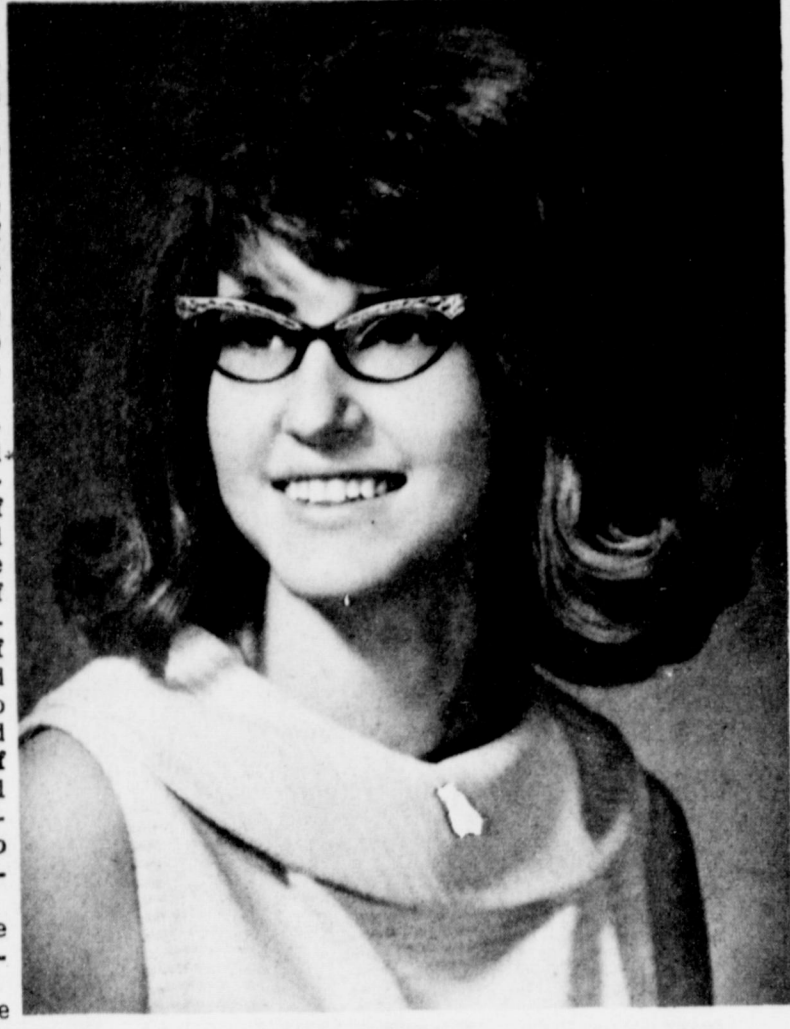

A tireless businessman and accountant, Washington wrote some 18,000 letters during a time when all letters were written by longhand.
As a statesman, history has recorded his feats and he remains today, as he did during his own time, "The Father of Our Country."
