A special NON-TOXIC SMOKE will be used in these tests. This smoke

manufactured for this purpose, and leaves no residuals or stains and has no effects on plant or animal life. The smoke has distinctive, but not unpleasant, odor. Visibility and odor last only a few minutes, where there is adequate ventilation.

Because the plumbing fixtures in your house or building are connected to the sanitary sewer system, some of this smoke may enter your house or building if the:

\*vents connected to your building's sewer pipes are inadequate, defective or improperly installed;

\*traps under sinks, tubs, basins, showers and other drains are defective, improperly installed or missing;

\*pipes, connections and seals of the wastewater drain system in and under your building are damaged, defective, have plugs improperly

installed or missing. All residents are advised that if traces of this smoke or its odor enter your house or building, it is an indication that gases and odors from the sewer also may enter. These can be both unpleasant and dangerous, as well as a health hazard to the occupants. Location, identification and correction of the source of smoke that enters your house is urgently advised.



#### Fire Department

Baird sent one truck to assist Shackleford County firemen Thursday with a one thousand acre fire on the Nail Ranch. Baird Fire Chief Tom Windham said he worked his truck with four other departments during the day and the Texas Forest Service had their Black-Hawk helicopters battling the blaze also.

Baird firemen responded to two other alarms last week in the county. Friday evening four trucks were dispatched to a residence south of Baird on Co. Rd. 248, the occupants had smoke in the house due to an electrical short. The second alarm was a grass fire east of Baird on I-20 Saturday evening.

AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush is held in high esteem by Texans, according to new ratings in a Texas Poll telephone survey conducted Feb. 21 to March 1.

Bush's job-approval rating of 70 percent is the highest received by a Texas governor in the last 10 years. The survey was conducted for Harte-Hanks Communications by the Office of Survey Research at the University of Texas.

"Gov. Bush is flattered that the people of Texas think he is doing a good job," said the governor's press secretary, Karen Hughes.

Hughes said Texans seem to appreciate Bush's ability to work with the Legislature and his willingness to share credit with Democratic leaders, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who presides over the state Senate and House Speaker Pete Laney.

Bush's approval rating eclipses that of his recent predecessors: Ann Richards peaked at 60 percent in spring 1994; Bill Clements managed a 36 percent mark after taking office in 1987; and Mark White's highwater mark was 42 percent in the winter of 1986.

Poll respondents over age 60 gave Bush the highest marks of any age group. The breakdown by party affiliation was as follows: 88 percent favored Bush's job perfor- and 397 of those were issued to mance; independents, 66 percent; males. Of the grand total, women

and Democrats, 63 percent.

The poll also showed that Republican U.S. Sens. Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison both have improved their job approval ratings from 53 percent each last summer to 57 percent for both officials today.

Topping the list as the most important problem in the state was crime, indicated 21 percent of the respondents.

Moses to Stop Granting Waivers No more skipping final exams

More than 582 Texas public school districts have waivers from the commissioner that let them collect funding for those students on days they are absent during finals. Schools receive about \$25 a day per student.

"The state has been paying for days when students were not present. I don't feel comfortable with that. I don't believe I have the authority to do that, and besides, I have a philosophical problem with students' not taking final exams," Moses told the Dallas Morning

When students go to a university, they may find themselves unprepared to take required final exams, Moses said.

Samuel Edwards was born in Debray's Brigade in the Alabama in 1844. He Trans-Mississippi came to Texas in 1854 Department. and to Callahan County in 1883. Samuel married Martha Bell 99 casualties at Cox's on October 13, 1870 in Plantation and 7 at the county of Hood in Bayou Bourbeau. Later the state of Texas. She it moved to Huntsville, was born in Georgia August 26, 1853, Martha died June 14, 1938 and was buried in the Clyde Cemetery.

The records show S.T. Edwards was a private in Company K, 5th Texas Cavalry, Tom Green's Brigade, Confederate State Army, enlisted July 28.

Union Prisoner of War records show that he was captured June 1863 Donaldsonville and received at City Point, Va. July 6, 1863 as a Confederate prisoner of war, paroled for exchange.

Date of discharge 1865 at April Montgomery, Texas.

The 5th Texas Cavalry Regiment was formed at San Antonio, Texas during the late summer of 1861 with about 1,000 officers and men. Most of it's members were from Waco, San Antonio, Bonham, Weatherford, and Austin.

After serving with the Army of New Mexico it was assigned Green's,

Tipton Hardeman's, and

The 5th fought in Louisiana and reported Texas and disbanded before the surrender in June, 1865.

Edwards departed this life on March 24, 1917 in Clyde, Texas and was buried in the Clyde Cemetery, Callahan County, Texas.

To your strength will be given the defense of the confederate soldier's name, the guardianship history, the emulation of his virtues, and the perpetuation of those principles he loved. 


