Retired Manager Of Higginbothams Dies

T. J. Williams, 97, of Comanche, former general manager of all Higginbotham stores died Monday at 1:10 p.m. after an illness of about two months. Funeral is scheduled at 2 p.m. Wednesday. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery at Comanche.

He was born April 2, 1874, on the Bosque River near Claiborne. He was the son of the late Thomas and Sarah Higginbotham Williams.

He was married Dec. 29, 1897, to Julia Evridge, who preceded him in death Jan. 13, 1948.

Mr. Williams started to work for R. W. Higginbotham and J. N. Higginbotham as bookkeeper in Dublin in 1890. In 1901, he was transferred to Comanche as the manager of their local retail store. During his management, the Higginbotham stores expanded to a chain of retail outlets and lumber yards.

In 1931 he became president and general manager of all Higginbotham stores and lumber yards. He served in this capacity until he retired in 1959, at the age of 85.

Survivors include two sons, two daughters, 12 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren.

Bond Sales High In Area Counties

Through the first four months of 1971 citizens of Comanche County had purchased 41 per cent of their quota of government bonds for the year. With sales during April totaling \$12,685, Jack W. Moore, Comanche bond sales chairman, reported the aggregate for the year at \$66,052.

Callahan County with a quota of \$130,000 had bought 37 per cent of its annual goal. Howard E. Farmer, chairman, announced April sales were \$4,844 bringing the total for the first four months to \$47,516.

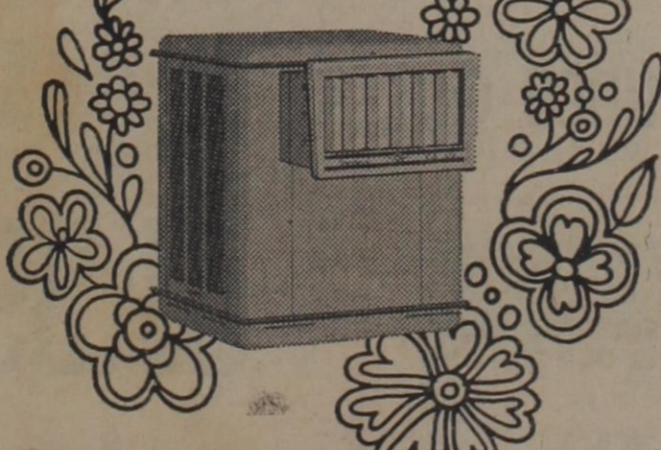
Brown County ranked next in this immediate area with purchases standing at 33 per cent through April. Sales for that month were \$32,469, which H. L. Evans, Jr. chairman, announced brought the 1971 aggregate to \$110,151.

Robert I. Bowen, Jr., Coleman County's bond sales chairman, reported April purchases of \$12,772, giving the county a total of \$38,489 thus far this year. That is 32 per cent of the annual assignment.

Eastland County, which has no bond sales chairman, has reached 25 per cent of its 1971 assessment. April purchases were \$7,478. Total for the year now stands at \$74,917.

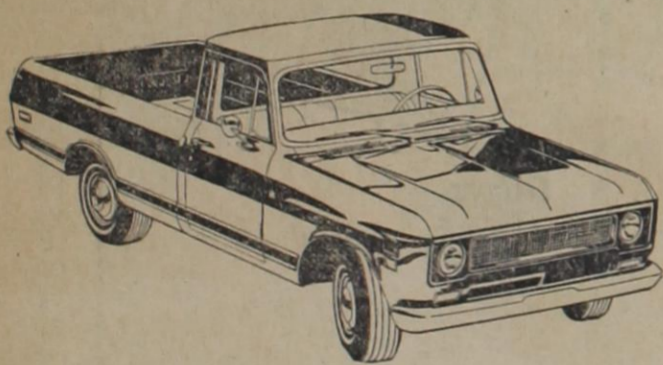

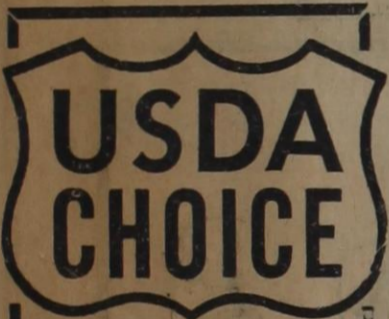

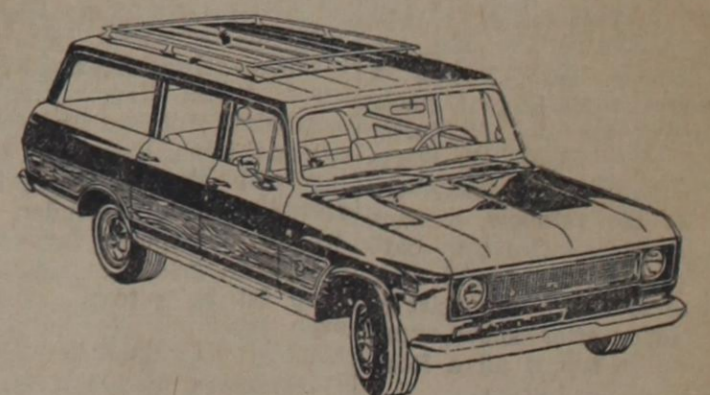
Managers are needed for the senior teenage team, for which "several players have signed", according to outgoing executive vice-president R. C. Merryman. Opening date was not known here for the senior league.

3rd Graders Fete Retiring Teacher

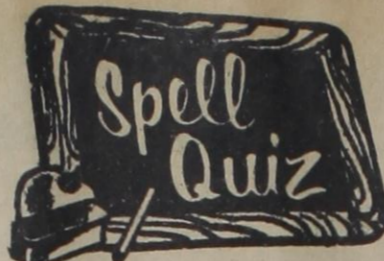
The final hour of 42 years of school teaching may have been the happiest for Mrs. Raymond DeBusk, who retired from the profession at end of the recent term.

Swine Quarantine To Be Continued

The 60-day Texas statewide hog cholera quarantine order has been officially extended until further notice, according to Gregory Gerngross, Callahan County Farm Agent. All precautions of the previous quarantine order will remain in effect with the precaution to be added to the new order effective May 28, 1971. "While this statewide quarantine order is in effect, all swine shall be quarantined for 30 days at the premise of the purchaser and no movement from such premise except for slaughter shall be allowed for the period of the quarantine. This premise quarantine will automatically expire after the 30th day."

Twenty-two cases of cholera have been found in Texas since the beginning of the statewide quarantine, but officials, both federal and state, are convinced that if movement is restricted for a while longer, the state will be disease-free by the end of 1972.

Until further notice, permits will have to be obtained for all movement of swine as in the past 60 days. Violators of this order will be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction, will be fined.

Producers wishing to have swine inspected are to call the County Agent's office or the Area Hog Cholera office at Breckenridge.

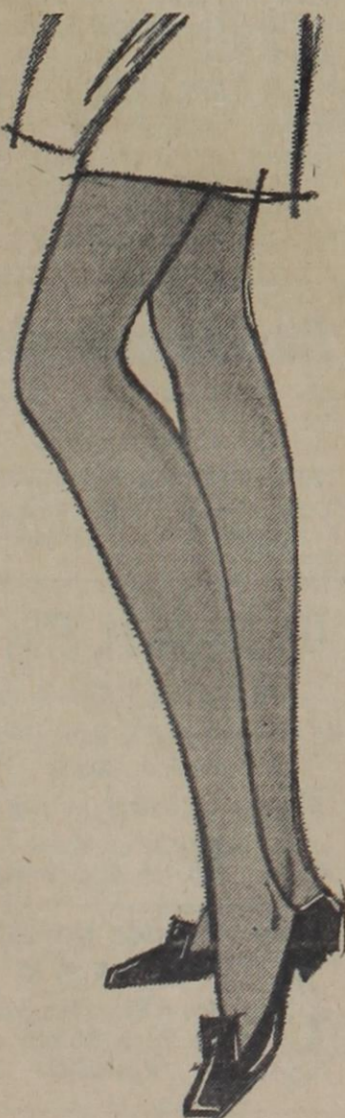
