R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains returned home last week from a lake in the interior of Mexico where he and three Andrews athletic coaches - one of whom was his son. Robert Allenlanded 504 pounds of bass. They strung nothing else.

The group, which also included Bill Green and Gordon O'dell, fished one week at El Granero Lake, a body of water formed by a dam across the Rio Hondo, east of Chihuahua City.

The trip was primarily to test artificial lures, manufactured by a firm composed of five members of the public school faculty at Andrews, another of whom is Ed Henry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Henry of Rising Star.

"It was pretty well agreed", says the Cross Plains man, 'that these fellows have perfected a bait that fish seem unable to resist"

Needham says the fish were so attracted by the lures, the best of which were plastic worms, that often as he reeled in a catch other fish would follow close to the boat.

The Andrews teachers have been working on artificial lures for fishermen for more than three years and have field tested all types of their creations. The best are now going on sale and Needham will demonstrate and explain their use at a Brownwood shopping center Thursday, Friday and Saturday. He plans appearances at other Texas cities during coming weeks.

Also, he said, Congressman Omar Burleson and the two Texas Senators should be contacted and requested to intervene with Secretary Volpe in the matter of retaining present exemptions, or at least in modifying proposed regulations so that they will not be so damaging to agriculture.

Farm Bureau is requesting that present exemptions be retained, he said. In event this is impossible, the Farm Bureau is asking that the following recommendations be included in any regulations which are issued.

(1) An exemption for small farm trucks under 10,000 lbs. gross weight. This would include pickups. (2) An exemption for local

farm hauling. (3) Postponement of effect-

ive date for six months or more.

(4) A comprehensive educational campaign in news media to let farmers and ranchers know what is about to happen to them.

(5) General distribution of a summary of the regulations.

(6) A procedure for development of permanent regulations based on common sense, actual need and good judgment.
