

They guarded the secret of manufacturing under pain of death for the betrayer and imprisoment for his family, but nevertheless the secret spread to France. In France the craft became even more refined than that of the Venetians.

The method of manufacturing was complicated. Hollow cylinders of glass were blown first. These were split, flattened. polished, and the backs coated with a silvery amalgam. The
