Although the Cross Plains Buffaloes did not have a championship season, the team got it all together last Friday at Dublin in blasting the Lions in the District 10-A

The Thundering Herd posted a 3-7 record on the year, an improvement of one game over last year. The Bisons had only a 1-5 league mark, still the unit showed good spirit and never in any game, although far behind in some of the contests, never showed bad sportsmanship and continued to hit hard.

Much credit for the fine aggregation of athletes repreenting Cross Plains on the gridiron this past season, must go to the coaching and character building of Griff M. (Mack) McConal and James (Jim) Birkhimer.

Not a district champion, but who knows about next year, Cross Plains can be justly proud of the 1971 edition of the Buffaloes.

It seems that the open horse show sponsored by the Cross Plains Riding Club here last Saturday did not go well. Several representatives of the sponsoring club were contacted, but no results could be gamered by the Review.

It is hoped that the club will try again because it is always helpful to a community for such events to be held.

Employes of the State of Texas will apparently receive long awaited 6.8 per cent pay increases, denied because of the wage - price freeze. It was not made clear if teachers get raises promised, but not paid because of the freeze.
