Mr., Mrs. Frank Spencer Injured In 2-Car Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spencer, prominent and favorably known Cross Plains area couple, suffered multiple injuries in a two-car accident about 24 miles west of Weatherford Wednesday of last week at 10:45 a.m.

Word received here Tuesday morning revealed that both local longtime residents were "off" the critical list, but remained in poor condition at Harris Memorial Hospital in Fort Worth. They have been in the intensive car unit since being admitted. It was noted that if there are no complications, they expect to be removed from intensive care possibly this week end. Mr. Spencer was still be-

ing given oxygen Tuesday morning.

The Spencers were first taken to a Mineral Wells hospital, but were airlifted by helicopter to the Fort Worth hospital because of extent of injuries.

It was reported that Mr. and Mrs. Spencer were en route to Fort Worth to visit his brother, Haynie, when the accident occurred.

According to investigating Highway Patrolman H. M. Couch of Mineral Wells, the Spencers were traveling east on U. S. Highway 80, when they were involved in a head-on collision with a car driven by Harry Pierce of North Hollywood, Calif. Pierce and his wife were both taken to Palo Pinto General Hospital and were listed in serious condition Wednesday night of last week.

The Spencers' pickup was a total loss, according to local relatives who had seen the vehicle. It was learned here that the crash happened a few miles from intersection of the Mineral Wells road with Highway 80, a section of Interstate 20 which has not yet been converted to four lanes.

Many of the Spencers local relatives have visited with them in Fort Worth. The Spencers' children, Bill of Abilene and Rose Mary (Mrs. H. R. Jefferies) of Paducah, were at the bedside soon after the crash.

Burial was in the New Cottonwood Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

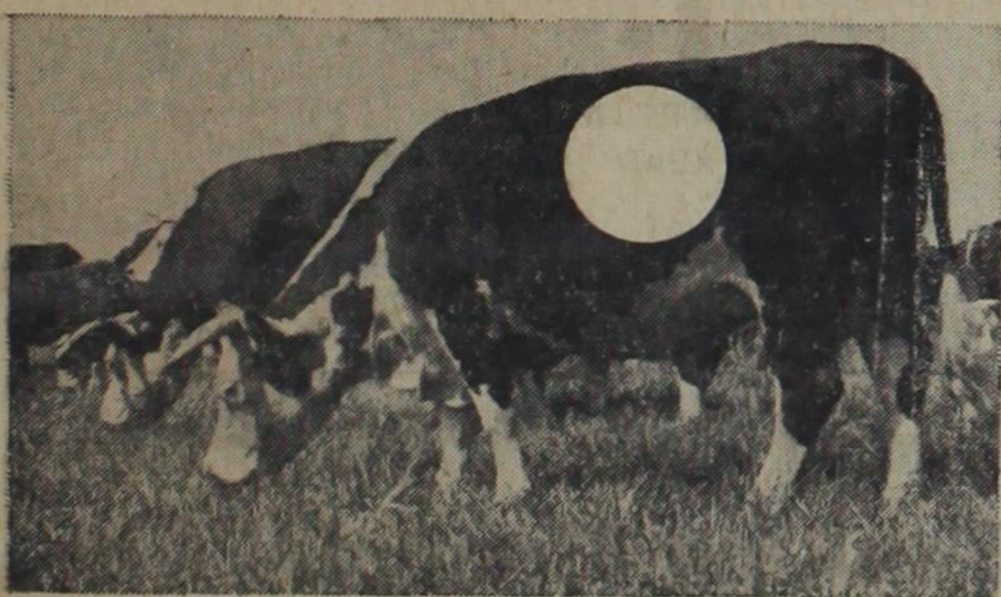
Mr. Champion was born on Dec. 4, 1892, in Cottonwood, and he had lived in that area all of his life. He was a farmer.

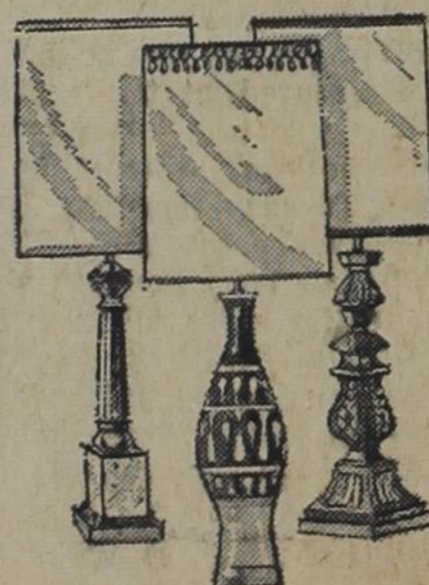

Sheep-Goat Ass'n Sets Referendum

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers members and directors of the association recently voted to sponsor a proposed referendum which would involve 73 counties, 16,704 producers and 5,578,000 head of sheep and goats to raise needed revenue which would go into a predator control program.

The referendum will be held in following area counties: Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Brown and Taylor.

The proposed program calls for the maximum deductions of 20 cents a head on sheep and 10 cents a head on goats, and would be expected to raise over \$400,000, from which 32 new trappers would be hired to help to combat predators by coordinating with the county trappers to assist them in problem areas.

It is not meant to take the place of any predator control work now being done in counties but to add to their present control work. Assessment in the program, if the referendum is passed, will be made on all sheep and goats coming off pasture and/or producer raised lambs going into feedlots. Assessments will be collected and forwarded to the Commodity Board at the end of each month. Collections will be made by any firm or individual who purchases sheep or goats off pasture.

The referendum which would be petitioned to the Commissioners of Agriculture for his certification, would be conducted by mail ballot sent together with a self-addressed, postage-paid envelope to all sheep and goat producers in the 73-county area. Producers would then vote for or against the referendum and elect one director from each of the six districts which comprise the 73 counties. Three directors at large will also be elected, and these directors will make up the producer board of nine directors.

All costs of conducting the referendum will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. The estimated cost of the referendum is \$10,000. If it passes, the producer board can repay the TS&GRA for referendum expenses if it wishes.

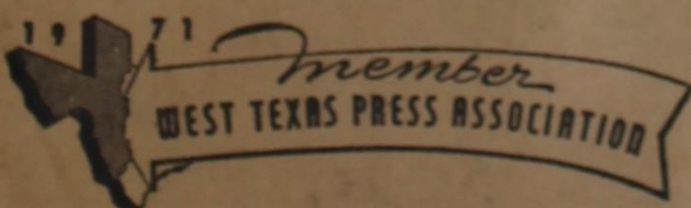

 - 1/2 tsp. each of cinnamon,

- ginger, cloves OR 1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 c. pumpkin
- 3/4 c. milk
- 4 egg whites
- 1/2 pint heavy cream, whipped

Line 9" pie tin. Flute edges. Bake pie crust at 450 degrees F for 10 minutes. Cream butter and brown sugar; stir in nuts. Spread on partly baked shell.

Combine 3/4 c. sugar, gelatin, spices, and salt in top of double boiler. Stir in yolks, pumpkin, and milk. Cook over hot, not boiling, water. Stir constantly for 15 minutes until heated through and gelatin is dissolved. Chill 'till it sets.

Beat egg whites until foamy. Beat in 1/4 c. sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until meringue forms soft peaks. Set bowl in pan of ice. Beat pumpkin gelatin mixture until fluffy. Gently fold into chilled meringue still over ice. Spoon filling into prepared pie shell.

Decorate with a crown of whipped cream and more chopped nuts if desired.

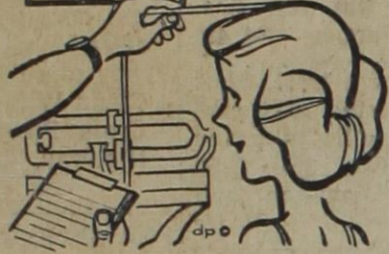

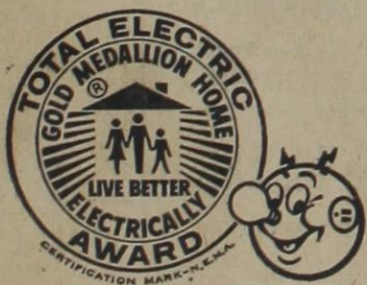
