County Schools Get 79-80 Title | Funds

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announces the approval of a \$92,096.26 Office of Education grant to Callahan County. The allotment of these funds for school year 1979-80 is under provisions of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act as amended by Public Law 95-561. These funds will provide services for children residing in low-income areas and institutionalized services for children residing in low-income areas and institutionalized neglected and delinquent children in state-operated or supported schools who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age. These funds shall become available on July 1, 1979.

The State Department of Education will distribute the funds to the school districts based on the best available data which reflect the current distribution of children in low-income families.
