150 At Cottonwood Marker Dedication

An estimated 150 persons attended dedication ceremonies of a State Historical Marker placed at the old bank and post office building at Cottonwood Sunday afternoon.

The building first served as "The Cottonwood Bank," and upon its closing Mrs. Hazel I. Respass bought the building for \$200 from W. F. Griffin. That was in 1918 it is reported. Miss Respass, who was present at Sunday's dedication, operated the post office from there for about 50 years, and Billie Weaver Kelly served as postmaster from 1968, upon Miss Respass' retirement, until it was closed in 1975.

The building was bought by Ruby Lee Sandifer and her daughter Suzanne Sandifer, both of Wheeler, some time ago and have restored it and replaced some original finishings.

Eighty persons signed the register Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. C. B. Snyder of Baird, secretary of the Callahan County Historical Commission, gave background on the bank-post office at Cottonwood and Callahan County history. County Judge Mack Kniffen of Clyde gave the invocation.

County's ASCS Executive Director Is Suspended

J. C. Earp, Jr., received notification Monday that he had been suspended from his position as Executive Director of the Callahan County ASCS Office at Baird. The Baird man has held that position for the past 23 years.

A letter from the Texas State ASCS Office at College Station which was signed by J. D. Smith, Chairperson, advised Earp of the suspension. That letter, in part, follows:

"This is to notify you that you are hereby suspended, without pay, from your position as County Executive Director in the Callahan County ASCS Office effective at the close of business March 26, 1979. This action is taken under Section 7.29 of the Regulations Governing ASCS County and Community Committees, a copy of which is attached, for failing to perform duties of your employment, for impeding the effectiveness of ASCS programs administered in the county and pending the completion of a formal investigation which has been requested."

It was noted that Earp has 15 days from receipt of the letter to advise why such action should not be taken.

Oran Bains of Cross Plains, Committee chairman, has stated that he and the other two ASCS County Committee members will work to see that Earp is reinstated. A letter to that fact signed by Bains follows.

"The three members of the Callahan County ASCS Committee, Oran Bains, Howard Johnson and Frank Chrane do not agree with this suspension and

New Special Ed Building Hinges On Finance Plans

Cross Plains School Trustees awarded a contract to Hicks Construction Co. of Abilene Monday night for construction of a Special Education Building contingent on securing satisfactory financing.

The bid tendered last Thursday for a metal building to be attached to the south wall of the Elementary School Building was for \$64,982.00. That figure does not take into consideration a few possible "minor changes in the plans," said Superintendent Scot H. Edgington.

Only one other bid, by ACI

also of Abilene, was submitted.

The Special Education Building is to be paid for by federal funds coming to the Special Education Cooperative of which Cross Plains School is a member. The local district would assume responsibility for the debt only in the event that federal funds were not forthcoming.

In other action taken by the trustees in the session which was begun last Thursday and was continued Monday, resignation of Jim Isbell was accepted

Probationary contract of Barbara Sowell was not continued.

Continuing contracts of Becky Isbell, Josephine Rhodes, Thomas Barclay were approved. Probationary contract of Paul Rivard was okayed.

Other personnel re-hired included Peggy Dickson as tax assessor-collector, Cliffadean Hargrove as school secretary; Charlotte Taylor, band director; E. L. Dodson and Roy Richie as agriculture teachers; Jean McWilliams, teacher aide. Lunchroom staff, Jewel Purvis, Bobbie Brown, Jeri Renfro and Judy Pope, were approved as was Jack Jones as handy man. Bus drivers re-hired are O. B. Switzer, Jack Jones, Valeta Brown, Audrey Purvis, Junior Eugh, Jean McWilliams and Mack McConal. The latter's hiring is contingent upon no conflicting coaching duties.

Supt. Edgington noted that custodians are needed by the schools. Any interested person

is urged to put in application now. Forms are available at Edgington's office in the high school.

Any person with a mower or mowing equipment capable of handling mowing of the football field, practice field and possibly other portions of the school grounds who would like to discuss a possible contract, is asked to contact Edgington as soon as possible.

Elementary personnel and cooperative service teachers and other workers were previously approved by the school board.

The proposed safety plan was not approved as presented, but an alternate plan was adopted. Delivery of students by car to the schools will continue at the front, but teachers will not park in front of the school. Their vehicles will be positioned in the rear of the school.

Roof of the gymnasium dressing room has been replaced at a cost of \$1,496.

A four-day gospel meeting will be held at the N. Main St. Church of Christ in Cross Plains Sunday through Wednesday, April 1-4.

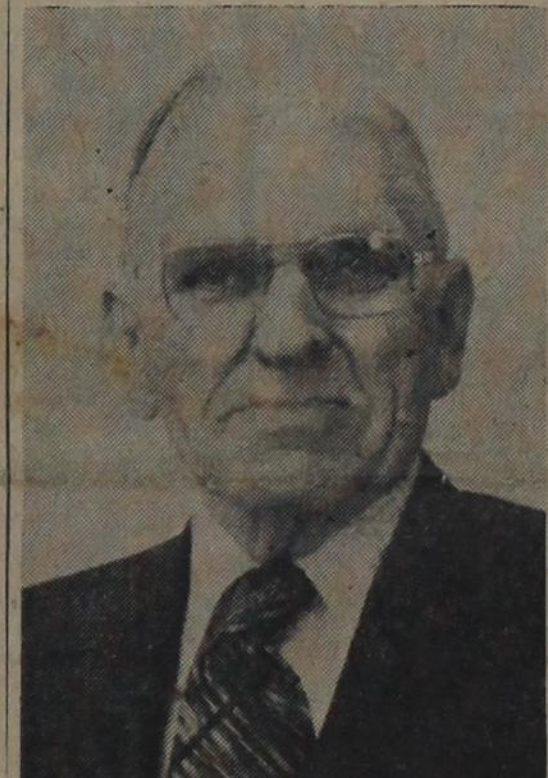
Audy Moore, minister of the local church, said everyone is invited to hear the gospel of Christ preached by J. B. Hudson of Cisco, prominent, experienced minister.

City Seeks \$1.5 Million Improvements Grant

City of Cross Plains has made application with the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a \$1,500,000 Comprehensive Community Development Grant.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson pointed out that the grant is 100 percent federally funded with no payback by the City of Cross Plains.

A recent letter from the West Central Texas Council of Governments, by Donal Burton, a coordinator, commended the city. It in part, follows:

"The West Central Texas Council of Governments appreciates the opportunity to review your CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) pre-application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$1,500,000.

"You are to be commended in your efforts to provide the affected citizens in your area with the type of services being pro-

posed by your city. "Your pre-application indicates that activities are local in nature, and does not pose any threat to Regional Plans, or any known local plans.

"Be assured of WTCOG's complete support of your project. If we can assist you in the future, feel free to contact our office."

The grant, if approved, would be carried out in a three-year program. Some of the major program improvements along with proposed funds follow.

First year: Securing additional water and improving water system \$275,000; extend sanitary sewer system \$55,000 with \$75,000 set aside for second year; extend water connections \$55,000, with \$75,000 for second year; acquire solid waste disposal site and facility \$30,000; install stormwater structure and piping \$75,000 and \$31,000 second year; housing rehabilitation \$55,000 first year, \$75,000 second year and \$70,000 third year.

Second year: street paving \$158,000; acquire site and construct park improvement \$15,000 and \$55,000 third year; acquire site and construct senior citizens community center \$10,000 and \$52,000 third year.

Mayor Edmondson pointed out there are other programs included in the grant, but for less funds.

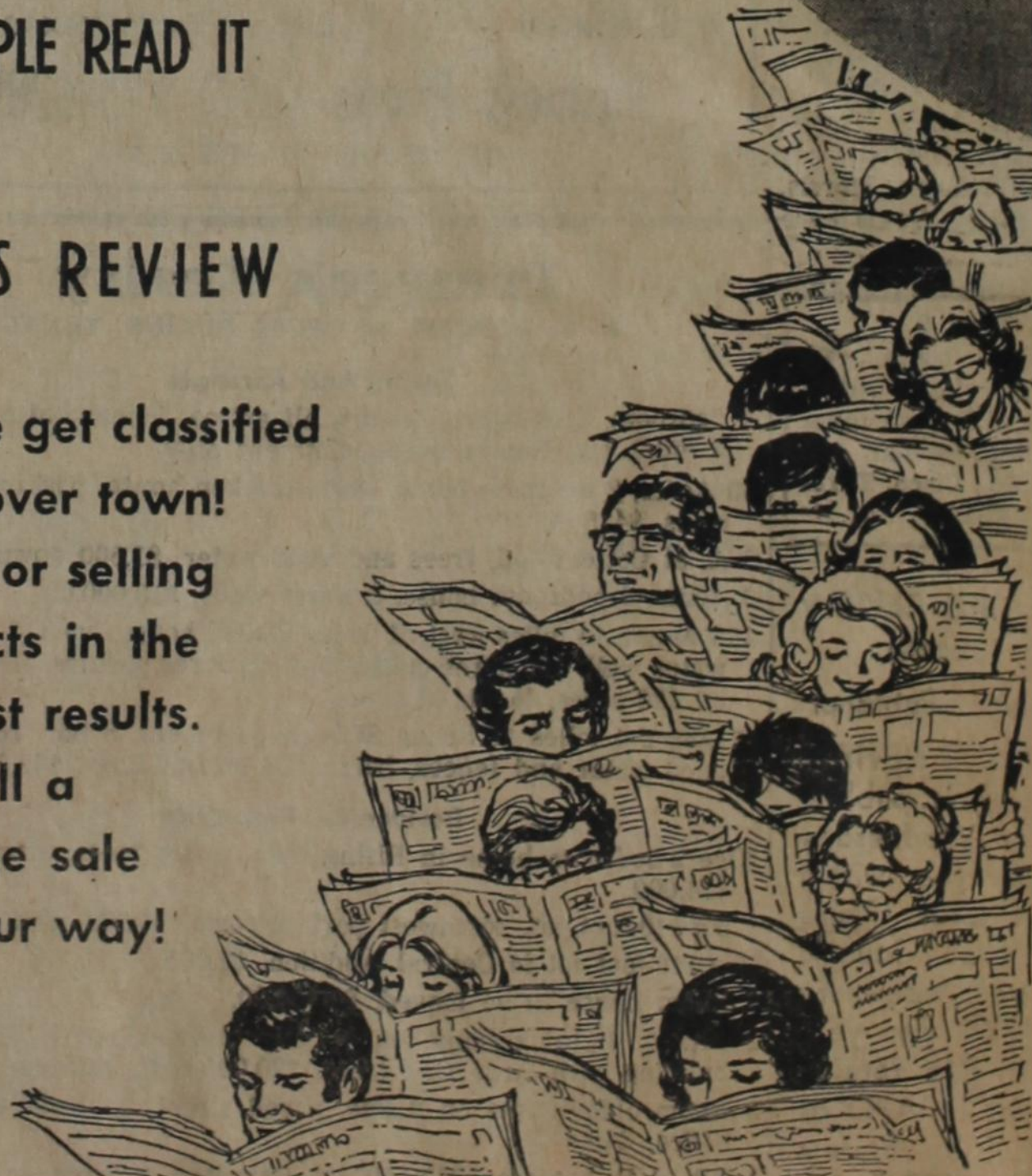

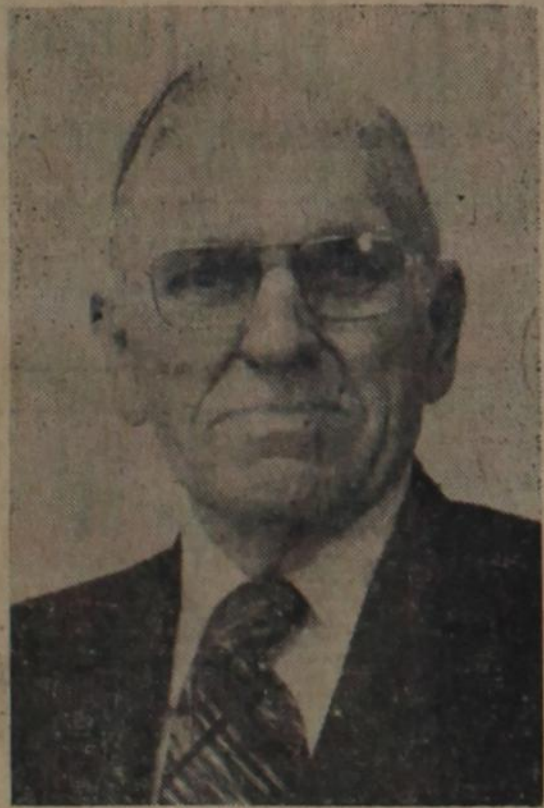

2 PROJECTS SET FOR PIONEER AREA FIELD

JAP Oil Co. of Levelland will drill two projects in the Blind Hog (Ranger) Field four miles south of Pioneer.

No. 1-D Hickman Estate will be drilled 467 feet from the north and 1,965 feet from the west lines of W. S. Johnson Survey, A-1420.

Federal Peanut Insurance Will Be Offered Locally

Peanut producers in southeast Callahan County can now obtain "All-Risk Crop Insurance" protection on their peanuts.

"In order to provide insurance in Callahan County, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has set up the southeast part of the county as a local producing area of Eastland County. Some 87 producers are eligible to participate in the F.C.I.C. program," said Emory Holder, F.C.I.C. District Director.

Federal Crop Insurance representatives will be on duty during banking hours at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains from April 2 through April 11 and the First State Bank in Rising Star from April 2nd through April 13. They will take applications on peanuts and explain how the program works.

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It provides protection against such disasters as wind, hail, insects, freeze, disease, excessive moisture and drought from the time the crop is planted till the peanuts are removed from the field.

"Since Federal Crop Insurance establishes a cash value on the crop when it is seeded, a producer is assured an amount of income no matter what nature does," Holder said.

Because crop investment is protected, F.C.I.C. policy can also be used as collateral when

credit needs arise. Holder stated the premium is paid after the harvest of peanuts.

Federal Crop Insurance has been available on peanuts in Eastland, Comanche, Brown, Hood and Erath Counties for several years. According to Holder, the Corporation's liability for those counties was nearly \$2.3 million last year.
