Large Crowd Expected Here For Program In City Park

Callahan County Pioneers will gather in their 36th reunion at Treadaway Park in Cross Plains Saturday, Aug. 12.

In conjunction with the program which will honor old settlers of Callahan County will be a playday, designed primarily for the younger generation, sponsored by the Beta Sigma Phi of Cross Plains.

President of the Callahan County Pioneer Association this year is E. K. Copping of Cross Plains. Vice-president is Warren Price of Rowden, and Mrs. Maggie Cook of Baird is secretary.

Again this year Randall C. Jackson of Baird-Abilene, James Paul Shanks of Baird and M. M. (Tut) Tabor of Clyde will serve as masters-of-ceremonies activities Saturday under the large Liveoak trees at Treadaway Park.

Beginning the day will be registration at 9:30 a.m.

Thirty minutes later the formal program will begin with group singing to be led by Richard Purvis of Cross Plains.

2 School Tax Suits Docketed August 24

Two tax suits involving Cross Plains Independent School District have been docketed for trial in 42nd District Court at Baird on Thursday, Aug. 24.

Cause Number T-460 is styled Cross Plains ISD vs. Beckham and Cause Number T1461 is styled Cross Plains ISD vs. Caldwell. The cases grew out of disputed taxes charged on holdings in the 1977 tax levies by the school district. The suits were slated earlier this year, but were postponed at that time, reportedly due to illness of some parties involved.

Attorneys of record appear to be McCreary & Huey Attorneys at Law of Austin for Cross Plains Schools and Jim R. Wright of Eastland for Beckham and Caldwell.

Rains Deluge This Section Bringing Damage, Cheer

Rains which brought happiness and damage, some places destruction, inundated this and other sections of Texas Wednesday and Thursday.

Moisture was worth many millions of dollars to area farmers and ranchers whom had faced searing temperatures for a few weeks and shortage of water for several months. Most every earthen stock tank is full and ran around. Pastures and crops seemed to green almost immediately, and begin growing overnight.

Rains swelled creeks and gullies which had been dry for what seemed in some instances to be years. The Pecan Bayou, virtually dry for the past few weeks, spilled over its banks in several places, possibly most

notably at Burkett. Turkey Creek which runs along the western edge of Cross Plains was running bank full at the city-state park, spilling over just a bit. In the Cottonwood area the creek was reported to be out of its banks. The small creek which runs along the county line between Eastland and Callahan overflowed, twice, once Wednesday and again on Thursday, blocked traffic on FM Road 374. Water reportedly ran across FM Roads 880 and 2228 between Cross Plains and Baird and Cross Plains and Putnam. Water also ran across FM Road 3265 in the Atwell area.

Damage to county roads in Precinct 4 was termed major by Callahan County Commissioner E. F. (Franz) Odom. He said that in some places the road base is completely washed away. One road was still closed Monday night, that was in the Atwell sector. Many sustained substantial damage. "We are working every day," Odom stated.

Midway between here and Burkett at the Charles Payne place, 12 inches was measured. In Cross Plains measurement varied, ranging from 9.75 inches to 11.60 inches. Average gauged in the city seemed to be about 10:50 inches.

Some credit the rain to remnants of the tropical storm Amelia.

Flood took lives and did much damage in areas to the north of Cross Plains around Albany, Haskell, Stamford and other places.

Some local observers credit flood control dams in along Turkey Creek watershed with averting a repeat, or worse, flood which happened in October of 1957.

Downpours which began Wednesday afternoon yielded about four inches, and rain through the night added more water. More hard showers and more gentle rains fell Thursday morning.

as best man, and Terry Massie of Eules was groomsman. Ushers were Michael Rivard, brother of the groom, and Glenn Dube, both of Sherman.



Small Grain Meeting Slated August 21

With recent heavy rains in the area, small grain producers will soon be planting, says Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent, headquartered at Baird.

Several management factors that will influence production include adequate fertility, seedbed preparation, high quality seed of a proven variety and—of course—rainfall.

If you haven't taken a soil test in the last two years, now would be a good time to do it. Soil sampling boxes and forms are available at the County Extension Office in courthouse at Baird.

Seed selection should not be based on price alone. When you have decided on the variety you intend to plant, check germination and purity of seed. Also be careful of buying seed that may be contaminated with wild oats as they are very difficult to control.

All of this and more will be discussed in detail at the small grain production meeting on Monday night, Aug. 21, at the Callahan County Courtroom at 8 p.m. Dr. Willis Gass, area agronomist from the San Angelo Research and Extension Center, will be on the program.

All producers are invited to attend the production meeting.

ADD NITROGEN TO AID PASTURES SAYS AGENT

Due to a dry spring and summer, many forage producers held off fertilizing improved pastures. With the improved moisture situation, now would be a good time to apply additional nitrogen to these pastures, says County Agent Greg Gerngross.

With 60-90 days of the growing season in front of us, most pastures will readily respond to an application of nitrogen. A minimum of 40-60 pounds of actual nitrogen should be applied as soon as you can, the Baird agent explained.

This amount should be adequate in most cases to obtain a high quality forage for either grazing or harvesting, he said.
