

24 Seniors Are Graduated In Exercises Here Friday

Twenty-four senior graduation candidates ended public school careers in exercises held in the school auditorium Friday night. Featured on the program were Dr. Toby Irwin, First Baptist Church pastor, who gave a sermonette; Darron Koenig, class salutatorian; Deidra McCorkle, class valedictorian; Dr. Albert Kincheloe of Mansfield, doctor of osteopathy; Dr. E. Ray Freeman, high school principal; Dr. Scot H. Edington, superintendent, and Randy Foster and John D. Montgomery, school board members who presented diplomas.

A large crowd heard Dr. Kincheloe, himself a graduate of Cross Plains High School with the class of 1968, tell graduates that with the help of God what they make of themselves is up to them. He was introduced by Don Wilson of this city, Callahan County Attorney.

Among scholarships and awards regularly presented to the valedictorian, Miss McCorkle, two new scholarships were awarded. They were made to the second and third high ranking students and were funded by Carl J. Sohns, D. O., of this

city. They went to Darron Koenig and Kim Strahan, respectively. Other parts on the program were by Rev. Bill Reed, local Methodist pastor; Audy Moore, local Church of Christ minister, and the High School Band.

Feminine State Discus Champ Known Here

The state Class AA feminine discus champion is Gaynelle Baum of Cisco.

She is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Baum of Cross Plains.

Her mother is Glenda Baum of Cisco, and her father is Vernon Baum of Katy, formerly of this city. Mrs. Zander of Cisco is another grandmother.

Miss Baum, a senior at Cisco High School, won the Class AA discus gold medal with a throw of 134 feet, 7 inches, 10 feet further than her previous lifetime best. She believes that 150 feet is not beyond her if she continues athletics in college.

She, according to an article in May 10 morning Abilene Reporter-News, says the discus is a thinker's event, demanding more than brute strength. She relies on repetitious throwing and style. She was state runner-up as a junior.

MANY LOCAL BUSINESSES SLATE HOLIDAY MONDAY

Many Cross Plains businesses will be closed Monday, May 28, in observance of Memorial Day. Although May 30 is the traditional Memorial Day date, Monday will be observed under the "Monday holiday" bill.

Most downtown stores here will be closed all day with exception of JRB Supermarket and Cross Plains Review. Almost all convenience stores, eating establishments and service stations will remain open. Gasoline supplies appear to be adequate here.

First class mail will be boxed in the post office, but there will be no rural delivery or window service.

Improve Mailbox Week Is Noted

Cross Plains Postmaster Joe E. Hanke, Jr., has announced that "Mailbox Improvement Week," a traditional spring observance which contributes to improve security and appearance of the nation's mailboxes, will be held on May 21-26 this year.

The event has long served as the starting signal for community efforts to repair, repaint and make other improvements to the nation's approximately 28 million rural and suburban curbside-type mailboxes.

Hanke reminds customers on rural routes that along with paint and fix-up, it is also the time to print the box number on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he regularly approaches it or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number must be printed and names are optional, he advised.

2 Public Meetings Set By City Dads

City of Cross Plains will hold two public meetings in compliance with being approved to receive \$1.5 million in a Department of Housing and Urban Development Small Cities Development grant.

A resolution was passed on May 16 by the Cross Plains City Council to authorize submission of a full application and its preparation.

First of two planned public meetings scheduled will be Tuesday, June 5 at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall. The sessions are designed for the purpose of discussing the application and to solicit public participation in its preparation.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson stated that all interested citizens are invited to attend.

It was recently announced from Washington that Cross Plains had been approved to submit a full application. A preliminary or pre-application filing for the \$1.5 grant had been okayed.

City hired a Dallas engineer, who has been working on the project, about two years ago. Among improvements planned once the money becomes available are additional water

sources, more sewer line, extended water distribution system, senior citizen center, waste disposal additions, drainage improvements and other undertakings.

It was noted that the grant is to be funded over a three-year period with \$524,000 being made available immediately upon approval of the full application by HUD.

Jack McCarty Is Buried At Glen Rose Monday

Funeral mass was held for D. J. (Jack) McCarty of Glen Rose, former Cross Plains Review publisher, at 2 p.m. Monday at Martin-Pitts Funeral Home Chapel in Glen Rose.

McCarty, 62, who formerly published both the Review and Rising Star Record (now the Rising Star), drowned Saturday night in a stock tank on his farm about two and one-half miles from Glen Rose. He was alone baiting a trotline when apparently his boat capsized and he became entangled in the fishing line. His wife, Lois, discovered him missing about 9 p.m., and his body was recovered at 1 a.m. Sunday by the rescue team of the Glen Rose Fire Department.

Conducting the funeral were Father Terry and Father McNamara, assisted by Nat Conner, all of Stephenville.

Burial was in Squaw Creek Cemetery, northeast of Glen Rose.

Born Dec. 8, 1916, at Cleburne, he was the son of the late Dan and Nora McCarty who also made their home here for a time. He married the former Lois Bailey June 17, 1937, at Goldthwaite. He went to Rising Star in 1940 and became a partner in the Record with M. S. (Doc) Sellers in 1948. He bought the Cross Plains Review from Jack Scott in 1951. He and Scott formed a partnership in 1960.

and in 1963 they bought the Glen Rose Reporter. They dissolved the partnership in 1964 with McCarty staying in Glen Rose. He formed a partnership with Benny Glover in the Review in August 1971, and sold his interest to Glover in June 1974. McCarty's son, Dan, joined him in operation of the Glen Rose paper in 1965.

McCarty was leader of the Democratic Party in Somervell County, and had recently been re-appointed by Gov. Bill Clements as a member of the Brazos River Authority. He was President of the Glen Rose-Somervell County Chamber of Commerce, member of Glen Rose Library board and an active member and office holder in several other area organizations. He was a Catholic.

Survivors include his wife, Lois, of Glen Rose; one son, Dan, of Glen Rose; one daughter, Mrs. Joe (Kay) Vandiver of Nederland; one sister, Mrs. Raymond Young of Baird; five grandsons and one great-grandson.

The moisture greatly benefited gardens and other vegetation which were beginning to need additional water. Prospects of bumper small grain and fruit crops still appear to be excellent.



"Prophecy"

"The Wrath of God." Immediately after the Christian believers are raptured into heaven, following three and a half years of Tribulation at the hands of the Antichrist, those unbelievers left upon the earth will experience the "wrath of God" for the next three and a half years, Matt. 24:29-31. This period will be ushered in at the opening of the sixth seal. (Rev. 6:12) The people cried out in terror for the rocks to fall on them and hide them from the wrath of the Lamb, for who shall be able to stand? (Rev. 6:15-17) Some have taught salvation after the Rapture, but there is no scripture for it. The door of salvation will be shut just as Jesus said in Matt. 25:10-12 and Luke 13:25.

God has warned man repeatedly throughout the ages by His holy prophets, and Jesus Himself told us how to read the signs of the time. Even to the very last moment God warns of His impending wrath. (Rev. 14:6, 7) As it was in the days of Noah, the people went about their merry way and ignored all the warnings of the man of God. When the floods came, the righteous entered in to safety and the door was shut by God. The cry of the unbelievers were in vain and all perished. Matt. 24:37-39) Jesus also said that the people of Ninawa would rise up and condemn this generation because they repented not. (Matt. 12:41). He told us that only the sign of the prophet Jonas would be given to a sign seeking generation, (Matt. 16:4, Luke 11:29, 30). It seems that a "pleasure seeking" generation has forgotten God and come to rely on "self knowledge and self wisdom". The sin of pride and unbelief will keep many from bowing their knees to God while there is yet time. But there will come a day "when every knee shall bow". Phil. 2:10, 11) A day will come when the cries of repentance will no longer be heard. (Zech. 7:13) Jesus tells us that NOW is the day of salvation. When the time of judgment comes it will then be too late.

At the opening of the Seventh Seal, just before judgment was released, there was an eerie silence in heaven for half an hour. This might be called "the lull before the storm", because the Seventh Seal will bring the greatest judgments yet, getting progressively worse 'til the end of the three and a half years.

The visions of the coming judgments revealed to John are best described by John himself. Do read these chapters in Revelation and see what is coming to the unbelievers and those who take the mark of the beast. The first six seals are opened throughout chapter six. Chapters 8 and 9 show the opening of the Seventh Seal and the first six Trumpet Judgments. A brief outline of the judgments are: First Trumpet (8:7) — hail, fire and blood, one-third of vegetation burned up; Second Trumpet — one-third of the seas become blood and a third of the sea life is killed; Third Trumpet — one-third of all fresh water become poison; Fourth Trumpet — one-third of the sun, moon and stars are darkened; Fifth Trumpet (First Woe) — (Chapter 9) a plague of demon locusts out of the abyss; Sixth Trumpet & Second Woe — a plague of demon horsemen out of the abyss; Seventh Trumpet, Third Woe (Rev. 12:12) — casting out of Satan to earth.

Following the Seven Trumpet Judgments are the Seven Vials of the wrath of God (Chapter 16). First Vial — Sores all over the flesh; Second Vial — entire sea becomes blood and all sea life dies; Third Vial — all fresh water becomes blood; Fourth Vial — scorching heat; Fifth Vial — pain and darkness; Sixth Vial — Euphrates River dried up; Seventh Vial — great earthquake and great hail storm, each hail stone weighing about 100 pounds. And what do the people do? They blaspheme God because of it!

The next event will be the Battle of Armagiddon (last part of chapter 19). The greatest battle of all times will be between the armies of heaven under Jesus Christ and the earthly armies under the dragon, the Beast and the False Prophet. The Devil tries to keep Christ from coming back to set up His Kingdom, but he will be utterly defeated!

The Lord has promised that He will never leave or forsake His children. Those faithful ones who overcome and love Jesus more than their own life will be delivered and make heaven their home. God's people will be tried and true to Him, and He will deliver them from the awful wrath of God. Never, never take the mark of the beast; any mark allowing you to buy or sell, for to do so is eternal damnation. (Rev. 1:3)
