

Order Of Ballot For City, School Elections Drawn

Order of names on upcoming city and school election ballots have been drawn by the respective directorates.

Only one new hopeful filed before the deadline last Wednesday. That was Jim Fleming who is asking a place on the Cross Plains School Board. He joins four others seeking two places on the board.

There were no new filings in the election for Cross Plains City Council before the deadline last week. In that vote six persons are seeking three two-year seats on the panel, and Ray Purvis is unopposed for a one-year-unexpired term.

Both elections will be held Saturday, April 7 in the City Hall.

Candidates may still file in either race, but names will not be printed on the ballot. There will be no runoffs, as the top vote getters will be seated on the respective boards. Write-in lines will be printed on the ballots.

Order of names to appear on the school trustee ballot were revealed as follows.

Payne and Hanke are asking re-election. Hanke, current president of the board, won his first term three years ago, and Payne won a one-year unexpired term last year. He succeeded Dr. Carl J. Sohns who resigned. Callaway, Fleming and Jones are seeking first terms.

Robertson and Franke are incumbents, both having served two years on the city commission. Hicks, Nichols, Wilson and Joy are newcomers, asking initial tenures on the council. Term of Bob Lane is expiring, but he chose not to run.

Purvis was appointed several months ago to serve the term won last year by James Le May, who later moved from the city. He drew no opposition.

Absentee voting is scheduled to begin Monday, March 19, and continue through April 3. Bilingual ballots are now being processed by printers.
