



When The Blind Lead The Blind

(Matt. 15:14)

... continued:

In my efforts to teach others the - truth that makes man free, (John 8:32); I have found that the problem of understanding - God's righteousness, (Rom. 10:2, 3), as concerns a particular subject, is a very common prombelm with most. This' is the way the subject is usually introduced by some into a conversation or study. They will say: "My father and mother are (if they are living) / were (if they are dead) members of a particular church and if they are lost I don't want to go to heaven, because it just wouldn't be heaven if they weren't there." Now to bring the matter into focus, I will put it into the form of question. Does the word of God teach that the saved will know each other in heaven, if they knew each other on earth? Some will cite the case of the rich man and Lazarus in an attempt to prove so, (Luke 16:19-31). However, God in His righteousness made sure that would fail. Look closely at the wording and you will see that it is all past tense and speaks of conditions before the final judgement day. Therefore, revealing nothing relevant to conditions in heaven beyond the final judgement. Thus to use it as a proof text would prove too much and that which proves too much proves

Another line of reasoning goes like this: Memory is an eternal faculty and therefore cannot be destroyed. At least two things in this line of reasoning are out of harmony with God's revealed truth. Number one: God's Holy Spirit directed the New Testament writer of the letter to the Hebrew Christians to record twice that God forgets forever the sins He has forgiven, (Heb. 8:12; 10:17). The point here is that God can and does erase His memory; therefore, He can and will erase the memory of the saved, of evrything that would make heaven anything less than aboslutely perfect. This brings us to point number two. The apostle Paul guided by God's Holy Spirit wrote to the Corinthians, (I Cor. 15:50-54), and explained some final changes in the saved prior to their entering the eternal Heaven. Note Paul's use of the terms, corruption, incorruption and incorruptible. The point here is that if memory cannot be erased, the saved in Heaven would be able to remember all about their life on earth including the corrupt things. Yet Paul said to the Corinthians that "corruption doth not inherit incorruption" and "the dead shall be raised incorrupti-

Consider this if you believe that the saved will know or recognize in heaven all those they knew on earth: What does a name or face mean to you is you know absolutely nothing about the person? In order for the name or face of even our earthly father, mother or children to mean anything to us in heaven we would have to be able to remember their background which would have to include the bad as well as the good, yet God's word says the saved will not inherit corrup-

This next point always raises some eyebrows and occasionally causes a mouth to drop open. In order for the saved to recognize anyone in heaven as someone they knew on earth, parents who have children to die as infants would be expected to recognize them. But now the surprising point: There will not be infants or children in heaven. You may wonder, how do I know? If so the answer is: by rightfully dividing God's Holy Word, (II Tim. 2:15). Infants and older children who die at that stage in life, do so in an undeveloped physical body. They are in a safe relationship with God, (Matt. 18:3), and therefore will be raised in an incorruptible body which according to the apostle John, will be like Jesus Christ; the same as all the saved, and since Jesus is not an infant nor a child all who are given entrance into heaven shall be raised in a full grown incorruptible body like his, (I John


