A dedication of a historical marker for the Cottonwood bank and post office will be held Sunday, March 25 at 3 p.m.

The dedication will be at the site, located on Farm Road 1076 at Center Street in Cottonwood.

Mrs. John Berry of Clyde, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Commission, will preside over the ceremonies. Mrs. C. B. Snyder of Baird will give background on the bank and post office. Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen of Clyde will give the benediction.

Special recognition will be given to Ruby Lee Sandifer of Wheeler and her daughter Susanne, of Atlanta, Ga., who own the property in Cottonwood and restored it to its original likeness.

The two-room, white frame building served the community as a post office for several years, then it became the Bank of Cottonwood, a branch of the First National Bank in Baird.

In 1921 Hazel Respass bought the building and moved the post office to it. She retired as postmistress in 1968, and Mrs. Bill Kelly served in that capacity until 1975 when the post office was closed.

Some of the original equipment has been found in the community and has been put back into the building along with some memorabilia from Cottonwood.

The historical marker in-

cludes a brief background on the building.

Members of the Callahan County Historical Commission will gather at the courthouse in Baird at 2:30 p.m. and form a caravan to Cottonwood. Others wishing to join the caravan may do so.

Sen. Farabee Higher Interest Rates

State Senator Ray Farabee voted recently against a bill which would increase interest rates from 10% to 18%. Senate Bill 10 provides for a rate of 18% on loans in excess of \$175,000.

"Such an increase would be a real problem to farmers and ranchers who depend on credit and frequently must borrow or refinance to stay in the business. The bill, if passed by the House, will contribute to the shortage of money and higher rates on smaller loans," Senator Farabee, who represents Callahan County, indicated.

Farabee said that he intends to oppose Senate Bill 134 which would increase the ceiling on home mortgage interest rates from 10% to 12%, stating, "Texans have had Constitutional protection against interest rates in excess of 10% since 1891, and we need to retain that protection. Although the money market is tighter nationally, money remains available in this area."

"High taxes and high interest rates are primary contributors to the number one problem of this country . . . inflation. We are working to implement the tax relief amendment recently adopted by the people, and we should hold the line on interest rates. Any increase in home mortgage interest rates will be inflationary and would only add to the existing problems of those who want to purchase and own their own homes or farms," the 30th District State Senator stated.

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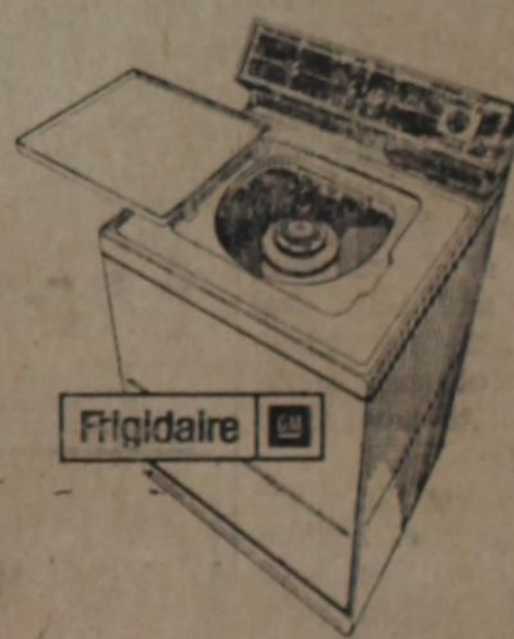
