Pop Whitaker Dies Going Home Friday

Funeral service was held at 2 p.m. Monday for E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird, 82-year-old widely known country-western music promoter and performer.

Death came to "Pop" about 10:40 p.m. Friday night shortly after he had started driving home from the Cross Plains musical where he had performed and visited friends. He apparently suffered a heart attack and L. P. Mitchell, Cross Plains Peace Justice, ruled death was due to natural causes, explaining that the damages done in the minor collision of his car with a sign post was not apparently sufficient to cause fatal injury.

The mishap occurred about a mile east of Cottonwood on FM Road 880.

Held at the Morgan-Parker Funeral Home Chapel at Baird, Rev. Wayne Shuffield, pastor of the First Baptist Church there, officiated the final rites. Burial was in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

Larry Melson, local Department of Public Safety Patrolman, who investigated the mishap along with Mitchell, Deputy Sheriff Charlie Barnett and Robert V. Roysden, Cross Plains Chief of Police, said first persons on the scene were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Strahan, who live nearby and alerted others.

Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service personnel were called and administered life-saving treatment but could not revive Whitaker.

Born March 5, 1897, in Rising Star, he was a retired Baird public school employee. He was a veteran of both World Wars and was in the U.S. Navy. He was a Methodist. He had been a country western performer for more than 40 years.

He had lived in Baird 30 years, and in Callahan County most of his life.

Survivors are cousins, nieces and nephews.
